Throughout his 18-year tenure at the helm of Arizona volleyball, head coach Dave Rubio has always stressed to his players, the importance of focusing on the present and near future, rather than dwelling on the past.

Rubio's advice and outlook has helped the team move on from barely missing the postseason in 2008 and turn all their attention to 2009.

The Wildcats return all of their starters to a team than finished 16-14 and only add one player to an extremely experienced squad.

"Any time you bring experience into a season it helps you and it will be a valuable resource all season," said Rubio. "This is a group that has been playing and starting together for a while and it should show on the court."

Along with all of the experience from the large group of returning players, the Wildcats also put in a lot of work in the off-season and Rubio thinks that should show in the fall.

"Every spring is an opportunity for players to develop and improve their skill set," he said adding that the team's familiarity with each other should be another positive for the Wildcats.

"It really helps with the continuity from one year to the next. With only one new player from last year's team, it really shows our depth and experience."

Setter

The setting position is one of the more solid areas for the Wildcats heading into the 2009 season. Junior Paige Weber returns to the lineup for her third straight season. In her first two years as a Wildcat, Weber has played in every single set.

"When you have a setter like Paige, you feel like you can face any situation," said Rubio. "This will be her third season as our starting setter and we can go a long way with her leading us." The Indianapolis-native is coming off a season in which she recorded 1121 assists and 182 digs. If you add Weber's 2007 total of 1,330 assists to her 2008 total, the former Gatorade High School

Player of the Year has 2,451 for her career, good enough for seventh on the Wildcats all-time list.

Weber also worked with the USA Volleyball A2 team over the season, earning a spot with the national club.

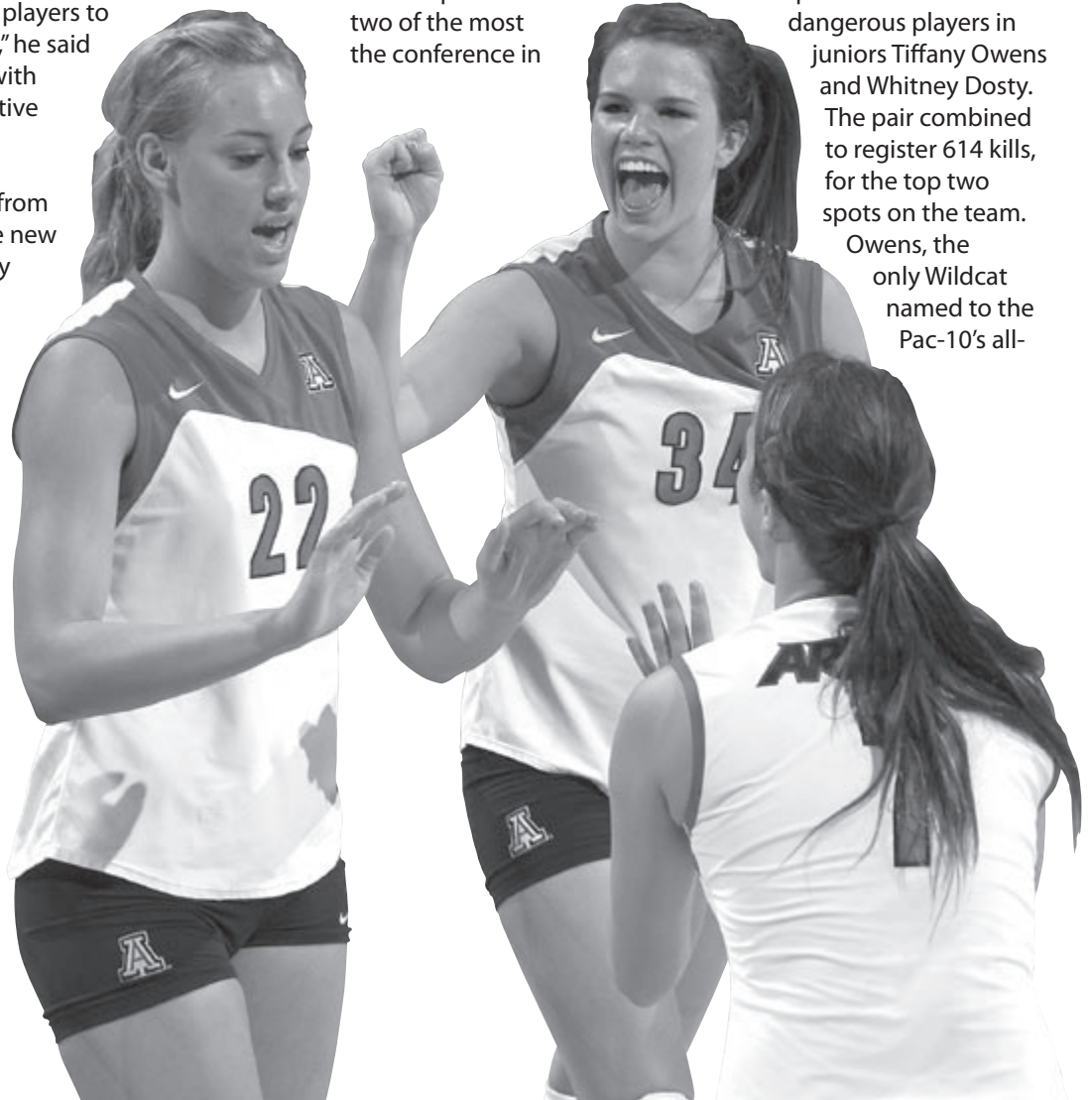
Weber's smarts on the court also translate off the court, where she earned All-Academic Second Team honors with a 3.79 GPA.

