## UA, ASU Take Territorial Cup To Thursday Night Stage

*The Arizona Wildcats look to snap a three-game losing skid with a chance for a third consecutive win over their in-state rival Arizona State Sun Devils.*

### Some Game Themes

The battle for the Territorial Cup, recognized by the NCAA as the nation's oldest trophy game... Arizona tries to hang on to that hardware, Arizona State tries to wrest it back after a two-year residency in Tucson... The Cats need a win to halt a three-game losing streak and keep hopes of improving on successive 8-5 campaigns, while the Sun Devils work to even their record with a steady finish late in the season... The game has some obvious bowl implications with Arizona jockeying for selections and ASU looking to knock the Cats down the pecking order, a role reversal of sorts from just a few seasons ago... Arizona could finish above .500 in league play for the third consecutive year while the Devils could match the Cats at 4-5. The winner finishes third (or tied) in the final year of Pac-10 play... Arizona works to match an offensive spree through its losing streak with some commensurate stopping power on the other side of the ball... The fourth December Cup tilt in the last four years and likely the last, with Pac-12 Championship games taking this weekend in the future... Records and tendencies aside, the game always carries emotion on both sides, as befits a traditional rivalry contest... But, if tendencies are a yard stick, this one matches two of top 12 passing games in the FBS... If turnovers are a key, it won't be the first time -- UA is 50th in turnover margin and ASU is 106th... Arizona checks its discipline against a Sun Devils' attack that's been scary on kickoff returns, with three returned for scores by three different players and a 28-yard average (2nd nationally)... The teams' last December game for some time, with Pac-12 play starting next year and both squads in the Pac-12 South...

### Last Week

Arizona played No. 1 Oregon straight up in the first half, then suffered as had many a team as the Ducks put together a typical string of big plays to explode for 34 points in 18 second-half minutes to dispel the notion that the Wildcats could be in the BCS-busting business. The Cats put the first points on the board and had three other leads including a 19-14 edge at the halftime break, but when Oregon began to click it did so with emphasis. The Cats' Nick Foles threw for a career high 448 yards along with three scores, but the Ducks raced for 389 rushing yards to counter with authority. A couple of mistakes hurt -- a Foles' interception in the red zone, a fumbled kick return that gave Oregon the ball inside UA's 10-yard line -- but a couple of Ducks' turnovers fueled two of Arizona's first three scores, too. The Oregon rushing yards were the most against Arizona since 2005. There were big plays on both sides, with Foles hitting a career-best 85-yard TD throw to Juron Criner to give UA a 14-7 lead, and Josh Huff racing 85 yards to open the third quarter and regain the lead for UO at 20-19. The Cats scored in every quarter but the Ducks 20 points in the third period gave them a 34-22 edge entering the final period. LaMichael James scored a pair of rushing touchdowns in the final period to punctuate Oregon's running game, which saw him (28-126) and Huff (3-106) both eclipse the century barrier. Oregon averaged 6.8 yards per rush -- 57 of them. Meantime, UA could not get its running game untracked, with 27 attempts for 58 net yards. Foles threw 54 times, completing 29 for his 448 yards, finding Terrence Miller eight times for 96 yards and Criner three times for 109 yards and two scores, among other targets. The loss was Arizona's third consecutive and the victory earned Oregon the Pac-10 title and no worse than a Rose Bowl appearance but alive for the BCS title game at 11-0. Sophomore safety Adam Hall led UA with 11 tackles and helped set up UA's first score with an interception and 22-yard return. UA kept pace in the yardage department with 5-6 to UA's 539, but Oregon's touchdowns on five straight possessions to open the second half spelled doom for the Cats.

**The Coaches**

**Arizona - Mike Stoops (Iowa '86), seventh year (40-43) at UA and overall** as a head coach. Stoops returned Arizona from a 2-10 program the year before his arrival to the national rankings in his tenure, and has taken the Wildcats to successive bowl games to close the decade. He's working on a 23-14 mark from 2008 onward. His Arizona clubs have beaten a ranked team each of his years including this year's victory over No. 9 Iowa. His recruiting and player development programs have put talent back on the field and sent more than a dozen players to the professional ranks via the draft or free agency in the past four years. He has coached national award winners and a combined 28 All-Pacific-10 players. Arizona football attendance has been a positive feature of a home-field advantage under Coach Stoops, with crowds averaging 93 percent of capacity each of his six seasons at Arizona Stadium and three sellouts this year. Arizona's football team APR checked in with an improved mark each of the five seasons since his inaugural year. Stoops is 3-3 against ASU including the last two meetings and his opening-year victory over the then-No. 18 Sun Devils in 2004. **Arizona State - Dennis Erickson (Montana State '70), fifth year at ASU (24-24) and 23rd year overall (172-89-1).** Erickson has been Pac-10 Coach of the Year at ASU, Oregon State and WSU, and won two national championships at Miami. He is 8-4 lifetime against Arizona, with a 2-2 mark while at ASU. The first of his seven head coaching stints began at Idaho, in 1981.

**The Territorial Cup**

The Territorial Championship Cup was first presented to Tempe Normal School after its 11-2 victory over Arizona at Tucson's Carrillo Gardens Field downtown on Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 30, 1899. That makes it the oldest rivalry game trophy in America -- compared to, say, the Little Brown Jug (Michigan-Minnesota 1909) or the Old Oaken Bucket (Indiana-Purdue 1925). Carrillo Gardens was in a downtown park on a site south of the current Tucson Community Center in the Barrio Historico district, near South Main Avenue and West Simpson Street. The Cup has been registered with the NCAA and thereby sanctions the game as the oldest trophy game. Early origins of the piece are unclear, but the cup itself is silver-plated over Britannia base metal and was manufactured by Reed and Barton of Taunton, Mass., according to some reports, which also indicate it catalog price at \$20. The lone inscription reads "Arizona Foot Ball League 1899 Normal." The Cup's whereabouts for the next eight decades also remains unclear until its discovery among items found in the basement of a church near ASU in the early 1980s, and then displayed in various ASU collections. In 2001, then ASU President Lattie Coor led the move to have it presented to the game winner. Over the years, the Governor's Trophy (1953-1979) and a "Victory" sculpture by artist Benn Goo (1979-1997) were presented to the game's winner. The Saguaro Trophy, a bronze piece commissioned from artist Dora Perry in 1998 also has been in the mix, and now goes to the winning coach each year. The Most Outstanding Player in the game, named after the late sportswriter Bob Moran in 2008, earns the Ben Goo sculpture for his school's hall of fame. The Cup on the sideline at the game itself is a replica; glove-treatment transfer by curators -- if necessary -- goes for the original piece, which also is a hall of champions display artifact. The games themselves are not atypical of a state where the Territorial legislature awarded one city (Phoenix) the initial economic price, the state hospital, while the other town (Tucson) got the first state university. The games are competitive, territorial and a huge matter of pride. This year, the schools are participating in the State Farm Territorial Cup challenge, which includes competition from 18 sports, for the second consecutive year.

**The Cup Hero**

Whose to have the game-changing performance? Last year UA running back Keola Antolin (67-yard TD run, 7-78 rushing) was picked for the Territorial Cup's Bob Moran Trophy as the game's most valuable player, (although voting preceded Alex Zendejas' winning field goal as time expired). The award started in 2001 and as have the teams played to a 5-4 edge (ASU) in that span, the trophy has gone to ASU players five times and Arizona four times. The late Moran was a journalist who observed and chronicled the UA-ASU series as a beat writer and columnist covering both teams for Arizona newspapers for three decades. He died in 2008.

**JC for the TD**

Junior receiver Juron Criner has 18 career touchdown receptions, sixth most in school history, largely in two years as a key guy in the rotation. His nine TDs a year ago tied for No. 4 on the UA chart and he has two games left to improve on that one. He will have a shot at the school record of 30 TD receptions, by Theopolis "T" Bell from 1972-75 in Jim Young's tenure as UA's head coach under a wide-open attack directed by then QB Bruce Hill. Juron also has a shot at the season mark of 11 TD catches, a tie between Bell (1974) and Mike Thomas (2007).

## Zoned Out

Arizona is 112th in the Football Bowl Subdivision in red zone success, netting scores on 73% of its trips. It faces an ASU squad that, flip side, is 4th nationally in red zone defense, allowing only 23 scores on 48 trips (64%). Either the Cats have to score from farther out (they have, with 13 long-range offensive TDs), or tighten up and make it work once they get into scoring position.

