Arizona Begins Crucial Stretch of Road Games at UCLA

The Wildcats look to improve on their 2-0 road record as they are set to play consecutive road games beginning Saturday at the Rose Bowl against Bruins.

Some Game Themes

The Wildcats work to keep pace in the Pac-10 race, trailing the leader by a game... Arizona measures its consistency against a team glad to be home after the fog-horn nightmare that all visitors to the Emerald Empire seem to get... The Cats try to win a fourth consecutive road game dating to last year's December win at the other L.A. school... UA illustrates its handling of quarterback depth in the wake of Matt Scott's performance last week while Nick Foles was on the mend. Foles' status for this week is questionable but he did warm up prior to the game Saturday... A clash of Arizona's No. 7 (FBS) rushing and scoring defenses against UCLA's No. 22 rushing game... UA works on a winning streak of three games against the Bruins with Tucson wins bracketing one in Pasadena in 2008... What gives? UA cornerback Trevin Wade (10) and UCLA safety Rahim Moore (14) are among conference leaders in career interceptions but they have just two and three PBUs, respectively, this year. An injury to Wade gave ex-UCLA recruit Shaq Richardson a chance to start at Washington State for Arizona two weeks ago and the guy turned in two picks... Arizona plays its first afternoon game of the season after only two twilight contests (4 p.m.) at WSU and OSU... The Cats, bowl eligible for the fourth time in five years, now have postseason ramifications on the line in every game here on out... On paper it could be the nuance of UCLA against Arizona's own intricacies, so probably on the field it will simply evolve into a tough-guy contest...

Last Week

Arizona scored 30 first-half points and tossed a second-half shutout to thump Washington, 44-14, before a sellout crowd on Homecoming weekend in Tucson. UA scored on five consecutive possessions to take a 30-14 halftime lead and never looked back. The Cats ran for a season-high 234 yards and enjoyed some superlative stewardship by junior quarterback Matt Scott, who matched the running game by completing 82 percent of his throws (18 for 22) for 233 yards and two scores. Scott added 65 rushing yards (9.3 ypc) to back up Keola Antolin's 114 rushing yards and twin scores. Nic Grigsby added another pair of TDs on a 12-50 rushing effort. Alex Zendejas added a field goal to put UA up 10-7 and acquire the lead for good. The Arizona defense took care of business, sacking normally elusive UW quarterback Jake Locker four times to hold him to a sub-par -24 rushing yards and pressure him enough to limit his passing to 183 passing yards. The sacks and six other tackles for losses helped UA hold a fifth opponent under 100 yards rushing (98 net). Juron Criner caught eight passes for 108 yards including a 21-yard scoring pass to put the final points on the board early in the fourth quarter. Arizona built a first-half offensive output of 356 yards to make it clear that operating under Scott was not going to be a drop off from injured Nick Foles. Scott's pass efficiency of 200.78 for the game was UA's best of the season and improved him to 4-1 as the starting QB, a role he had not enjoyed since the lone loss at Iowa early last year. His poise helped UA score five times in five red zone tries. Linebacker Paul Vassallo turned in a career- and season team-best 14-tackle game including a sack. The 14 hits were the most since then junior Xavier Kelley turned in 15 against BYU in the 2008 Las Vegas Bowl. The victory improved Arizona to 6-1 and made the Cats bowl eligible.

The Coaches

Arizona - Mike Stoops (Iowa '86), seventh year (39-40) at UA and overall as a head coach. Stoops returned Arizona from a 2-10 program the year before his arrival to the national rankings in his tenure, and has taken the Wildcats to successive bowl games to close the decade. He's working on a 22-11 mark from 2008 onward. His Arizona clubs have beaten a ranked team each of his years in the red and blue including this year's victory over No. 9 Iowa. His recruiting and player development programs have put talent back on the field and sent more than a dozen players to the professional ranks via the draft or free agency in the past four years. He has coached national award winners and a combined 28 All-Pacific-10 players. Arizona football attendance has been a positive feature of a home-field advantage under Coach Stoops, with crowds averaging 93 percent of capacity each of his six seasons at Arizona Stadium and three sellouts this year. Arizona's football team APR checked in with an improved mark each of the five seasons since his inaugural year. Stoops is 4-2 against UCLA as UA's head coach... **UCLA - Rick Neuheisel (UCLA '84), third year in Los Angeles (14-18)** and 11th year overall as a head coach (80-48). An honorable mention All-Pac-10 quarterback for the Bruins his senior year, he began his coaching career as a volunteer coach at UCLA in 1986 on the offensive side working with quarterbacks. He was head coach at Colorado (1995-98) and Washington (1999-2002) and an assistant in the NFL (2005-07, Baltimore) prior to returning to his alma mater. He is 4-2 against Arizona in his career with four wins coming while at UW.

The Road Gets Tougher

Arizona's schedule down the stretch certainly toughens up, if only because the Wildcats play three of their remaining five games on the road. Certainly the competition and conference race continue to heat up each week as well. But UA hopes it can continue to find solace in playing away from home, where the team is 2-0 this year and has won four-straight Pac-10 road games dating back to 2009. Coaches and players have attributed the two road trips this year to turning points in the season. The first was the season-opener at Toledo, where the Wildcats took with them many unanswered questions from fall camp, notably related to a young and inexperienced defense. That trip brought the UA defense together and marked the berth of a very strong unit as the Cats thumped the Rockets 41-2. Then, following their only loss of the season two weeks ago, the Wildcats hit the road for the first time in six weeks and again found the road to be a solidifying experience as they defeated Washington State 24-7 despite QB Nick Foles going down with an injury. Arizona hopes another road trip this week continues to build the camaraderie and chemistry that has gone hand-in-hand with success throughout the season.

Defensive Ranks

The Arizona defense continues to rank as the top defense in the Pac-10 and one of the top units nationally, at least statistically. Here is a look at where UA's defense ranks in the conference and in the nation in several defensive categories:

Welcome (Back) Matt

Arizona junior quarterback showed that commitment, dedication and hard work really does pay off. Last week against Washington, the 6-foot-3 dual-threat signal caller made his first start since losing his job three games into the 2009. The result was 298 yards of total offense (career-high 233 passing, 65 rushing), one touchdown and zero interceptions. It was the first error-free (i.e. interception) game for UA's quarterbacks this season and resulted in a 200.8 pass efficiency rating. Certainly it was a credit to Scott's dedication, but also to UA quarterbacks coach Frank Scelfo, who has drastically improved the play and decision-making skills of both Scott and Nick Foles all season long. The 44-14 victory improved Scott's career record to 3-1 as a starter in his career. Here's a look at Scott's career numbers:

Bowl Factor

Not that coaches or players are going to celebrate right now, but Arizona has achieved bowl eligibility for the fourth time in the last five seasons, including three straight years. Arizona's 6-1 start to the 2010 season is its best since doing so in 1998, when the school went 12-1 and finished with a Holiday Bowl victory over Nebraska. The Wildcats then went nine seasons that finished without a bowl, although Mike Stoops led the Cats to a 6-6 bowl-eligible mark in 2006. Stoops and the Cats snapped the bowlless stretch with a Las Vegas Bowl berth in 2008, which was followed by another appearance in the Holiday Bowl in 2009.