Arizona also has some depth at setter, when redshirt freshman Tori Moore works into the team's rotation. Moore came in last season and redshirted, so her and Weber would not be in back-to-back years and Rubio believe she will be a great contributor.

"Tori continues to develop her skills and she's shown great progress," said Rubio. "She has the right mindset to be a successful setter and she continues to get better."

Outside Hitter/Opposite Hitters

With a majority of their production coming back, it can be expected that the Wildcats would be deep at every position and the pins are no exception. Arizona returns two of the most dangerous players in the conference in juniors Tiffany Owens and Whitney Dosty. The pair combined to register 614 kills, for the top two spots on the team. Owens, the only Wildcat named to the Pac-10's all-

conference team, earned Honorable Mention honors, while Dosty played her first full season back from injury and played on the same A2 national team as Weber.

"You have to have the balance on the outside of kids that can both score and pass in order to keep you in your system," said Rubio. "We feel like we have that good balance and that should help us a bunch. Our outsides give us a little of both and we feel good about it."

The Wildcats add depth with sophomores Courtney Karst and Dana Hutchinson. Both were named to the Pac-10 All-Freshman team for their work in their first seasons. Karst and Hutchinson both proved to be versatile in the Wildcats system registering kills, digs and blocks.

Middle Blocker

Arizona's depth in the middle showed a great deal down the stretch of the 2008 season and all players are coming back in 2009. Junior Stephanie Snow came on late last season and finished the year with the team lead in hitting percentage (.325), solo blocks (22), block assists (88) and total blocks (110). Snow finished sixth in the Pac-10 in hitting percentage and fourth in blocks.

"We have a lot of depth and experience in the middle," said Rubio. "Stephanie was solid for us last season and really played well in the second half. We're hoping she picks up where she left off last year."

Snow will also get help from senior Jacy Norton, who finished right behind Snow in several categories, finishing one block shy of 100, while adding 121 kills at a .309 clip.

"Jacy also adds a lot of experience to the middle and should make great contribution in her fourth year in the program," Rubio said.

To add to the two experienced middle players, sophomore Kaylen Bannister will also be looked upon to contribute. Bannister redshirted her first year at Arizona and played in 26 sets in 2008. Rubio said she is the most physically gifted of the three middle players and that he's excited to see her growth on the court.