## Throwing the Rock

Arizona's team average of 314 yards passing per game would be a season record if it holds up in the final two games, eclipsing the 308.5 ypg mark under Willie Tuitama in 2007. Foles' individual mark of 294 yards per game would be second to Willie's 306.9 per-game average that year. Considering Foles had to recover from a knee injury that caused him to miss the UW and UCLA games, it's a remarkable year for the junior from Austin, Texas. He has two 400-yard games and three others above 300 yards this year. In the game he was hurt, at WSU, his average took a hit with a 71-yard outing in first-quarter action only. If you subtract that short appearance his average is 322 yards per game -- which would rate third in the FBS. As it is, he's No. 8 among FBS passers in yards per game (294.3).

## Staring at the Numbers...

...Junior David Douglas has done a good job of working as an outside receiver this year after a juco wide-guy never enrolled. He has 42 catches and four TDs after totals of 34 and two his first two seasons in the slot. Those 76 catches put him in good shape to find a spot on Arizona's career receiving chart where the top 15 starts around the 100 mark. Aside from being a good receiver, he's Nick Foles' roommate and thereby closer to the thought processes in the UA passing game... Arizona's 78 penalties are the most during Mike Stoops' seven years in Tucson but thankfully well short of the school record of 114 by the 1999 Wildcats. Stoops' first six teams averaged 66 penalties per year and 5.5 per game. The team is averaging 7.1 per game this year... Another annual average for a Stoops' club is 12.6 interceptions by his defenders, which means this year's teams is slightly behind pace with nine... The Cats are listed 45th in the FBS in red zone defense, allowing scores at an 80 percent rate when teams reach the 20-yard line. UA, however, is 12th in lowest number of such drives at 30. (The national leader in that non-category is TCU, with only 16 penetrations by opponents into the red zone)... UA's 27 sacks are the second-most for a Mike Stoops' UA club (34 last year), but UA hasn't had one in its last three games against Stanford, USC and Oregon, all losses. A sack or two would have helped in those games, no doubt. Stanford is the best pass-pro team in the country, and USC and Oregon opted to run the ball a combined 103 times against 59 combined passes.... The 57 running plays (389 yards) by the Ducks last week were the second-most in Stoops' tenure, behind 61 totes (for 310) by Oregon State in Mike's first year in 2004. USC and Washington ran the ball 52 times against Arizona in 2005. Washington had the highwater mark in yards gained rushing (333 in 2005) before the Ducks' onslaught... Linebacker Paul Vassallo has a chance to hit the 100-tackle mark this year, sitting on 86 and averaging 7.8 per game with a pair of games left. The last Wildcat to hit the plateau was current Denver Bronco linebacker/fullback Spencer Larsen with 131 in 12 games in 2007...

## Bowled Over

Assuming one schedules Middle Northern State instead, the Pac-10's final year typifies why some coaches felt a nine-game league schedule (as has been established for the Pac-12) was one league game too much. The Territorial Cup tilt in Tucson, the Civil War in Corvallis and the Apple Cup in Pullman will further determine 2010 bowl participation by Pac-10 squads. There could be as few as three, or possibly five (or six, pending appeal) bowl-eligible teams emerging from the league for its six affiliated bowls. For sure, USC, Cal, UCLA and WSU are staying home. Cal ends a seven-year run, USC had its nine-year run clipped by the NCAA and UCLA was coming off an appearance in 2009.

## Foles Flinging Facts

Quarterback Nick Foles' 54 pass attempts at Oregon were the third-most in a game in Arizona history, behind 61 by Willie Tuitama at California in 2007 and 56 by Marc Reed against Oregon State in 1966. Foles threw 53 times at Washington in 2009. One rub in Eugene was his completion percentage of .537 (29 complete), well below his average of 71 percent entering the game, which dropped to 68 percent afterward... Foles connected with Juron Criner for an 85-yard touchdown pass at Oregon, tied for the seventh-longest in school history, the career-long for both players and the longest pass play for the Wildcats in eight years... Foles is within reach of 3,000 passing yards this year (currently 2,649), accomplished just three times in Arizona's football history, twice by Willie Tuitama (3,683 in 2007 and 3,088 in 2008) and once by Jason Johnson (3,327 in 2002)... His 16 TD tosses this year are No. 9 on the UA chart, where his 19 in 2009 were No. 4.

## T-Mill Steps Up

Sophomore inside receiver Terrence Miller has 15 receptions for 212 yards in the past two games against USC and Oregon including a career-best 8 snags last week and a career-best 116 yards against USC (7 grabs). The week before that he signaled some spark with three catches at Stanford. For a guy with 24 career receptions in 18 games played, you might say he's emerged in the past several weeks. He lettered as a true freshman a year ago and now appears to be headed toward some meaningful contribution to the Arizona passing attack.

## 20 Grabs

Arizona has eight players with 20 or more receptions, to match its biggest group of "20" guys in history -- the group in 2007. Last year the Cats had six players with 20 or more. This year's group is led by Juron Criner with 67, while the 2007 group was led by Mike Thomas with 83.

## Moving the Ball

Arizona's 450 offensive yards per game would stack up as No. 2 in school history if it held up. The best was the 1999 team led by quarterback Keith Smith and Ortege Jenkins, running back Trung Canidate and receivers Dennis Northcutt and Bobby Wade, at 471.9 yards per game. For a guy with a reputation built on defense, Mike Stoops' Arizona offenses will have four marks in UA's top 12 per-game figures after this year if things keep going in the final two contests of 2010. The Cats can move the ball.

## Head Coach Mike Stoops

- Led Arizona to a second-place finish in the Pac-10 in 2009, its highest finish in 11 seasons.
- Returned Arizona to the national rankings in 2009, with the team ascending to No. 18 in November.
- Coached the Wildcats to back-to-back eight-victory seasons and bowl berths in 2008 and 2009.
- Helped lead the program's defense to consecutive years in the nation's Top 25 in total defense in 2008 and 2009.
- Arizona's victory over No. 20 Southern California in 2009 gave Stoops victories over a ranked team in each of his six seasons in Tucson.
- Helped Arizona record a sixth consecutive 50,000-plus per-game attendance figure, its best streak in the 30 years Arizona Stadium has been near its current capacity.
- Arizona has had 12 players selected in the NFL Draft the past four seasons after their development under Stoops' training systems.
- Stoops added 2007 Jim Thorpe Award winner Antoine Cason to his long list of national award winners. Cason was a consensus All-American and later first-round pick by the San Diego Chargers.

**Numb in November**

Arizona played to a 7-1 record through September and October, and then endured its first winless November since 2000 (when Dick Tomey's final Arizona club also started strong -- 5-1 -- and then lost its last five ballgames including an 0-3 slate in November. Mike Stoops' Arizona clubs have typically been strong in the late season throughout his first six years in Tucson. The seventh pitted the Cats against some strong clubs this year -- Stanford, USC and Oregon -- and it showed on the scoreboards.

**Zendejas In the Books**

Arizona junior place kicker Alex Zendejas -- the Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week a season ago after booting a game-winning field goal against ASU -- has scored 74 points this season (12-15 FGs, 38-41 PATs). That tally has boosted his career total to 168 points, which stands at No. 11 in UA history. The current No. 10 guy -- New York Jets placekicker Nick Folk -- is just one point ahead of Zendejas on the chart. Zendejas is 29-for-37 (.784) on field goal attempts the last two seasons, Interestingly, that percentage trails UA career percentage leader Jason Bondzio (.833), but leads Zendejas' uncle Max Zendejas, who connected on .738 percent of tries in his career (1982-84).

**The Davids**

Don't get confused between No. 85 David Douglas and No. 81 David Douglas. While both are receivers, the former played "inside wide receiver" his first two seasons before sliding to "outside receiver" this season, although you'll see him in the slot at times, too. Roberts, meanwhile, is a steady inside receiver who is able to find holes in defensive coverage. Neither player has electrifying speed or a big frame, but both are reliable guys who move the chains and come up with big catches at key times. Douglas is second on the team with 42 receptions for 398 yards and four touchdowns, while Roberts has 38 catches for 429 yards and two touchdowns. Added up, that is 80 catches for 827 yards and six touchdowns. Good numbers for sure.

**Out of the Backfield**

While Arizona's trio of running backs (Nic Grigsby, Keola Antolin and Greg Nwoko) average just 23.5 carriers per game, they factor into the passing game quite often. They have combined for 52 catches for 389 yards, which averages out to 7.5 yards per catch and 35 extra markers per game for the tailbacks. That's a nice extension of the running game even it doesn't show up that way statistically.