Keola Keying Offensive Attack

Nic Grigsby (390 yards) and Keola Antolin (332 yards) share duties as the top running back, and often in the same backfield. Keola picked up his third career 100-yard game last week against Washington, toting it 14 times for 114 yards, thanks in great part to a 78-yard scoring run, his career long (eclipsing a 67-yarder against ASU last year). That gave him an 8.1 yards per carry outing against the Huskies. He had games of 21-149 against Cal and 6-114 against Oregon State as a freshman in his other century-mark games. He had another splendid game with 20 carries for 87 yards and four touchdowns against Oregon his freshman year. Here's a look at Antolin's performances over the last three weeks:

Grigsby Moves Up (Again)

Arizona senior tailback Nic Grigsby scored twice against Washington, pushing his career rushing touchdown total to 28, moving him in to sole possession of the No. 2 spot on the school's career rushing touchdown chart. UA's all-time leader is Art Luppino, who had 44 scores from 1953-56. So No. 2 is all the further he can realistically climb before his career wraps up in the next five – and hopefully six – games. He remains 186 yards shy of reaching the 3,000-yard milestone for his career, something accomplished by only five players in program history.

Elmore Getting More

Senior defensive end Ricky Elmore is following up a sensational junior season in grand style. Through seven games, Elmore leads the Pac-10 with 7.0 sacks on the season. That total is 2.5 better than the next best number, 4.5, held by bookend teammate Brooks Reed. Elmore's 1.0 sacks per game tally is currently No. 10 in the nation. The 6-foot-5 senior led the Pac-10 in sacks during the regular season a year ago with 11.5, and he's on pace to do so again. In 2010, the 6-foot-5, 250-pounder has 34 total tackles (third-best on team), including 9.0 for loss. He has 21.5 career sacks, which are seventh-most for active plays in the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision.

Staring at the Stats

...If Arizona converts its next third-down try it will be right on the nose at 50 percent (currently 44 for 89). That's a boost from the 41 percent rate of a year ago and a lot of it has to do with completion percentage and shorter third downs. Seventeen FBS squads are better and two of them -- Stanford (2nd, 57.5) and USC (6th, 52.9) also have some signal callers making some good decisions. Nevada is converting a whopping 60 percent on third down with its pistol-whipping style to lead the FBS... Arizona has held opponents to only five red zone touchdowns this year, surely a function of its overall defense that has kept the bad guys from getting into range only 13 times in the seven games... UA has some balance in its offensive scheme and basically has gone with the effective ploy to win games. The Cats have run the ball 226 times and passes it 250 times That's an average of 68 plays a game. Of the 27 clubs ahead of Arizona in total offense (per game), only nine schools have less than 500 plays like the Cats -- USC, Boise State, Troy, Utah, Arkansas, Nebraska, SDSU, Cincinnati and Louisville -- and you might think of consistent big-play potential when you read that list...Two years ago Arizona nearly matched its school record (34 by 1998 team) with 33 rushing touchdowns. A bit over half way through the year the Cats have 16. Co-offensive coordinators Seth Littrell and Bill Bedenbaugh will saddle up and run at you... Arizona is getting 410 all-purpose yards per game from its five best playmakers -- Juron Criner, Travis Cobb, Keola Antolin, Nic Grigsby and Bug Wright. Criner's doing it basically one way, receiving, while fellow receivers Cobb and Wright return kicks, and Antolin and Grigsby run and catch the ball...

Tackling Behind the Lines

Arizona moved up to No. 8 in nation in tackles for loss per game, averaging 8.0 stops behind the line. UA's leader is Ricky Elmore, who has 9.0 TFL's to date thanks to his Pac-10-leading 8.0 sacks. Justin Washington, who did not play last week, is second on the club with 8.5 TFLs, while UA linebackers Paul Vassallo (4.5), Derek Earls (6.5) and Jake Fischer (5.5) have combined for 16.5. Defensive lineman Brooks Reed (4.5), D'Aundre Reed (5.0) and Mana Mikaele (5.0) have combined for 14.5 more. All added up, the Wildcats have 56 TFLs on the season. That is approaching the season total of 76 in 13 games in 2010.

Throw It and It's Caught

Arizona throws the ball about 35 times a game and enters week eight completing three-quarters of the tosses. The current rate is 75.2 percent, which would hammer the school record of .64.6 put up by the club just a few years ago in Willie Tuitama's (64.9%) senior campaign and Matt Scott's (63.6%) true freshman year. Nick Foles (75.3), Scott (72.7) and Byrson Beirne (100.0) have found some open guys who haven't wasted the opportunities.

Head Coach Mike Stoops

7th Season | 39-40 Overall | 1-1 Bowls

- Led Arizona to a second-place finish in the Pac-10 in 2009, its highest finish in 11 seasons.
- Returned Arizona to the national rankings in 2009, with the team ascending to No. 18 in November.
- Coached the Wildcats to back-to-back eight-victory seasons and bowl berths in 2008 and 2009.
- Helped lead the program's defense to consecutive years in the nation's Top 25 in total defense in 2008 and 2009.
- Arizona's victory over No. 20 Southern California in 2009 gave Stoops victories over a ranked team in each of his six seasons in Tucson.
- Helped Arizona record a sixth consecutive 50,000-plus per-game attendance figure, its best streak in the 30 years Arizona Stadium has been near its current capacity.
- Arizona has had 12 players selected in the NFL Draft the past four seasons after their development under Stoops' training systems.
- Stoops added 2007 Jim Thorpe Award winner Antoine Cason to his long list of national award winners. Cason was a consensus All-American and later first-round pick by the San Diego Chargers.

Works For Me

The Wildcats have scored 40+ points three times this year and average about five TDs' worth of points a game. This has helped UA to a 6-1 record but rates only 32nd about FBS teams. Someone out there's lighting some serious scoreboards. To Arizona's advantage, however, it's holding opponents to 13 points per game, seventh best in the country. That works out to a scoring margin of about 20 points which would tie for second-best in school history (20.0 in 1929). The record is a margin of +38.5 by the Art "The Cactus Comet" days in 1954.

Great Scott

Matt Scott's performance against Washington helped earn him the Rivals.com conference player of the week citation for the Paac-10. The national winner was fellow QB Cam Newton of Auburn, who visited Arizona last fall in the recruiting process, but was likely, turned off by the presence of two proven quarterbacks already in the program. Things have probably worked out well for all parties.

3-and-Gone

Arizona is 12th nationally in holding teams to three plays and out, with nearly 4.0 per game. Ohio State is atop the list with a 5.8 average. Like several other defensive statistics to date, UA's mark is the top one for a Pac-10 club. Arizona State trails the Wildcats by one spot on the list.

In the House

... Lots of patrons. UA had its third sellout of the year against Washington to go with previous crowds for Iowa and against Oregon State. The Homecoming crowd pushed the season average to 55,376, about 97 percent of capacity and potentially the third-best average season attendance in school history behind 56,562 in 1994 and an average of 55,798 for Mike Stoops' third team in 2006.

Limiting Long Plays

A key to the Arizona defense continues to be the ability to limit big plays by opposing offenses. Certainly, Oregon State proved that big plays can be the downfall for a defense as the Beavers – at the time – doubled UA's season total for pass plays of 20-plus yard allowed. But overall, the Wildcat defense has been very good at making team's try to go the length of the field and not make plays in chunks. Opposing teams are averaging 2.7 plays of 20-plus yards per game. Only one team – The Citadel – has a rushing play of 20-plus yards to date. The Cats have given up 18 pass plays and one rush of 20-plus yards.

Cats in the Pac

Arizona's 6-3 mark in the Pac-10 in 2009 was its best since 1998 and is the third six-win Pac-10 season in program history. With UA's 3-1 start this season, the Wildcats have 17 victories in their last 26 conference games, dating to the last four games of the 2007 season. That 17-9 record (0.654 winning percentage) is impressive by itself, but even in the Wildcats' nine losses, they have been just a few plays away from winning each game. UA has lost six of the nine games by three points or less and by a total of 39 points (average of 4.3 per game).

Big Play Juron

Wide receiver Juron Criner turned in a breakout season as a sophomore a year ago when he emerged as UA's big-play threat on the outside. His 2010 debut, which included a 10-catch, 176-yard performance, showed he has taken further steps to becoming one of the nation's most outstanding receivers. The 6-foot-4, 210-pounder is on the Biletnikoff preseason watch list and should be on that list as it narrows down throughout the season. Here are some quick hits on Juron Criner:

- No. 10 in UA history with 14 receiving touchdowns
- No. 13 in NCAA FBS with 94.1 receiving yards per game in 2010
- Game-winning TD catch vs. California with 1:11 remaining followed 51-yard reception.
- Led Pac-10 receivers with nine (9) receiving touchdowns in 2009
- Eight of 14 (57 percent) career TD grabs have been 20+ yard plays
- 60 of 93 (64.5 percent) of career catches result in first down or TD
- 16.1 yards per catch on 41 receptions in 2010
- 10-catch, 176-yard performance at Toledo 2010
- 12-catch, 152-yard effort against Stanford in 2009
- 12-catch, 179-yard (career high) effort against Oregon State in 2010
- Career-high three (3) touchdowns vs. Oregon in 2009
- Led all UA receivers with a 12.9 yards per catch average in 2009
- As a sophomore, hauled in TD catches at Iowa, at Oregon State and at USC

Where Grigsby Stacks Up

Senior tailback Nic Grigsby has moved up to No. 2 on the UA career rushing touchdown chart (28) and No. 6 in school history with 2,814 career rushing yards. That total puts him No. 14 on the list of active players in the NCAA for career rushing yards. Grigsby needs 186 yards to become the school's sixth player to reach 3,000 career rushing yards. Against Oregon State this year, he became the eighth player in school history with 500 carries in a career. Here are some more quick hits on Nic Grigsby:

- Currently stands as UA No. 6 rusher in school history with 2,814 yards (14th-most for active FBS players)
- His 28 career rushing TDs is No. 2 in school history.
- His 107 rushing yards against The Citadel marked his 11th career 100-yard game
- Arizona is 10-1 in games he rushes for 100 yards or more.
- Tied career high with three rushing touchdowns against The Citadel
- Average of 5.3 yards per carry in career, including 5.7 ypc since start of 2008.
- Had 1,153 yards and 13 touchdowns in 2008

Reed Racking Up the Sacks

Senior defensive end Brooks Reed has returned to his dominating form showcased in his breakout 2008 season. Plagued by a high ankle sprain that forced him to miss several games in 2009, Reed has enjoyed a healthy 2010 season to date. He has 4.5 sacks through seven games, a mark that is second on the team and tied for No. 2 in the Pac-10. Overall, the team co-captain has 20 tackles, including 5.0 for loss, on the season.

Newbie Linebackers No More

UA lost three senior linebackers in Xavier Kelley, Sterling Lewis and Vuna Tuihalamaka. Kelley had 78 tackles a year ago, Tuihalamaka added 72 and Lewis chipped in 38 while sharing some time with nickel back Corey Hall (38). That's 188 tackles lost, but UA's new guys at the positions have six games under their belt and have already set the expectations high for the remainder of the season. Mid-year juco transfer Paul Vassallo (54 tackles, 4.5 for loss, 2.0 sacks), sophomore Jake Fischer (29 tackles 5.5 for loss, 2.0 sacks) and mid-year juco transfer Derek Earls (26 tackles, 6.5 for loss) have done a solid job taking over the starting roles and anchoring the middle level of UA's defense, with help from sophomore R.J. Young (16 tackles). Clearly the staff's recruiting effort in the offseason helped plug some holes in a hurry. Vassallo is the club's leading tackler after seven games, with Fischer at No. 4 and Earls at No. 7.

Ten For Trevin

Junior cornerback Trevin Wade snared his 10th career interception against Iowa on Sept. 18, which put him in a tie for No. 10 in the NCAA for career active leaders in interceptions. Amazingly, it was second career "pick-six" with both coming against the Hawkeyes (one in 2009). While his 10 career interceptions are noteworthy, the most impressive part of the feat is the fact he has started just 20 games in his career. His 85-yard return against the Hawkeyes this year tied for the sixth-longest in school history. To date, he has 22 tackles, one pass breakup and one interception on the season. He is a preseason candidate for a handful of national honors, including the Jim Thorpe Award, the Bonko Nagurski award and the Bednarik Award.

Knocking It Down

The Wildcat defense has 34 passes messed up – six interceptions interception and 28 PBUs – through seven games. Pretty nice total against 204 passes attempted, and just 55 complete passes allowed. Mid-year juco transfer linebacker Derek Earls had the interception and three passes defended in the opener. The three PBUs were the most for a Wildcat since cornerback Trevin Wade had three (plus an interception) at Iowa last year. Senior safety Anthony Wilcox matched that total with a career-high three PBUs against Iowa. Wilcox ranks in the top-25 nationally with seven passes defended on the year.