**Quarter Scores**

Arizona has scored points rather evenly throughout the course of games en route to outscoring opponents by nearly 100 points on the season (328-229). The Wildcats have scored 73 points in the opening quarter of games, 105 in the second and 75 in the third and fourth quarters, respectively. Meanwhile, opponents have not combined to score more than 67 points in any quarter, with that totally coming in the third period. Otherwise, opponents have scored 52 in the opening quarter, 57 in the second and 3 in the fourth.

**Plenty of Patrons**

Arizona has enjoyed one of its most successful seasons in program history in terms of fan support. Through six games, the Wildcats have averaged 55,267 fans per game at Arizona Stadium, which holds 57,400. This year's mark stands at No. 3 in school history, behind the record season attendance average of 56,562 in 1994 and the 55,798 in 2006. The current average includes advanced sellouts against Iowa and Washington, with another possible this week against in-state rival Arizona State. At the start of the week, around 1,000 tickets remained for the annual Big Game between the rivals. Arizona is 4-2 at home this season and 16-5 in the last 21 games at Arizona Stadium.

**Three in a Row**

Arizona has secured a bowl appearance for the third-consecutive season for just the second time in program history. The last time the Cats tripped to the postseason in three straight years was from 1992-1994. The '92 squad started the streak with an appearance in the John Hancock Bowl, which was followed up by the 1993 club's Fiesta Bowl season and the 1994 team's Freedom Bowl berth. Meanwhile, this year's Wildcats also have their eyes fixed on taking down rival Arizona State for a third-consecutive season. The last time that happened was also with the 1992-94 group. If the Cats take down ASU this week, it would return the favor that the Sun Devils handed to the Wildcats from 2005-07, as ASU downed Arizona three straight times.

**Hall Emerging Quickly**

Sophomore safety Adam Hall has emerged as a key playmaker on defense this season after playing mostly special teams as a true freshman in 2009. Hall has an interception in each of the last two games against USC and Oregon. He has moved up to No. 4 on the team with 47 total tackles on the season, which includes 3.0 for loss. Hall is a big hitter who has good range in pass coverage. Consistency will continue to be a primary goal for Hall, like any young player. But the 6-foot-4, 205-pounder is emerging as perhaps the top playmaker in the secondary.

**Plugging the Middle**

Two unheralded players in UA's defense are tackles Lolomana Mikaele and Justin Washington. Mikaele is a fifth-year senior co-captain, while Washington is a rookie as a redshirt freshman. Mikaele has 29 tackles on the season, paced by 6.5 tackles for loss and 0.5 sacks. Washington, who missed two games with a knee injury, has 40 tackles, including 8.5 for loss and 4.0 sacks. Combined, that's 69 tackles and 17.0 tackles for loss for the two primary inside guys.

## Rushing To Success

With the skill personnel Arizona has on offense, it's not going to be a run-it-down-your-throat kind of team every down. It would be crazy to waste the talent at QB and WR. But Arizona seems to find its success when it is able to run the ball – or at least tries to run the ball. In UA's seven wins, the Wildcats average 160.1 yards on the ground compared to 94.0 in losses. Interestingly, the yards per carry aren't far off. In wins, the Cats rush for 4.3 yards per tote compared to an even 4.0 clip in losses. The difference could very well be in the balance of play calling. In wins, the Wildcats have run the ball 259 total times compared to 240 pass attempts. In losses, the balance shifts dramatically in favor of the pass with 196 throwing attempts compared to 95 rush attempts. Certainly some of that has to do with playing fourth-quarter catch-up, but it also means that in a close game the Wildcats should stick to running the ball on occasion so not to fall behind in the time of possession battle. In UA's four losses, opponents have held the ball for an average of 35:22, while the Cats possessed the ball for just 24:38. That's more than 10 minutes per game without the ball.

## Rushing to Success II

The spread offense has taken over college football in recent seasons and the Wildcats jumped on the bandwagon with Sonny Dykes and his staff in 2007. With it came a record-setting passing season for Arizona in 2007 and back-to-back eight-win seasons in 2008 and 2009. But the Wildcats have found their success most consistent in running the football, not tossing it around for 300-plus yards per game. Not coincidentally, a more consistent ground game the last few seasons has helped the Wildcats win more games. Consider this rush of facts:

- Arizona is 8-10 in games when it passes for 300+ yards since the start of 2006
- Arizona is 6-2 in games when its opponent throws for 300+ yards in a game since '06
- Arizona is 26-8 in games when it rushes for 100+ yards in a game since '06
- Arizona is just 13-22 in games when its opponent rushes for 100+ yards in a game since '06
- Only five teams have beat UA when rushing for less than 100 yards since the start of '06
- UA is 15-1 in the last 16 games when holding an opponent under 100 net rushing yards

## Big Play Juron

Wide receiver Juron Criner turned in a breakout season as a sophomore a year ago when he emerged as UA's big-play threat on the outside. His 2010 debut, which included a 10-catch, 176-yard performance, showed he has taken further steps to becoming one of the nation's most outstanding receivers. The 6-foot-4, 210-pounder is on the Biletnikoff preseason watch list and should be on that list as it narrows down throughout the season. Here are some quick hits on Juron Criner:

## Foles Making a Name for Himself

Arizona junior quarterback Nick Foles continues to show why he is one of the top quarterbacks in the nation. An honorable mention all-league pick as a first-year starter in 2009. This summer, he was one of four QBs (Jake Locker, Andrew Luck and Matt Barkley) selected by the Pac-10 office to represent the league in East Coast media days in New York and at ESPN headquarters in Bristol, Conn. Voted by teammates as a team captain, Foles kicked off his junior campaign in style with a record setting performance at Toledo and set what could set up to be a special junior campaign. ## Don't Confuse Your 2's

Arizona has a handful of regular players that share duplicate numbers. Perhaps the most troublesome for those high in the press box to identify is UA's pair of 2's. Junior running back Keola Antolin is the guy you'll see making the plays on offense in the running game and passing game, and he may make a foray onto a kick return team. His number-sharing teammate is a guy that will make plays on the side of the ball – Mike Turner. Turner is a speedster on special teams that is adept at creating big plays, particular in punt coverage. He has two forced fumbles on punt plays in 2010, and was the man who recovered a muffed punt against ASU in 2009 that set up UA's last-second game-winning field goal. He'll also be featured at cornerback in UA's dime packages in passing situations. Certainly a valuable multi-talented player who has been in the program for five seasons.

## Don't Confuse Those 3's, 4's, 5's, 6's and 14's

A few other bothersome duplicate numbers to consider: The primary No. 3 for UA is senior safety Anthony Wilcox. Often an overlooked part of UA's defense, he's played steady in his six games this season, and he'll appear on a coverage team once in a while, too. The other No. 3 is running back Daniel Jenkins. He's an elusive runner who you'll mostly see on UA's kick return team as an upback. But he may field a short kick at some point ... The No. 4 is shared by quarterback Matt Scott and freshman defensive back Marquis Flowers. Scott will be easy to pick out when he's in the game on offense, but you'll find Flowers on several UA special teams units and in various defensive coverage packages throughout a game ... The No. 5 is shared by senior running back Nic Grigsby and freshman defensive back Shaquille Richardson. If you see a No. 5 in the game on defense or special teams, it's the talented corner Richardson, who is featured prominently in UA's dime defense and made his first career start at Washington State... The No. 6 is used by WR/KR Traivs Cobb and freshman DB Jonathan McKnight. On coverage teams and perhaps in the secondary is where you'll find McKnight ... Place kicker Alex Zendejas is the prominent No. 14 in kicking situations, but you'll find No. 14 Richard Morrison, an inside WR, on offensive plays and perhaps on some non-place kicking special teams units.

## Turnover Fortunes

Arizona's success on the gridiron hinges greatly on its fortunes in the turnover battle, particularly on the road. Since the start of the 2006 season (56 total games), the Wildcats are an impressive 15-3 when they win the turnover battle in a game. Conversely, they struggle to a 6-14 mark in games when they lose the critical battle. The Cats linger just over .500 in games they split the turnover margin with a 13-10 mark. In multiple miscue games, Arizona is just 14-16 when it turns the ball over two or more times, but has benefitted with a 12-3 clip when opponents turn it over twice or more in a game. But perhaps the most notable statistical trend as it relates to turnovers is the fact that the Cats are 0-10 when they lose the turnover battle on the road. At the same time, UA is 12-5 away from the home when it wins or splits the turnover battle.