Colin the Shots

UA center Colin Baxter returns for his final season in a Wildcat uniform and will undoubtedly be calling the shots on the offensive line. He has started 44-consecutive games along UA's line, providing stability at a position of need. In 2008, he was slid from guard to center mid-year after center Blake Kerley went down with a season-ending injury. Since, Baxter hasn't look back. He's a featured spokesman for the team, offering unique perspective acquired from his time in the trenches and his tireless work with the program on and off the field. He was named a team captain prior to the season for the second straight year and will make a final push for national honors at his position. An All-Pac-10 selection a year ago, Baxter is on the Outland Trophy and Rimington Award watch lists entering the season. Several mid-year lists by various publicists have him as an All-American candidate.

Old Man on the Block

Arizona graduate offensive tackle Adam Grant, who moves to the left side this year after a couple of years on the right, is an NCAA-approved sixth-year player thanks to some earlier medical problems that caused him to miss nine games as a sophomore (knee) and his redshirt freshman year in 2006 (knee). He also missed six games with a hand injury in 2008. Grant's tenacity and physical situation are at all-time highs. The 24-year-old religious studies student earned his degree two Mays ago. He's a 25-game starter in 27 overall appearances and one of the team's spokesmen on a variety of topics, notably perseverance. He initially was recruited as a tight end (redshirted 2005 in that role) but his big frame (now 6-foot-8, 325) was evident, and his future was a few feet closer to the ball from the onset of his career. His showcase game was likely against then-No. 9 Iowa on Sept. 18, when he went head-to-head with Adrian Clayborn, an All-American defensive end. Clayborn finished with just three tackles and was never a threat in the backfield on pass plays.

Rushing to Success

The spread offense has taken over college football in recent seasons and the Wildcats jumped on the bandwagon with Sonny Dykes and his staff in 2007. With it came a record-setting passing season for Arizona in 2007 and back-to-back eight-win seasons in 2008 and 2009. But the Wildcats have found their success most consistent in running the football, not tossing it around for 300-plus yards per game. Not coincidentally, a more consistent ground game the last few seasons has helped the Wildcats win more games. Consider this rush of facts:

- Arizona is just 7-8 in games when it passes for 300+ yards since the start of 2006
- Arizona is 6-2 in games when its opponent throws for 300+ yards in a game since '06
- Arizona is 25-7 in games when it rushes for 100+ yards in a game since '06
- Arizona is just 13-19 in games when its opponent rushes for 100+ yards in a game since '06
- Only five teams have beat UA when rushing for less than 100 yards since the start of '06
- UA is 14-1 in the last 15 games when holding an opponent under 100 net rushing yards

30 Is (Usually) The Magic Number

The Cats' loss to Oregon in double overtime and their 36-33 loss to Washington on Oct. 10 was a rare one. Since joining the Pac-10 in 1978, the Wildcats have played 114 games in which they have scored 30 or more points. Their record in those games? An astounding 103-11-1. That record included a streak of 18 consecutive victories prior to the Oregon game in 2008 (55-45 loss), and UA is now 24-3 under Mike Stoops. Arizona is 4-0 in such games this season.

If Not 30, Try 40

If Arizona's winning percentage since 1978 when scoring 30 or more points isn't enough, then try out a 40+ point stat. In its entire history of football, Arizona is 113-5 when scoring 40 or more points in a game. Arizona was 4-0 in such games – all at home – in an eight-win 2008 season. Previously, the last time UA reached the mark four times in one season was in 1954, when it did so six times. In 2009, the Wildcats reached 40 points three times with a 2-1 record in those games. The loss? A 44-41 double overtime victory by Oregon. Amazingly, the Ducks also dropped the Cats the year prior, 55-45, in Eugene, accounting for two of the five all-time losses. UA is 3-0 in 2010 when scoring 40 points.

Leading the Way

The Arizona Wildcats voted on their team captains 10 days prior to the season opener, with four veterans drawing the respect of their teammates. Senior defensive linemen Brooks Reed and Mana Mikaele will represent the defense as captains, while senior center Colin Baxter and junior quarterback Nick Foles will carry the honors for the offense. Two other players, wide receiver David Roberts and linebacker Jake Fischer, will represent the football team in UA's Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC), which works with athletic administrators to provide feedback on improving the Arizona experience for student-athletes.

Foles Making a Name for Himself

Arizona junior quarterback Nick Foles continues to show why he is one of the top quarterbacks in the nation. An honorable mention all-league pick as a first-year starter in 2009. This summer, he was one of four QBs (Jake Locker, Andrew Luck and Matt Barkley) selected by the Pac-10 office to represent the league in East Coast media days in New York and at ESPN headquarters in Bristol, Conn. Voted by teammates as a team captain, Foles kicked off his junior campaign in style with a record setting performance at Toledo and set what could set up to be a special junior campaign. Here are some quick hits on Nick Foles:

- Currently ranks No. 2 in nation for active career completion percentage (67.3%)
- Currently ranks No. 5 in nation for active career completions per game (22.4)

- Currently ranks No. 2 in nation with 75.3% completion percentage
- His 19 passing TDs in 2009 tied for fourth-most in a season at UA
- 63.41% completion percentage in 2009 No. 3 in UA history
- Career-high 440 yards passing vs. Oregon State in 2010
- Holds UA record for single game pass completion % for 30+ attempts (86.49% at Toledo, 2010)