## Moving the Chains

The Wildcats' offensive attack the last several years has been very good at moving the chains and keeping drives alive. A good game in this category includes accumulating 20 or more first downs in a game. When the Cats reach that mark, they are 17-8 over the last 38 games and 22-9 since the start of the 2006 season. At the same time, keeping opponents under that mark is critical, too. UA has captured 25 of its 34 victories over the last four years by keeping opponents under 20 first downs in a game. If UA gets 20 and keeps its opponents below that number in the same game, the Cats win better than 80-percent of the time (16-3 record).

## Game of Possession

While not always the case, maintaining possession of the football is a sign that one's offense is moving the ball and its defense is doing a sound job controlling the opposing offense. That has usually been the case for the Wildcats, although some quirky games (such as a 23:32 edge in possession at Oregon in 2008) skew TOP from being a perfect stat. Even so, Arizona is 25-7 since the start of 2006 when it has a positive margin in time of possession and struggles to just a 9-19 mark when its opponents keeps the ball longer. For games in which the opponent controls the ball four or more minutes longer than the Cats yields a 4-16 record for the Cardinal and Navy. When the tables are turned and UA has the four-plus minutes of possession, the Cats are 17-6.

## Pac-10 Players of the Week

**Jake Fischer (Nov. 1, Special Teams)** keyed Arizona's special teams in a 29-21 victory at UCLA on Oct. 30. The sophomore linebacker picked up 29 yards on a fake punt on 4th-and-3 from UA's own 27-yard line midway through the fourth quarter. The play extended the possession and flip field position in favor of the Wildcats, who led by five points at the time. Fischer added two tackles on kickoff coverage in the game, too ... **Matt Scott (Oct. 25, Offense)**, who started in place of injured Nick Foles, sparked the Arizona offense to its most well-balanced performance of the season as Arizona rolled up 467 yards of offense, including 234 on the ground and 233 through the air. Scott completed 18-of-22 pass attempts for 233 yards and two touchdowns, while turning in UA's first interception-free game of the season on offense. Scott's pass efficiency rating for the game was 200.78, the best mark since Willie Tuitama's 201.84 against Washington State in 2008 ... **Paul Vassallo (Oct. 25, Defense)** headlined another standout performance by the Arizona defense, which shut out Washington in the second half. A junior college transfer who began his UA career last spring, Vassallo collected a career-high 14 tackles in the game, including nine solo stops, to go with a sack. His tackle total was the highest for a Wildcat defender since Xavier Kelley's 15-tackle effort against BYU in the 2008 Las Vegas Bowl... **Shaquille Richardson (Oct. 18, Defense)** was sensational at Washington State in his first career start. Richardson headlined a solid defensive effort as he intercepted two passes, broke up three others and registered seven tackles – all solo stops. UA defeated WSU, 24-7, limiting the Cougars to a season-low in points, the fourth time in 2010 that the UA defense held the opposition to single digits ... **Nick Foles (Sept. 20, Offense)** completed 28-of-39 passes for 303 yards and two touchdowns to help guide the Wildcats to a 34-27 upset of then-No. 9 Iowa on Sept. 18. The performance earned him the conference's weekly award for the second time in his career after he garnered the honor following a career-high 415 yards in a victory over Stanford a season ago. The 6-foot-5, 245-pound signal caller engineered the game-winning drive in the fourth quarter after the Hawkeyes had tied the game, 27-27. The Wildcats took over on their own 28-yard line with 8:07 remaining in the game. Foles marched the Wildcats down the field, ignited by a 38-yard pass play to a diving David Roberts that put the Wildcats in Hawkeyes' territory. The drive was capped by a four-yard touchdown pass to Bug Wright on a third-and-goal from the four-yard line, giving UA a 34-27 lead ... **Travis Cobb (Sept. 20, Special Teams)** turned in his second career kickoff return for a touchdown in a Sept. 18 upset over Iowa, earning his first Pac-10 Player of the Week honor. After Iowa had cut UA's lead to 14-7 in the second quarter, Cobb took the ensuing kickoff 100 yards to put the Wildcats comfortably back on top by two touchdowns. The 100-yard dash tied for

the longest kickoff return in program history and surpassed the 95-yard touchdown return he had a season ago against Washington State. That play snapped an 11-year drought between kickoff return scores for Arizona, which had last returned a kickoff for a score in the season opener of the 1998 season when Chris McAlister returned the opening kick 100 yards at Hawaii.

### In the Nick of Time

Arizona junior quarterback Nick Foles is becoming well known for his poise and perseverance in tough situations. After all, he's already experienced the highs and lows of the position. As a first-year starter in 2009, he endured two of the flukiest plays a quarterback could ever experience in heartbreaking road losses at Washington and California. But, Foles has been spectacular in some of the other tense situations he has faced, including the Sept. 18 showdown against then-No. 9 Iowa and a week later against California. In the five games listed below, Foles has a combined 4th quarter pass efficiency rating of 163.73, including a 168.02 mark in the two games in 2010. Those numbers are significantly higher than his respectable 131.65 career pass efficiency rating.

Sept. 26, 2009

Arizona 37, Oregon State 32

**The situation:** With Foles making his first career start, Arizona trailed the Beavers, 17-14, at halftime in Corvallis, Ore. ... Foles turned in a sensational second half, completing 15-of-22 passes for 167 yards and two touchdowns in the period ... The Wildcats surged to a road victory and Foles has started every game since for the Wildcats.

Oct. 17, 2009

Arizona 43, Stanford 38

**The situation:** One week after seeing a victory vanish on a controversial deflected interception that gave Washington a victory in Seattle, Foles made his first start in the home uniforms at Arizona Stadium ... The Wildcats trailed 27-20 at halftime and by as many as 15 points earlier in the first half ... Foles was nearly flawless in the second half, completing 21-of-27 passes for 203 yards and touchdown as UA rallied for the victory ... Foles was a perfect 8-for-8 passing in the final stanza, outdueling the Cardinal's Andrew Luck as both threw for over 400 yards in the game.

Dec. 5, 2009

Arizona 21, No. 20 USC 17

**The situation:** After guiding the Cats to a 14-7 halftime lead, Foles and the Wildcats found themselves trailing 17-14 with 7:13 remaining in the fourth quarter ... With the ball on their own 20 yard line, the Wildcats marched 80 yards in 10 plays for the game-winning score ... Foles was 4-of-7 passing on the drive for 63 yards, capped by an audible at the line that resulted in a 37-yard touchdown pass to Juron Criner ... Foles was 2-of-2 passing on third downs on the final drive.

Arizona 34, No. 9 Iowa 27

**The situation:** Iowa defensive end Broderick Binns made an exceptionally athletic interception and returned it 20 yards to cap a 20-point rally by the Hawkeyes, who tied the Wildcats at 27-all after trailing 27-7 at halftime ... With the lead and momentum gone, Foles countered with the game-winning drive ... Taking over at UA's own 28-yard line with 8:12 remaining, Foles hit David Roberts for a 38-yard gain on the first play of the drive ... He capped the drive with a clutch throw to Bug Wright on third-and-goal from the four that put the Wildcats ahead for good ... Foles was 5-of-6 for 76 yards on the game-winning series.

Sept. 25, 2010

Arizona 10, California 9

**The situation:** California kept the Wildcats' offense at bay throughout the game, but UA's defense limited the Golden Bears to three field goals ... Cal looked to extend the game to a two-possession contest, but a 40-yard field goal with under three minutes to play gave Nick Foles and the offense a chance at redemption ... Foles and the Wildcats marched 77 yards on seven plays in 1:26 to tie the game and an extra point gave the Wildcats their first lead of the game with just 1:11 remaining in the game ... RECAP: Arizona managed to overcome its worst offensive output of the year with a pair of special teams plays late in the fourth quarter and win a key seventh game and the Territorial Cup at Arizona State, 20-17. The final play – a 32-yard field goal by sophomore Alex Zendejas (named Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week on Monday by the league office), on the field where his uncle, Max Zendejas, pulled off similar feats – made the ultimate difference. The previous play, a 40-yard punt muffed by ASU return man Kyle Williams and recovered by cover man Mike Turner at the ASU 22-yard line, made Zendejas' kick possible. Williams otherwise would have been the Bob Moran Most Outstanding Player in the game – with nine catches for 130 yards and two touchdowns, but that went to UA running back Keola Antolin, whose 67-yard scamper for a first-quarter score gave Arizona a lead that lasted 58 minutes. Arizona struggled on third down (2 for 16), but did the same to ASU (3 for 16) and both teams blew one of three red zone opportunities. Arizona managed only 265 yards in offense throughout the game, with QB Nick Foles completing 24 of 43 passes for a mere 148 yards and no touchdown throw for the first time in his career (streak halted at 10 games). The Cats suffered five three-and-outs, but forced ASU into six. UA held ASU to 86 rushing yards, but let a couple of big plays by Williams make the Devils' air attack competitive, especially when his diving catch led to a fourth-quarter tie, 17-17, with two minutes left. UA could not muster any offense on its subsequent possession and Keenyn Crier lined up for the aforementioned punt. This time the football fortunes fell on Arizona's side. There was one tur

# Game 1: Arizona 41, Toledo 2

Sept. 3, 2010 | Toledo, Ohio (Glass Bowl) | Attendance: 25,907

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP) -Nick Foles threw for 360 yards and accounted for three touchdowns to help Arizona pound Toledo 41-2 on Friday night.