Pac-10 Players of the Week

Matt Scott (Oct. 25, Offense), who started in place of injured Nick Foles, sparked the Arizona offense to its most well-balanced performance of the season as Arizona rolled up 467 yards of offense, including 234 on the ground and 233 through the air. Scott completed 18-of-22 pass attempts for 233 yards and two touchdowns, while turning in UA's first interception-free game of the season on offense. Scott's pass efficiency rating for the game was 200.78, the best mark since Willie Tuitama's 201.84 against Washington State in 2008 ... **Paul Vassallo (Oct. 25, Defense)** headlined another standout performance by the Arizona defense, which shut out Washington in the second half. A junior college transfer who began his UA career last spring, Vassallo collected a career-high 14 tackles in the game, including nine solo stops, to go with a sack. His tackle total was the highest for a Wildcat defender since Xavier Kelley's 15-tackle effort against BYU in the 2008 Las Vegas Bowl... **Shaquille Richardson (Oct. 18, Defense)** was sensational at Washington State in his first career start. Richardson headlined a solid defensive effort as he intercepted two passes, broke up three others and registered seven tackles – all solo stops. UA defeated WSU, 24-7, limiting the Cougars to a season-low in points, the fourth time in 2010 that the UA defense held the opposition to single digits ... **Nick Foles (Sept. 20, Offense)** completed 28-of-39 passes for 303 yards and two touchdowns to help guide the Wildcats to a 34-27 upset of then-No. 9 Iowa on Sept. 18. The performance earned him the conference's weekly award for the second time in his career after he garnered the honor following a career-high 415 yards in a victory over Stanford a season ago. The 6-foot-5, 245-pound signal caller engineered the game-winning drive in the fourth quarter after the Hawkeyes had tied the game, 27-27. The Wildcats took over on their own 28-yard line with 8:07 remaining in the game. Foles marched the Wildcats down the field, ignited by a 38-yard pass play to a diving David Roberts that put the Wildcats in Hawkeyes' territory. The drive was capped by a four-yard touchdown pass to Bug Wright on a third-and-goal from the four-yard line, giving UA a 34-27 lead ... **Travis Cobb (Sept. 20, Special Teams)** turned in his second career kickoff return for a touchdown in a Sept. 18 upset over Iowa, earning his first Pac-10 Player of the Week honor. After Iowa had cut UA's lead to 14-7 in the second quarter, Cobb took the ensuing kickoff 100 yards to put the Wildcats comfortably back on top by two touchdowns. The 100-yard dash tied for the longest kickoff return in program history and surpassed the 95-yard touchdown return he had a season ago against Washington State. That play snapped an 11-year drought between kickoff return scores for Arizona, which had last returned a kickoff for a score in the season opener of the 1998 season when Chris McAlister returned the opening kick 100 yards at Hawaii.

Up Next

Arizona will remain on the road to take on nationally-ranked Stanford in Palo Alto, Calif. On Saturday, Nov. 6. The start time of the game has been narrowed down to either 5 p.m. (PT) on ABC or 7:15 p.m. on ESPN.

Arizona-UCLA Series Notes

The Wildcats have won three-straight games in the series for the first time ever ... Arizona head coach Mike Stoops is 4-2 against the Bruins, with his UA teams winning four of the last five matchups ... UA's win at the Rose Bowl in 2008 was just its third in program history ... Arizona has won each of the last three meetings in Tucson (2005, 2007, 2009) and is a steady 9-8 against the Bruins in Tucson ... The Wildcats snapped a four-game losing streak in the series with a 52-14 thrashing over then-No. 7 UCLA in 2005 ... First meeting in the series was in Tucson on November 11, 1927, with the Wildcats claiming a 16-13 victory at UA field ... The teams did not play in Tucson again until 1971 and then did so on a regular basis after UA joined the Pac-10 in 1978 ... The Wildcats have not surrendered a touchdown to the Bruins offense since 2007.

Oct. 24, 2009: UCLA (3-4) at Arizona (5-2)

Location: Tucson, Ariz. (Arizona Stadium) Attendance: 51,440

RECAP: The Cats overcame five turnovers to otherwise put a convincing victory to bed against UCLA, 27-13. The Cats had a two-to-one margin in total offense, 10 more minutes in time of possession, four sacks to none, only two penalties and ran 81 plays. UCLA did not score an offensive touchdown, earning its only TD on a return of an incomplete pass ruled a lateral. UA quarterback Nick Foles, under the weather, showed it with a modest game (by his earlier standards) in completing 22 of 34 passes for 247 yards and two touchdowns, but suffering three interceptions (two of those off tipped balls). The UA defense held UCLA to 65 rushing yards and 211 total yards, plus helped force the Bruins into trying three different quarterbacks, none of whom enjoyed much success. Still, Tony Dye's 28-yard fumble recovery for the score brought UCLA within seven points, 20-13, with 5:20 left in the third period. UA answered five minutes later for its and the game's final score. The Cats held UCLA to 55 fourth-quarter yards and ran the ball 14 times in the period to help run down the clock. The Bruins scored all their points off UA turnovers, with kicker Kai Forbath knocking home two field goals off two other UA miscues. UA also capitalized, however, notching 14 minutes after two Bruin fumbles. No Arizona possession lasted longer than four and half minutes, with three of the four scoring drives taking six plays or less. Individually, Arizona safety Cam Nelson made the most of six tackles, with two sacks, two forced fumbles and a pass breakup, with both fumbles-caused leading to Arizona touchdowns. Linebacker Xavier Kelley led all tacklers with 10. The Cats had 209 rushing yards with a stable of runners chipping in, led by backup RB Keola Antolin with 77, while receivers Delashaun Dean (3-46), Juron Criner (3-39) and Terrell Turner (2-14) used sweeps to add a combined 98 markers. Turner had five receptions while Criner (two for scores) and Dean added four each. Arizona converted nine of 16 third-down plays and did not give up a sack for the second consecutive game.

Game 1: Arizona 41, Toledo 2

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP) -Nick Foles threw for 360 yards and accounted for three touchdowns to help Arizona pound Toledo 41-2 on Friday night.

Foles tossed two TD passes and ran for another score as the Wildcats recorded their first road victory outside the Pac-10 in nine seasons. Nic Grigsby added two touchdown runs.

Foles completed 32 of 37 passes with an interception that occurred when a ball went off the hands of running back Taimi Tutogi and bounced to Toledo defensive back Diauntae Morrow.

He showed a nice touch on his first touchdown throw, lofting a 9-yard pass over a defender and into the hands of tight end David Douglas, who got one foot down in the back of end zone with 8:40 left in the first quarter.

Foles completed five passes for 58 yards on the opening drive, but the Wildcats didn't do much after that until late in the first half.

Grigsby, who struggled with a shoulder injury last season, scored on a nifty 36-yard run, cutting across the middle and outracing two Rockets to corner of the end zone, capping a nine-play, 91-yard drive and giving Arizona a 14-2 lead.

One play later, Derek Earls picked off Austin Dantin's pass over the middle to get the ball back for the Wildcats. Foles scored on a 1-yard run with just 17 seconds left in the half, making it 21-2.

Arizona's speedy bunch of receivers seemed to be open on nearly play. Juron Criner led the way, finishing with 11 catches for 187 yards and a touchdown.

Arizona's young defense, with seven new starters, including all three linebackers, did a nice job limiting the Rockets to 80 yards rushing, including just 16 yards in the first half.

It was quite an improvement for a defense that coach Mike Stoops said looked terrible in a team scrimmage two weeks ago.

Toledo had the top offense in the Mid-American Conference a year ago, but it did little right against the Wildcats. Dantin was 14-of-23 passing for 103 yards.

Toledo's only score of the night came when Arizona lineman Conan Amituanai was called for holding in the end zone, giving the Rockets the safety.

Arizona hadn't ventured this far for opener since going to Penn State in 1999. It also was the first time a Pac-10 team has played at a Mid-American Conference stadium.

Game 2: Arizona 52, The Citadel 6

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP)-Nic Grigsby rushed for three touchdowns, including a career-long 62-yard scoring run, and ARIZONA routed The Citadel 52-6 in the Wildcats' home opener on Saturday night.

Nick Foles completed 17 of 22 for passes for 214 yards and one touchdown before calling it a night early in the third quarter as the Wildcats (2-0) rolled for 489 yards in a tuneup for next Saturday's home game against No. 9 Iowa.

Grigsby rushed for 107 yards in 11 carries and boosted his career rushing touchdown total to 25, tied for third-most in ARIZONA history.

The Citadel (1-1), a member of the Football Championship Subdivision (formerly NCAA Division I-AA) Southern Conference, played a Pac-10 team for the first time.

Matt Thompson, freshman quarterback in the Bulldogs' triple-option offense, fumbled the ball twice to set up ARIZONA touchdowns late in the first half and early in the second.

ARIZONA third-stringer Greg Nwoko gained 72 yards in seven carries, including touchdown runs of 23 and 3 yards.

The Wildcats, who opened their season with a 41-2 win at Toledo, have outscored their first two opponents 93-5. Sam Keeler's 39-yard field goal with 6:55 left in the third quarter for The Citadel provided the first offensive points against ARIZONA this season. Keeler also had a 23-yarder.

After a slow start, ARIZONA scored on consecutive possessions at the end of the first quarter and start of the second.

Foles' 44-yard pass to Juron Criner highlighted a six-play, 60-yard drive that put the Wildcats up 7-0 on Grigsby's 3-yard scoring run. Criner caught Foles' long pass, bounced off a would-be tackler, then broke downfield to the Bulldogs' 3.

ARIZONA went 84-yards on 12 plays the next time it had the ball. Foles threw to Bug Wright in the back of the end zone for the touchdown to make it 14-0 with 12:58 left to go in the half. Foles completed 5 of 6 passes on the drive for 69 yards.

Alex Zendejas' 41-yard field goal with 2:25 left in the half made it 17-0. The first play after the subsequent kickoff, Thompson fumbled and Paul Vassallo recovered for ARIZONA at The Citadel 22. Foles threw over the middle to Wright to the 1-yard line, and Grigsby took it in from there to put the Wildcats up 24-0 25 seconds before the half.

ARIZONA scored two touchdowns in a 27-second span the first two minutes of the second half.

Grigsby's 62-yard run one play after the second-half kickoff made it 31-0. Although the senior tailback has a 94-yard run in his career, the 62-yarder was his longest for a touchdown.

The first play after the subsequent kickoff, Thompson's bad pitch was recovered by Derek Earls for ARIZONA at the Bulldogs' 23. Nwoko went 23 yards for the score on the next play to put ARIZONA ahead 38-0 with 12:23 still left in the third quarter.

Game 3: No. 24 Arizona 34, No. 9 Iowa 27

Sept. 18, 2010 | Tucson, Ariz. (Arizona Stadium) | Attendance: 57,864

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Nick Foles hit William Wright with a late 4-yard touchdown pass and No. 24 Arizona held its ground in the national spotlight with a momentum-swinging 34-27 win over ninth-ranked Iowa Saturday night.

Arizona (3-0) jumped out to a 20-point halftime lead behind a slew of big plays that included a blocked punt, Travis Cobb's 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown and an interception returned 85 yards by Trevin Wade for another score.

The Wildcats moved 72 yards in nine plays in the second half for the winning score, then sealed what they hope is a program-defining win with four straight sacks of Stanzi.

Foles threw for 303 yards and two touchdowns on 28-of-39 passing.

Iowa rolled over its first two not-so-challenging opponents by a combined score of 72-14. The road trip to the desert represented a little tougher challenge: a long-distance road game (over 1,500 miles) with a late start (9:30 Iowa City time) in hot-air-dryer heat (close to 100 at kickoff).

On top of that, the Hawkeyes were facing a talented Arizona team looking to prove itself against a big-school program in one of the biggest nonconference games in the 81-year history of Arizona Stadium.

The Wildcats were certainly up for it, producing one big play after another in a stadium-rocking first half.

Arizona held Iowa to a quick three-and-out on its first drive, then David Roberts broke through to block Ryan Donahue's punt, which Marquis Flowers recovered at the Hawkeyes 8. Three plays later, Foles hit David Douglas on a 5-yard slant for a touchdown that had the rowdies in red jumping and pumping their white pom-poms.

Iowa was marching on its second drive, but receiver Marvin McNutt Jr. had the ball slip through his hands and it fell right to Wade, who had a clear shot to the end zone for an 85-yard score.

Barely five minutes into the game, Iowa was in a 14-0 hole.

The Hawkeyes kept plugging away on offense, moving 93 yards for a 4-yard touchdown pass from Stanzi to Jewel Hampton, the first touchdown against Arizona this season.

Then, boom! another big play: Cobb burst through a seam like one of the pregame fireworks on the ensuing kickoff and was gone, 100 yards for a touchdown that put Arizona up 21-7.

Tacking on two field goals by Alex Zendejas, including a career-long-matching 47-yarder, Arizona had a seemingly comfortable 27-7 halftime lead.

Seemingly.

Turning up the defensive pressure, Iowa stymied Arizona's offense in the third quarter - 58 total yards - and pulled within 13 points on a 37-yard touchdown pass from Stanzi to Derrell Johnson-Koulianos.

Iowa came up with a big play of its own on special teams, recovering a muffed punt by Bug Wright at the Wildcats 18. Stanzi hit McNutt on a backpedaling touchdown pass at the edge of the end zone on the next play, making it 27-21.

Binns followed with his at-the-line grab and return for a score, only to watch in amazement from the sideline as the PAT wobbled away from the uprights. Then it was Foles' turn.

Getting the ball out quickly to avoid Iowa's strengthening rush, the junior completed 4 of 5 passes on the final drive, hitting Wright for the decisive score with 3:57 left. Foles finished with 303 yards and two touchdowns on 28-of-39 passing, solidifying his - and his team's - place among the country's best up-and-comers.

TUCSON, Ariz. - Just when No. 14 Arizona seemed headed for a crushing loss, Nick Foles and Juron Criner finally brought the Wildcats' offense to life.

Foles threw a 3-yard pass over the middle to Criner with 1:11 to play for the game's only touchdown and Arizona escaped with a 10-9 victory over California in their Pac-10 opener on Saturday night.

Just when No. 14 Arizona seemed headed for a crushing loss, Nick Foles and Juron Criner finally brought the Wildcats' offense to life.

Foles threw a 3-yard pass over the middle to Criner with 1:11 to play for the game's only touchdown and Arizona escaped with a 10-9 victory over California in their Pac-10 opener on Saturday night.