Foles tossed two TD passes and ran for another score as the Wildcats recorded their first road victory outside the Pac-10 in nine seasons. Nic Grigsby added two touchdown runs.

Foles completed 32 of 37 passes with an interception that occurred when a ball went off the hands of running back Taimi Tutogi and bounced to Toledo defensive back Diauntae Morrow.

He showed a nice touch on his first touchdown throw, lofting a 9-yard pass over a defender and into the hands of tight end David Douglas, who got one foot down in the back of end zone with 8:40 left in the first quarter.

Foles completed five passes for 58 yards on the opening drive, but the Wildcats didn't do much after that until late in the first half.

Grigsby, who struggled with a shoulder injury last season, scored on a nifty 36-yard run, cutting across the middle and outracing two Rockets to corner of the end zone, capping a nine-play, 91-yard drive and giving Arizona a 14-2 lead.

One play later, Derek Earls picked off Austin Dantin's pass over the middle to get the ball back for the Wildcats. Foles scored on a 1-yard run with just 17 seconds left in the half, making it 21-2.

Arizona's speedy bunch of receivers seemed to be open on nearly play. Juron Criner led the way, finishing with 11 catches for 187 yards and a touchdown.

Arizona's young defense, with seven new starters, including all three linebackers, did a nice job limiting the Rockets to 80 yards rushing, including just 16 yards in the first half.

It was quite an improvement for a defense that coach Mike Stoops said looked terrible in a team scrimmage two weeks ago.

Toledo had the top offense in the Mid-American Conference a year ago, but it did little right against the Wildcats. Dantin was 14-of-23 passing for 103 yards.

Toledo's only score of the night came when Arizona lineman Conan Amituanai was called for holding in the end zone, giving the Rockets the safety.

Arizona hadn't ventured this far for opener since going to Penn State in 1999. It also was the first time a Pac-10 team has played at a Mid-American Conference stadium.

# Game 2: Arizona 52, The Citadel 6

Sept. 11, 2010 | Tucson, Ariz. (Arizona Stadium) | Attendance: 54,814

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP)-Nic Grigsby rushed for three touchdowns, including a career-long 62-yard scoring run, and ARIZONA routed The Citadel 52-6 in the Wildcats' home opener on Saturday night.

Nick Foles completed 17 of 22 for passes for 214 yards and one touchdown before calling it a night early in the third quarter as the Wildcats (2-0) rolled for 489 yards in a tuneup for next Saturday's home game against No. 9 Iowa.

Grigsby rushed for 107 yards in 11 carries and boosted his career rushing touchdown total to 25, tied for third-most in ARIZONA history.

The Citadel (1-1), a member of the Football Championship Subdivision (formerly NCAA Division I-AA) Southern Conference, played a Pac-10 team for the first time.

Matt Thompson, freshman quarterback in the Bulldogs' triple-option offense, fumbled the ball twice to set up ARIZONA touchdowns late in the first half and early in the second.

ARIZONA third-stringer Greg Nwoko gained 72 yards in seven carries, including touchdown runs of 23 and 3 yards.

The Wildcats, who opened their season with a 41-2 win at Toledo, have outscored their first two opponents 93-5. Sam Keeler's 39-yard field goal with 6:55 left in the third quarter for The Citadel provided the first offensive points against ARIZONA this season. Keeler also had a 23-yarder.

After a slow start, ARIZONA scored on consecutive possessions at the end of the first quarter and start of the second.

Foles' 44-yard pass to Juron Criner highlighted a six-play, 60-yard drive that put the Wildcats up 7-0 on Grigsby's 3-yard scoring run. Criner caught Foles' long pass, bounced off a would-be tackler, then broke downfield to the Bulldogs' 3.

ARIZONA went 84-yards on 12 plays the next time it had the ball. Foles threw to Bug Wright in the back of the end zone for the touchdown to make it 14-0 with 12:58 left to go in the half. Foles completed 5 of 6 passes on the drive for 69 yards.

Alex Zendejas' 41-yard field goal with 2:25 left in the half made it 17-0. The first play after the subsequent kickoff, Thompson fumbled and Paul Vassallo recovered for ARIZONA at The Citadel 22. Foles threw over the middle to Wright to the 1-yard line, and Grigsby took it in from there to put the Wildcats up 24-0 25 seconds before the half.

ARIZONA scored two touchdowns in a 27-second span the first two minutes of the second half.

Grigsby's 62-yard run one play after the second-half kickoff made it 31-0. Although the senior tailback has a 94-yard run in his career, the 62-yarder was his longest for a touchdown.

The first play after the subsequent kickoff, Thompson's bad pitch was recovered by Derek Earls for ARIZONA at the Bulldogs' 23. Nwoko went 23 yards for the score on the next play to put ARIZONA ahead 38-0 with 12:23 still left in the third quarter.

# Game 3: No. 24 Arizona 34, No. 9 Iowa 27

Sept. 18, 2010 | Tucson, Ariz. (Arizona Stadium) | Attendance: 57,864

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Nick Foles hit William Wright with a late 4-yard touchdown pass and No. 24 Arizona held its ground in the national spotlight with a momentum-swinging 34-27 win over ninth-ranked Iowa Saturday night.

Arizona (3-0) jumped out to a 20-point halftime lead behind a slew of big plays that included a blocked punt, Travis Cobb's 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown and an interception returned 85 yards by Trevin Wade for another score.

The Wildcats moved 72 yards in nine plays in the second half for the winning score, then sealed what they hope is a program-defining win with four straight sacks of Stanzi.

Foles threw for 303 yards and two touchdowns on 28-of-39 passing.

Iowa rolled over its first two not-so-challenging opponents by a combined score of 72-14. The road trip to the desert represented a little tougher challenge: a long-distance road game (over 1,500 miles) with a late start (9:30 Iowa City time) in hot-air-dryer heat (close to 100 at kickoff).

On top of that, the Hawkeyes were facing a talented Arizona team looking to prove itself against a big-school program in one of the biggest nonconference games in the 81-year history of Arizona Stadium.

The Wildcats were certainly up for it, producing one big play after another in a stadium-rocking first half.

Arizona held Iowa to a quick three-and-out on its first drive, then David Roberts broke through to block Ryan Donahue's punt, which Marquis Flowers recovered at the Hawkeyes 8. Three plays later, Foles hit David Douglas on a 5-yard slant for a touchdown that had the rowdies in red jumping and pumping their white pom-poms.

Iowa was marching on its second drive, but receiver Marvin McNutt Jr. had the ball slip through his hands and it fell right to Wade, who had a clear shot to the end zone for an 85-yard score.

Barely five minutes into the game, Iowa was in a 14-0 hole.

The Hawkeyes kept plugging away on offense, moving 93 yards for a 4-yard touchdown pass from Stanzi to Jewel Hampton, the first touchdown against Arizona this season.

Then, boom! another big play: Cobb burst through a seam like one of the pregame fireworks on the ensuing kickoff and was gone, 100 yards for a touchdown that put Arizona up 21-7.

Tacking on two field goals by Alex Zendejas, including a career-long-matching 47-yarder, Arizona had a seemingly comfortable 27-7 halftime lead.

Seemingly.

Turning up the defensive pressure, Iowa stymied Arizona's offense in the third quarter - 58 total yards - and pulled within 13 points on a 37-yard touchdown pass from Stanzi to Derrell Johnson-Koulianos.

Iowa came up with a big play of its own on special teams, recovering a muffed punt by Bug Wright at the Wildcats 18. Stanzi hit McNutt on a backpedaling touchdown pass at the edge of the end zone on the next play, making it 27-21.

Binns followed with his at-the-line grab and return for a score, only to watch in amazement from the sideline as the PAT wobbled away from the uprights. Then it was Foles' turn.