The score was set up by Foles' 51-yard pass to Criner, questionable for the game because of a turf toe injury. The 6-foot-4 Criner fought off California's Darian Hagan, who had played smothering pass defense all night, on the big play.

The winning seven-play, 77-yard drive came after California's Giorgio Tavecchio missed a 40-yard field goal try with 2:37 to play. Arizona is 4-0 for the first time since 1998.

A loss would have been devastating for the Wildcats a week after their draining 34-27 home win over then-No. 9 Iowa. Arizona is the only Pac-10 team never to make it to the Rose Bowl.

Arizona has next weekend off.

The Wildcats clinched the victory when Kevin Riley's pass bounced off the hands of Marvin Jones and was intercepted by Joseph Perkins. Perkins fumbled but Robert Golden recovered for Arizona.

It appeared that Tavecchio's field goals of 25, 40 and 23 yards would be enough for the Bears (2-2), who had shut down Arizona's prolific offense a week after giving up 497 yards and being routed 52-31 at Nevada.

The Wildcats helped out with 10 penalties for 99 yards. Foles completed 25 of 39 passes for 212 yards but had two critical first-half turnovers.

His fumble on a sack by Cal's Cameron Jordan on the final play of the first quarter led to the Bears' first field goal. Then, in the final seconds of the half, he was intercepted in the end zone after Arizona had driven to the Cal 13.

Shane Vereen, who had a game-clinching touchdown run in Cal's victory over Arizona a year ago, rushed for 102 yards in 27 carries. He was the workhorse as the Bears drove downfield in the final minutes but Tavecchio's 40-yard field goal try was wide right.

That gave Arizona its last chance.

Tavecchio also had a 40-yard try bounce off the right upright in the third quarter.

Riley was 13 of 26 for 113 yards. The only Cal turnover came on the game-clinching play.

A personal foul penalty called on the Arizona defense, with no individual named by the official, aided California's 11-play, 55-yard drive that ended in Tavecchio's 40-yarder that gave the Bears a 6-0 lead with 5:23 left in the half.

Arizona drove the length of the field after Cal's subsequent kickoff, with a pass interference call against Hagan on a long throw for Criner moving the ball to the California 13 with 45 seconds left on the half.

On the next play, Foles lofted a pass intended for his roommate David Douglas in the right corner of the end zone. California's Marc Anthony deflected the pass and Conte grabbed it, getting a foot down just inbound for the interception.

Arizona finally scored on Alex Zendejas' 46-yard field goal with 10:16 left in the third quarter. The score was set up by Foles' 51-yard pass to Criner, questionable for the game because of a turf toe injury. The 6-foot-4 Criner fought off California's Darian Hagan, who had played smothering pass defense all night, on the big play.

The winning seven-play, 77-yard drive came after California's Giorgio Tavecchio missed a 40-yard field goal try with 2:37 to play. Arizona is 4-0 for the first time since 1998.

Game 5: Oregon State 29, Arizona 27

Oct. 9, 2010 | Tucson, Ariz. (Arizona Stadium) | Attendance: 56,054

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - The Wildcats' Nick Foles completed 35 of 46 for 440 yards and three touchdowns, but Oregon State held on to upset No. 9 Arizona 29-27 on Saturday night.

Add Ryan Katz to the list of impressive Pac-10 quarterbacks.

Oregon State coaches kept things somewhat conservative early in his first season as a starter, then unleashed his strong, accurate arm, along with his elusive scrambling against No. 9 Arizona.

The sophomore from Santa Monica, Calif., threw for 393 yards and two touchdowns, sneaked across for another score and the Beavers held on for a 29-27 upset.

Katz completed 30 of 42 against an Arizona defense that had been ranked No. 2 nationally, giving up 230.8 yards per game. "I just see a lot more confidence in him," Oregon State's Joe Halahuni said. "He's more of a leader off the field and in the huddle. He's doing great running the ball, throwing it and making good decisions."

Three times Katz eluded the pass rush and scrambled for a first down on third-down situations.

The Wildcats (4-1, 1-1 Pac-10), in the top 10 for the first time since the 1999 preseason rankings and coming off a bye week, never led. The loss dampened their hopes for the school's first trip to the Rose Bowl.

The Wildcats' Nick Foles completed 35 of 46 for 440 yards and three touchdowns. "When you look at the entire game, we just weren't all there," Arizona coach Mike Stoops said. "I think we did compete well in the secondary but this was the most yards we've given up in a long time. Oregon State really beat us in a lot of ways. They wanted to throw the ball and they threw it at will, which is very hard to come back from."

Oregon State (3-2, 2-0) lost standout receiver James Rodgers to what could be a season-ending knee injury in the second quarter. He was in street clothes on crutches in the second half after seven catches for 102 yards, including a 33-yarder for the Beavers' first score. Riley said the injury was "not good" and he would know more on Sunday.

Foles' 12-yard touchdown pass to Keola Antolin cut the lead to 29-27 with 1:52 to play but Oregon State recovered the subsequent onside kick attempt. Arizona got the ball on its own 20 with 2 seconds left and tried to use a short pass and a series of laterals to score. But Antolin was stopped at midfield to finish Oregon State's fifth consecutive victory in Tucson.

The teams combined for 1,027 yards in a game that featured five touchdown plays of 33 yards or longer.

Rodgers' younger brother, Jacquizz, rushed for 92 yards in 25 carries and caught three passes for 41 yards. His 1-yard touchdown run with 5:46 to play put the Beavers up 29-20.

James Rodgers made a fingertip catch of Katz's deep pass for what would have been a 56-yard touchdown with 5:07 left in the half. But he was hit by Arizona's Adam Hall as he crossed into the end zone, then went down in pain. He was helped off the field with no weight on his left knee. The score was called back by an ineligible receiver downfield penalty.

Foles connected on touchdown passes of 45, 33 and 12 yards but Katz matched him all the way. The Oregon State coaching staff had held Katz down as he opened his first season as a starter but have unleashed him in the first two Pac-10 games. He threw for 260 yards in the Beavers' 31-28 victory over Arizona State a week ago.

The Wildcats took the second-half kickoff and went 66 yards in just two minutes before Antolin scored on a 33-yard run. The point after attempt was blocked and it was 17-13.

OSU responded with an 11-play, 65-yard scoring drive that finished with Katz sneaking over from the 1. But Justin Kahut's extra point try was no good, giving the Beavers a 23-13 lead. He also missed the kick after the last OSU touchdown.

Nic Grigsby took a swing pass from Foles and weaved through traffic 41 yards for a touchdown that cut the Beavers' lead to 23-20 with 3:20 left in the third quarter. The Beavers responded with a 10-play, 80-yard drive, culminating with Jacquizz Rodgers' touchdown run.