Getting the ball out quickly to avoid Iowa's strengthening rush, the junior completed 4 of 5 passes on the final drive, hitting Wright for the decisive score with 3:57 left. Foles finished with 303 yards and two touchdowns on 28-of-39 passing, solidifying his - and his team's - place among the country's best up-and-comers.

TUCSON, Ariz. - Just when No. 14 Arizona seemed headed for a crushing loss, Nick Foles and Juron Criner finally brought the Wildcats' offense to life.

Foles threw a 3-yard pass over the middle to Criner with 1:11 to play for the game's only touchdown and Arizona escaped with a 10-9 victory over California in their Pac-10 opener on Saturday night.

Just when No. 14 Arizona seemed headed for a crushing loss, Nick Foles and Juron Criner finally brought the Wildcats' offense to life.

Foles threw a 3-yard pass over the middle to Criner with 1:11 to play for the game's only touchdown and Arizona escaped with a 10-9 victory over California in their Pac-10 opener on Saturday night.

The score was set up by Foles' 51-yard pass to Criner, questionable for the game because of a turf toe injury. The 6-foot-4 Criner fought off California's Darian Hagan, who had played smothering pass defense all night, on the big play.

The winning seven-play, 77-yard drive came after California's Giorgio Tavecchio missed a 40-yard field goal try with 2:37 to play. Arizona is 4-0 for the first time since 1998.

A loss would have been devastating for the Wildcats a week after their draining 34-27 home win over then-No. 9 Iowa. Arizona is the only Pac-10 team never to make it to the Rose Bowl.

Arizona has next weekend off.

The Wildcats clinched the victory when Kevin Riley's pass bounced off the hands of Marvin Jones and was intercepted by Joseph Perkins. Perkins fumbled but Robert Golden recovered for Arizona.

It appeared that Tavecchio's field goals of 25, 40 and 23 yards would be enough for the Bears (2-2), who had shut down Arizona's prolific offense a week after giving up 497 yards and being routed 52-31 at Nevada.

The Wildcats helped out with 10 penalties for 99 yards. Foles completed 25 of 39 passes for 212 yards but had two critical first-half turnovers.

His fumble on a sack by Cal's Cameron Jordan on the final play of the first quarter led to the Bears' first field goal. Then, in the final seconds of the half, he was intercepted in the end zone after Arizona had driven to the Cal 13.

Shane Vereen, who had a game-clinching touchdown run in Cal's victory over Arizona a year ago, rushed for 102 yards in 27 carries. He was the workhorse as the Bears drove downfield in the final minutes but Tavecchio's 40-yard field goal try was wide right.

That gave Arizona its last chance.

Tavecchio also had a 40-yard try bounce off the right upright in the third quarter.

Riley was 13 of 26 for 113 yards. The only Cal turnover came on the game-clinching play.

A personal foul penalty called on the Arizona defense, with no individual named by the official, aided California's 11-play, 55-yard drive that ended in Tavecchio's 40-yarder that gave the Bears a 6-0 lead with 5:23 left in the half.

Arizona drove the length of the field after Cal's subsequent kickoff, with a pass interference call against Hagan on a long throw for Criner moving the ball to the California 13 with 45 seconds left on the half.

On the next play, Foles lofted a pass intended for his roommate David Douglas in the right corner of the end zone. California's Marc Anthony deflected the pass and Conte grabbed it, getting a foot down just inbound for the interception.

# Game 5: Oregon State 29, Arizona 27

Oct. 9, 2010 | Tucson, Ariz. (Arizona Stadium) | Attendance: 56,054

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - The Wildcats' Nick Foles completed 35 of 46 for 440 yards and three touchdowns, but Oregon State held on to upset No. 9 Arizona 29-27 on Saturday night.

Add Ryan Katz to the list of impressive Pac-10 quarterbacks.

Oregon State coaches kept things somewhat conservative early in his first season as a starter, then unleashed his strong, accurate arm, along with his elusive scrambling against No. 9 Arizona.

The sophomore from Santa Monica, Calif., threw for 393 yards and two touchdowns, sneaked across for another score and the Beavers held on for a 29-27 upset.

Katz completed 30 of 42 against an Arizona defense that had been ranked No. 2 nationally, giving up 230.8 yards per game. "I just see a lot more confidence in him," Oregon State's Joe Halahuni said. "He's more of a leader off the field and in the huddle. He's doing great running the ball, throwing it and making good decisions."

Three times Katz eluded the pass rush and scrambled for a first down on third-down situations.

The Wildcats (4-1, 1-1 Pac-10), in the top 10 for the first time since the 1999 preseason rankings and coming off a bye week, never led. The loss dampened their hopes for the school's first trip to the Rose Bowl.

The Wildcats' Nick Foles completed 35 of 46 for 440 yards and three touchdowns. "When you look at the entire game, we just weren't all there," Arizona coach Mike Stoops said. "I think we did compete well in the secondary but this was the most yards we've given up in a long time. Oregon State really beat us in a lot of ways. They wanted to throw the ball and they threw it at will, which is very hard to come back from."

Oregon State (3-2, 2-0) lost standout receiver James Rodgers to what could be a season-ending knee injury in the second quarter. He was in street clothes on crutches in the second half after seven catches for 102 yards, including a 33-yarder for the Beavers' first score. Riley said the injury was "not good" and he would know more on Sunday.

Foles' 12-yard touchdown pass to Keola Antolin cut the lead to 29-27 with 1:52 to play but Oregon State recovered the subsequent onside kick attempt. Arizona got the ball on its own 20 with 2 seconds left and tried to use a short pass and a series of laterals to score. But Antolin was stopped at midfield to finish Oregon State's fifth consecutive victory in Tucson.

The teams combined for 1,027 yards in a game that featured five touchdown plays of 33 yards or longer.

Rodgers' younger brother, Jacquizz, rushed for 92 yards in 25 carries and caught three passes for 41 yards. His 1-yard touchdown run with 5:46 to play put the Beavers up 29-20.

James Rodgers made a fingertip catch of Katz's deep pass for what would have been a 56-yard touchdown with 5:07 left in the half. But he was hit by Arizona's Adam Hall as he crossed into the end zone, then went down in pain. He was helped off the field with no weight on his left knee. The score was called back by an ineligible receiver downfield penalty.

Foles connected on touchdown passes of 45, 33 and 12 yards but Katz matched him all the way. The Oregon State coaching staff had held Katz down as he opened his first season as a starter but have unleashed him in the first two Pac-10 games. He threw for 260 yards in the Beavers' 31-28 victory over Arizona State a week ago.

The Wildcats took the second-half kickoff and went 66 yards in just two minutes before Antolin scored on a 33-yard run. The point after attempt was blocked and it was 17-13.

OSU responded with an 11-play, 65-yard scoring drive that finished with Katz sneaking over from the 1. But Justin Kahut's extra point try was no good, giving the Beavers a 23-13 lead. He also missed the kick after the last OSU touchdown.

Nic Grigsby took a swing pass from Foles and weaved through traffic 41 yards for a touchdown that cut the Beavers' lead to 23-20 with 3:20 left in the third quarter. The Beavers responded with a 10-play, 80-yard drive, culminating with Jacquizz Rodgers' touchdown run.

Antolin ran for 92 yards and two touchdowns, and Grigsby added 66 yards and another score as the Wildcats beat Washington State 24-7 Saturday to remain in contention for the Pac-10 title.

Foles, the league's leading passer, will be out at least two weeks with a sprained knee, coach Mike Stoops said. Backup Matt Scott played nearly three quarters against the Cougars.

"You always have two quarterbacks ready," Stoops said. "Matt was OK, a little rusty."

Arizona (5-1, 2-1 Pac-10) ran 47 times for 142 yards, far above the averages for the league's top passing team.

"We wanted to come out and establish the run game, and that's what we did," said Antolin, who had his best outing of the season.

Despite the win, Stoops was unhappy with inconsistent offensive play that allowed Washington State (1-6, 0-4) to remain within striking distance much of the game.

"We have to play better than we did tonight," Stoops said.

Arizona managed only 352 yards of offense and 24 points against a defense that was giving up more than 500 yards and 42 per game. The Cougars recorded six sacks.

On the flip side, Washington State had just 297 offensive yards and failed to reach double digits in scoring for the first time this season.

"Missed opportunities and points left on the field," offensive lineman B.J. Guerra said.

"We've got to put it together," defensive end Travis Long added.

Foles was injured with 14:07 left in the second quarter when Long was tripped and rolled into his right leg, knocking him to the ground after a completed pass. Foles limped off the field, supported between two Arizona officials.

Scott completed 14 of 20 passes for 139 yards, but was intercepted once and sacked five times.

Washington State has lost 12 straight Pac-10 games dating to 2008, and has beaten only Montana State this season. But its passing attack continued to improve, with quarterback Jeff Tuel completing 18 of 32 passes for 257 yards, despite being sacked seven times. Freshman Marquess Wilson caught six passes for 131 yards.

Antolin scored on a 9-yard run late in the first for a 7-0 Arizona lead.

Foles had started the first eight plays of their second scoring drive when he was injured. Scott directed the team over the final 37 yards, with Antolin running up the middle from the 1-yard line for a 14-0 lead.

Arizona threatened in the closing minutes of the first half, moving 71 yards to the 19, but Scott was intercepted by Casey Locker in the final seconds to kill the drive.

Arizona's 14-0 lead was the first time this season that Washington State was shut out in the first half.

The Wildcats got a break early in the third when Washington State punter Reid Forrest fumbled the snap deep in his own territory. Khyri Knowles dove on the ball at the 7 and, on the first play, Grigsby ran in for a 21-0 lead.

Washington State got on the scoreboard when Tuel hit Wilson with a 23-yard touchdown strike late in the third.

But the Cougars blew a chance to tighten the game after they stopped Antolin on fourth-and-1 on the first play of the fourth quarter. Running back James Montgomery took a handoff and then threw a backward pass that was deflected by Arizona's Brooks Reed and recovered by D'Aundre Reed. Alex Zendejas eventually kicked a 40-yard field goal for a 24-7 lead.

Tuel connected with Wilson for an 83-yard gain midway through the fourth, giving the Cougars the ball on Arizona's 12 and Wilson the fourth 100-yard game of his rookie season. But Tuel was intercepted in the end zone to kill the threat.

The game was also costly for Washington State. The Cougars lost offensive lineman David Gonzales to a broken left arm and cornerback Damante Horton to a sprained knee.

# Game 7: Arizona 44, Washington 14

Oct. 23, 2010 | Tucson, Ariz. (Arizona Stadium) | Attendance: 56,244

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Nic Grigsby and Keola Antolin ran for two touchdowns apiece, Matt Scott had no trouble replacing Nick Foles and No. 15 Arizona easily handled up-and-down Washington 44-14 Saturday night.

Arizona (6-1, 3-1 Pac-10) overcame occasionally poor tackling with a balanced offense and by harassing Jake Locker into an ineffective game.

Scott held his own after Foles went down with a knee injury last week against Washington State and looked like he was the starter all along against the other Evergreen State school. He threw for 233 yards and two touchdowns, including a fumble-the-snap, 21-yard heave to Juron Criner in the fourth quarter, and added 65 yards on seven carries.

Washington (3-4, 2-2) continued its season-long, win-one, lose-one pattern, following last week's thrilling double-overtime victory over then-No. 24 Oregon State with a defensive clunker.

Locker finished 17 of 29 for 183 yards with a touchdown and lost 24 yards on six carries before being replaced by Keith Price early in the fourth quarter.

Antolin finished with 114 yards on 14 carries and Criner caught eight passes for 108 yards to give Arizona its best start since opening the 1998 season 6-1.

The Wildcats had hoped to be on better footing than last year's game at Washington.

Arizona lost what's now known as the "Shoe" game in Seattle when Mason Foster returned an interception 37 yards for the go-ahead touchdown after the ball caromed off the size 14 1/2 cleat of Arizona's Delashaun Dean. The Wildcats disputed the call - Dean said it hit the ground - but were kicking themselves more for being in position to cough up a 12-point lead in the final four minutes.

Arizona made sure it didn't get tripped up by a close call this time by steamrolling Washington's noodle-strainer defense - 199 points the past five games - for 467 total yards.

The only question mark came early; Taimi Tutogi fumbled on Arizona's opening drive and Locker marched the Huskies for a quick score, rolling left and throwing across his body for a drop-it-in-there 26-yard touchdown to Jermaine Kearse in the corner of the endzone.

After that, all Arizona almost all the time.

Led by Scott, the Wildcats carved up Washington's 98th-ranked defense, piling up 356 total yards on their way to a 30-14 halftime lead.

Scott looked a lot like Locker on Arizona's first score, rolling left and throwing across his body for a 17-yard touchdown to David Roberts. He then led the Wildcats to a 29-yard field goal by Alex Zendejas and set up Antolin's first TD, a 1-yard dive left, with a 32-yard rumble on an option.

Locker tried to rally the Huskies by setting up Chris Polk's 7-yard touchdown run, but the defense parted on the next play, allowing Antolin to burst up the middle for a 78-yard touchdown.

The Wildcats still weren't done.

Grigsby capped the first half with a 4-yard touchdown run and opened the second with another after Ricky Elmore stripped Locker and the Wildcats recovered.

Scott added a put-it-out-of-reach scoring pass early in the fourth quarter, dropping the snap out of the shotgun and firing a TD strike to Criner just before being laid out on a roughing the passer call.

The starter over Foles the first three games of 2009, Scott finished an efficient 18 of 22 and gave Arizona a confidence boost if Foles isn't ready to play next week at UCLA.

# Game 8: Arizona 29, UCLA 21

## Oct. 30, 2010 | Pasadena, Calif. (Rose Bowl) | Attendance: 53,408

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) - Backup Matt Scott had another big game, passing for a career-high 319 yards, and No. 15 Arizona held off UCLA 29-21 on Saturday to remain in contention for its first Pac-10 championship.

Scott was 24 of 36 with one interception and one touchdown. The junior also carried 12 times for 71 yards.

Scott threw for 233 yards and ran for another 65 in a 44-14 victory over Washington last weekend filling in for Nick Foles, who sprained his right knee two weeks ago. Foles might be healthy enough to return next Saturday when the Wildcats play at No. 13 Stanford.

Keola Antolin rushed for 111 yards on 23 carries for the Wildcats (7-1, 4-1 Pac-10), off to their best start since winning seven of their first eight games en route to a 12-1 finish in 1998.

Richard Brehaut passed for a career-best 228 yards and two touchdowns for the Bruins (3-5, 1-4), who lost their third straight game but performed much better than in their last two, when they were outscored 95-20 at California and Oregon.

UCLA entered ranked 117th among the 120 FBS schools in yards passing with an average of just 104.6 per game.

The Wildcats rolled up a season-high 583 yards and 32 first downs and held the Bruins to 299 yards and 15 first downs, but didn't put the game away until the final minute.

UCLA played without starting quarterback Kevin Prince, who underwent season-ending knee surgery Oct. 23, and standout linebacker Patrick Larimore, sidelined with an injured left shoulder. The Bruins were also without wide receiver Ricky Marvray and offensive tackle Sean Sheller, a pair of starters serving one-game suspensions for violating team rules.

Completely outplayed in the first half, UCLA trimmed Arizona's lead to 19-14 on the fourth play of the third quarter on a 68-yard completion from Brehaut to Randall Carroll - the Bruins' longest touchdown pass since 2007.

But the Wildcats responded with an 80-yard drive capped by Greg Nwoko's 1-yard run.

Neither team threatened again until Brehaut's 49-yard pass to Josh Smith on a flea flicker with 14:24 remaining capped an 86-yard drive and moved UCLA within five points. There wasn't a defender within 10 yards of Smith when he made the reception and trotted into the end zone as the Rose Bowl crowd of 53,408 roared its approval.

UCLA reached the Arizona 34 with 9 1/2 minutes to play, but Smith lost 9 yards on a flanker reverse and the Bruins were forced to punt. The Bruins got the ball with 3:14 remaining at their 20 after a punt, but turned the ball over on downs, putting the Wildcats in position for Alex Zendejas' 30-yard field goal with 1:18 left.

The Bruins reached their 46 before Brehaut fumbled while being sacked and Slone Tuihalamaka recovered.

# Game 9: Stanford 42, Arizona 17

No.v 6, 2010 | Stanford, Calif. (Stanford Stadium) | Attendance: 43,506

STANFORD, Calif. (AP) - Andrew Luck threw for 293 yards and two touchdowns, leading No. 10 Stanford to a 42-17 victory in its highly anticipated showdown with 13th-ranked Arizona on Saturday night.

Stepfan Taylor added four short touchdown runs for the Cardinal (8-1, 5-1 Pac-10), who won easily in the first meeting with Arizona (7-2, 4-2) when both teams were ranked.