Game 6: Arizona 24, Washington State 7

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)--With quarterback Nick Foles knocked out of the game with a knee injury, No. 17 Arizona turned to running backs Keola Antolin and Nic Grigsby for offense.

Antolin ran for 92 yards and two touchdowns, and Grigsby added 66 yards and another score as the Wildcats beat Washington State 24-7 Saturday to remain in contention for the Pac-10 title.

Foles, the league's leading passer, will be out at least two weeks with a sprained knee, coach Mike Stoops said. Backup Matt Scott played nearly three quarters against the Cougars.

"You always have two quarterbacks ready," Stoops said. "Matt was OK, a little rusty."

Arizona (5-1, 2-1 Pac-10) ran 47 times for 142 yards, far above the averages for the league's top passing team.

"We wanted to come out and establish the run game, and that's what we did," said Antolin, who had his best outing of the season.

Despite the win, Stoops was unhappy with inconsistent offensive play that allowed Washington State (1-6, 0-4) to remain within striking distance much of the game.

"We have to play better than we did tonight," Stoops said.

Arizona managed only 352 yards of offense and 24 points against a defense that was giving up more than 500 yards and 42 per game. The Cougars recorded six sacks.

On the flip side, Washington State had just 297 offensive yards and failed to reach double digits in scoring for the first time this season.

"Missed opportunities and points left on the field," offensive lineman B.J. Guerra said.

"We've got to put it together," defensive end Travis Long added.

Foles was injured with 14:07 left in the second quarter when Long was tripped and rolled into his right leg, knocking him to the ground after a completed pass. Foles limped off the field, supported between two Arizona officials.

Scott completed 14 of 20 passes for 139 yards, but was intercepted once and sacked five times.

Washington State has lost 12 straight Pac-10 games dating to 2008, and has beaten only Montana State this season. But its passing attack continued to improve, with quarterback Jeff Tuel completing 18 of 32 passes for 257 yards, despite being sacked seven times. Freshman Marquess Wilson caught six passes for 131 yards.

Antolin scored on a 9-yard run late in the first for a 7-0 Arizona lead.

Foles had started the first eight plays of their second scoring drive when he was injured. Scott directed the team over the final 37 yards, with Antolin running up the middle from the 1-yard line for a 14-0 lead.

Arizona threatened in the closing minutes of the first half, moving 71 yards to the 19, but Scott was intercepted by Casey Locker in the final seconds to kill the drive.

Arizona's 14-0 lead was the first time this season that Washington State was shut out in the first half.

The Wildcats got a break early in the third when Washington State punter Reid Forrest fumbled the snap deep in his own territory. Khyri Knowles dove on the ball at the 7 and, on the first play, Grigsby ran in for a 21-0 lead.

Washington State got on the scoreboard when Tuel hit Wilson with a 23-yard touchdown strike late in the third.

But the Cougars blew a chance to tighten the game after they stopped Antolin on fourth-and-1 on the first play of the fourth quarter. Running back James Montgomery took a handoff and then threw a backward pass that was deflected by Arizona's Brooks Reed and recovered by D'Aundre Reed. Alex Zendejas eventually kicked a 40-yard field goal for a 24-7 lead.

Tuel connected with Wilson for an 83-yard gain midway through the fourth, giving the Cougars the ball on Arizona's 12 and Wilson the fourth 100-yard game of his rookie season. But Tuel was intercepted in the end zone to kill the threat.

The game was also costly for Washington State. The Cougars lost offensive lineman David Gonzales to a broken left arm and cornerback Damante Horton to a sprained knee.

Game 7: Arizona 44, Washington 14

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Nic Grigsby and Keola Antolin ran for two touchdowns apiece, Matt Scott had no trouble replacing Nick Foles and No. 15 Arizona easily handled up-and-down Washington 44-14 Saturday night.

Arizona (6-1, 3-1 Pac-10) overcame occasionally poor tackling with a balanced offense and by harassing Jake Locker into an ineffective game.

Scott held his own after Foles went down with a knee injury last week against Washington State and looked like he was the starter all along against the other Evergreen State school. He threw for 233 yards and two touchdowns, including a fumble-the-snap, 21-yard heave to Juron Criner in the fourth quarter, and added 65 yards on seven carries.

Washington (3-4, 2-2) continued its season-long, win-one, lose-one pattern, following last week's thrilling double-overtime victory over then-No. 24 Oregon State with a defensive clunker.

Locker finished 17 of 29 for 183 yards with a touchdown and lost 24 yards on six carries before being replaced by Keith Price early in the fourth quarter.

Antolin finished with 114 yards on 14 carries and Criner caught eight passes for 108 yards to give Arizona its best start since opening the 1998 season 6-1.

The Wildcats had hoped to be on better footing than last year's game at Washington.

Arizona lost what's now known as the "Shoe" game in Seattle when Mason Foster returned an interception 37 yards for the go-ahead touchdown after the ball caromed off the size 14 1/2 cleat of Arizona's Delashaun Dean. The Wildcats disputed the call - Dean said it hit the ground - but were kicking themselves more for being in position to cough up a 12-point lead in the final four minutes.

Arizona made sure it didn't get tripped up by a close call this time by steamrolling Washington's noodle-strainer defense - 199 points the past five games - for 467 total yards.

The only question mark came early; Taimi Tutogi fumbled on Arizona's opening drive and Locker marched the Huskies for a quick score, rolling left and throwing across his body for a drop-it-in-there 26-yard touchdown to Jermaine Kearse in the corner of the endzone.

After that, all Arizona almost all the time.

Led by Scott, the Wildcats carved up Washington's 98th-ranked defense, piling up 356 total yards on their way to a 30-14 halftime lead.

Scott looked a lot like Locker on Arizona's first score, rolling left and throwing across his body for a 17-yard touchdown to David Roberts. He then led the Wildcats to a 29-yard field goal by Alex Zendejas and set up Antolin's first TD, a 1-yard dive left, with a 32-yard rumble on an option.

Locker tried to rally the Huskies by setting up Chris Polk's 7-yard touchdown run, but the defense parted on the next play, allowing Antolin to burst up the middle for a 78-yard touchdown.

The Wildcats still weren't done.

Grigsby capped the first half with a 4-yard touchdown run and opened the second with another after Ricky Elmore stripped Locker and the Wildcats recovered.

Scott added a put-it-out-of-reach scoring pass early in the fourth quarter, dropping the snap out of the shotgun and firing a TD strike to Criner just before being laid out on a roughing the passer call.

The starter over Foles the first three games of 2009, Scott finished an efficient 18 of 22 and gave Arizona a confidence boost if Foles isn't ready to play next week at UCLA.