Luck lead the offense, which put up six touchdowns and 516 yards against the stingiest defense in the Pac-10. Chris Owusu was especially dangerous with nine catches for 165 yards and a score, as well as a key 12-yard run. Stanford also allowed no sacks to a team that led the league with 27 coming into the game.

The defense also did a good job against the Wildcats, who didn't get the offense moving until it was far too late despite the return of injured quarterback Nick Foles.

Foles threw for 248 yards, one touchdown and one interception, with his biggest success coming when the Wildcats went to the no-huddle offense with a big deficit in the second half. Keola Antolin ran for 86 yards and another score on a night starting running back Nic Grigsby played sparingly because of a sprained right ankle.

The Cardinal were still smarting over last year's loss at Arizona, when they allowed two big fourth-quarter touchdown runs in a 43-38 shootout. They built a 21-3 halftime lead in the rematch and didn't let up. Stanford scored on its opening drive of the second half on a 5-yard shovel pass from Luck to Tyler Gaffney to make it 28-3.

Stanford then answered Arizona's first touchdown of the game - a 7-yard pass from Foles to Juron Criner - with a 78-yard drive capped by Taylor's third TD run to make it 35-10 and give the Cardinal their ninth straight 30-point game. Taylor added his fourth TD with 3:23 to go to make it 42-17.

Stanford got off to a strong start against an Arizona defense that has had plenty of success so far this season but hadn't faced the most dangerous offenses in the conference from Stanford, Oregon and USC.

On the opening drive of the game, Owusu got behind the Wildcats' secondary for a 45-yard touchdown pass from Luck to make it 7-0.

Taylor added a pair of TD runs in the second quarter to build the lead to 21-3 at the break. The first capped an 89-yard drive that featured an 18-yard pass from Luck to Owusu on third-and-15. The second came after Owusu gained 12 yards on a perfectly executed option play by Luck.

The Wildcats blew a couple of good scoring opportunities. They drove to the 20 on their opening drive but Foles was called for intentional grounding at the 34 and Arizona punted. A.J. Simmons dropped a potential first-down catch at the 10, stalling another drive that led to a field goal by Alex Zendejas.

Foles then drove Arizona to the 27 late in the half before he was intercepted by Richard Sherman.

# Game 10: USC 24, Arizona 21

Nov. 13, 2010 | Tucson, Ariz. (Arizona Stadium) | Attendance: 54,722

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Marc Tyler barely practiced last week because of an injured ankle, then put on a workhorse performance befitting the great Southern California tailbacks of years gone by.

Tyler, who said his workouts last week were limited to "a little bit on Thursday," ran for 160 yards on 31 carries, both career highs, and Southern California climbed into a tie with Arizona for third in the Pac-10 with a 24-21 victory over the 18th-ranked Wildcats on Saturday night.

The junior, son of former UCLA great Wendell Tyler, has three career 100-yard rushing games, all this season. He said he's finally learned to go "north and south" rather than trying to be fancy. He said sitting out the practices helped him handle so many carries.

Matt Barkley passed for one touchdown and sneaked for another as the Trojans (7-3, 4-3 Pac-10) jumped ahead 14-0 and never relinquished the lead.

The Wildcats' Nick Foles threw for 353 yards and three touchdowns, the last an 11-yarder to David Douglas with 1:01 to play. But USC recovered the subsequent onside kick to preserve the victory. Arizona (7-3, 4-3) lost its second in a row and next plays at No. 1 Oregon. The Wildcats were blown out at Stanford 42-17 last weekend.

USC, which won its sixth straight in Tucson, rushed for 206 yards and had the ball almost 15 minutes longer than the Wildcats did. Foles completed 32 of 48 with no interceptions in his second start after missing two games with a knee injury. Barkley was 21 of 35 for 170 yards with one interception. Neither team punted in the first half as USC took a 21-14 lead.

Barkley and Foles each completed 13 of their first 15 passes, but a fumble by the Arizona quarterback and a missed 34-yard field goal by the Wildcats' Alex Zendejas paved the way for an early 14-0 Trojans lead.

Arizona, which used an Oregon-style, hurry-up offense throughout, went 80 yards in nine plays to cut it to 14-7, Foles throwing five yards to David Douglas for the score.

The Trojans then used up almost nine minutes with a 17-play, 66-yard drive that ended with Tyler's 3-yard touchdown run to put USC ahead 21-7 with 3:43 left in the half.

With the drive stalled at the Arizona 11, the USC field goal team went on the field, but Mitch Mustain took the snap from center and threw to Jordan Cameron for the first down. Tyler scored two plays later on a 3-yard run.

Arizona quickly drove for a touchdown before the half ended. Foles threw 31 yards to Travis Cobb for a touchdown to cap another 80-yard scoring drive and slice the lead to 21-14 with 1:24 left.

The Wildcats forced the game's first punt on the opening possession of the second half. With a couple of big third-down catches by Juron Criner, Arizona drove to the Trojans 19, but Douglas fumbled at the 15 and Shareece Wright recovered for USC.

The Trojans used up another 6 1/2 minutes driving to the Arizona 13, where Joe Houston's 30-yard field goal boosted the lead to 24-14 with 3:35 left in the third.

The Wildcats were in a hole in a hurry.

After Zendejas' miss on Arizona's opening possession, Barkley went 5-for-5 on a 10-play, 80-yard drive that ended with his 1-yard sneak for the score.

Arizona kept the ball for just four plays after the subsequent kickoff when Wright sacked Foles, who fumbled and USC's DaJohn Harris recovered at the Wildcats 22, setting up Barkley's 7-yard TD pass to Rhett Ellison to put the Trojans ahead 14-0 with 1:34 still left in the opening quarter.

# Game 11: Oregon 48, Arizona 29

Nov. 26, 2010 | Eugene, Ore. (Autzen Stadium) | Attendance: 59,990

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) --Darron Thomas passed for three touchdowns and ran for another and top-ranked Oregon earned at least a share of a second consecutive Pac-10 title with a 48-29 victory over No. 20 Arizona on Friday night.

LaMichael James shrugged off talk of an injury to run for 126 yards and two scores for the Ducks (11-0, 8-0), who trailed 19-14 at halftime but surged in the second half to stay on course for a trip to the BCS national title game.

The Ducks can lock up an outright conference title and a spot in the national championship game in Glendale, Ariz., next week with a victory at Oregon State.

It was the third straight loss for Arizona (7-4, 4-4), which ultimately couldn't keep up with the Ducks' speedy spread-option.

With temperatures in the mid-40s and periodic rain showers, there were concerns that the Wildcats would have trouble with their passing game, which had been averaging about 300 yards a game.

But Nick Foles passed for a career-high 448 yards and three touchdowns, including an 85-yard score to Juron Criner.

Thomas completed 14 of 24 passes for 148 yards and an interception. Oregon finished with 537 yards total offense, but Arizona kept up with 506 yards.

Oregon was playing catch-up the entire first half and trailed for just the second time this season at the break.

But the Ducks bounced back early in the second half with Josh Huff's 85-yard scoring run, the longest play from scrimmage for the Ducks this season. While the conversion failed, Oregon had a 20-19 lead.

Arizona hurt itself on Oregon's next series, when they were called offside on Rob Beard's missed 42-yard field goal attempt. That gave the Ducks a first down and Thomas followed with a 20-yard touchdown run to make it 27-19.

The Wildcats cut the lead on Alex Zendejas' 41-yard field goal, but James ran for a pair of scores, one for 13 yards and another for a yard, to make it 48-22.

James went down late in the first half after he was hit by Arizona safety Adam Hall. While he was helped off the field, he stayed on the sidelines until the break, then earned rousing applause when he returned from halftime hopping across the field with his helmet on.

The Wildcats struck first, capitalizing on Hall's interception of Thomas, which led to Foles' 8-yard touchdown pass to Criner.

Oregon answered quickly with Thomas' 38-yard scoring pass to David Paulson, a drive that took just 1:35. But the Autzen Stadium crowd was stunned just seconds later when Foles hit Criner with an 85-yard touchdown reception.

Thomas tied it again with a 6-yard pass to Jeff Maehl in the back of the end zone.

Oregon botched a punt snap, sailing it out of the end zone for an Arizona safety, making it 16-14. The Wildcats added a 29-yard field goal to take the lead into halftime. Oregon coach Chip Kelly took a pair of time-outs before the attempt, prompting kicker Alex Zendejas to shake a finger at Oregon's sideline before he made it.

Last season Arizona fans readied to rush the field but Oregon scored with 6 seconds left, sending the game into overtime. The Ducks went on to win it 44-41 in double OT, spoiling Arizona's chance for its first Rose Bowl bid.