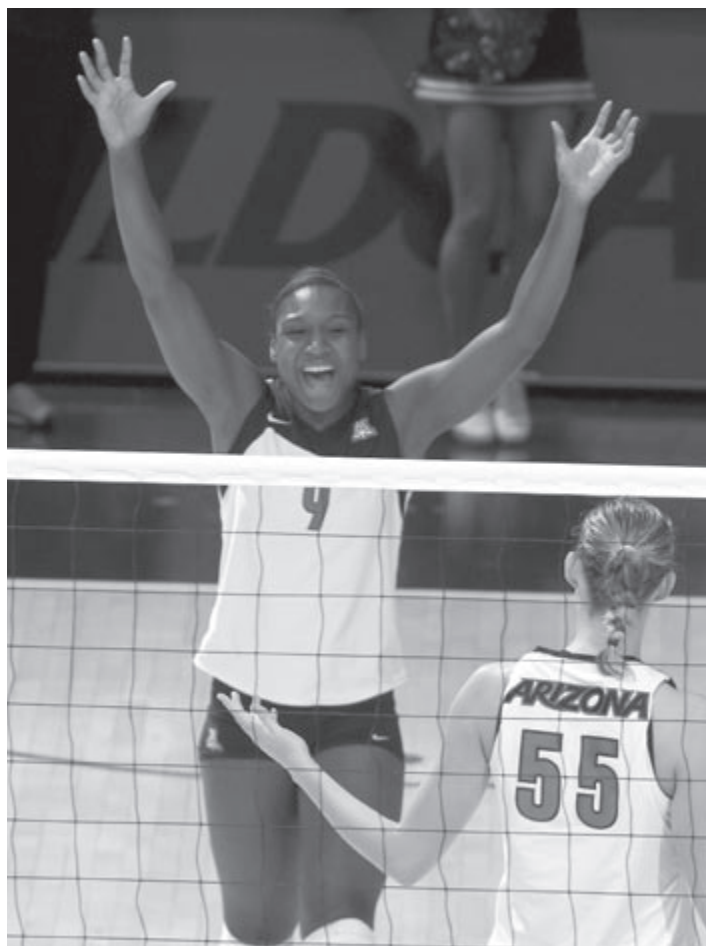
"Kaylen is so physically gifted, but what will be key for her is if she can continue to improve her volleyball make-up and continue to learn the game," he said.

Libero

At libero, the Wildcats have their starter back and a handful of others who should push for playing time.

"We are extremely deep at the libero position," said Rubio.

Senior Alanna Resch recorded the second most digs in a season with 405 last year behind only teammate Brittany Leonard's 411 in 2006.



Resch made a big stride last season and the Wildcats expect her to continue that move this year.

"She was so steady for us last season, we expect much of the same from her this season," said Rubio.

Rubio said it will be a big loss with Leonard out, but having redshirt sophomore Elise Hendrickson coming off an injury and junior Danielle Holloway and sophomore Kari Bardis battling for time, the Wildcats' depth at libero will be a huge plus for the team.

"No matter who we put out there, we feel we have a great one in that spot," he said.

Schedule

Playing one of the toughest schedules in the nation, the Arizona volleyball team begins its quest to return to the postseason August 28 in Louisville, Ky.

"The schedule sets up to be much more difficult than last season and that was for a reason," said Arizona head coach Dave Rubio. "We knew we would be improved and we need to step up and play a tougher non-conference schedule. We need to step up."

The Wildcats play seven of the top 16 seeds from last season's NCAA tournament and 10 overall that played in the postseason.

Arizona opens the year playing back-to-back contests against postseason foes, opening with Louisville Aug. 28 and then taking on Belmont Aug. 29 in Louisville, Ky.

Returning all five starters and their libero, the Wildcats will also play Utah, who was the nation's No. 12 seed and Tulane, No. 16 seed, in their non-conference schedule.

Pittsburg, Nevada, Houston, Eastern Washington, New Mexico, and UTEP are the other teams on the team's non-conference slate before heading into Pac-10 play.



"The conference will be more competitive than it has ever been," said Rubio. "The gap between teams continues to shrink and we expect to have some great fights between everyone in the conference."

Six Pac-10 teams played in the postseason last year and the Wildcats will battle everyone for the conference wins.

The Wildcats also already have a televised game in the works when they head up I-10 to face in-state rival Arizona State. The Wildcats and Sun Devils will be on FSN Friday, Oct. 16 from Wells Fargo Arena in Tempe, Ariz.

Arizona opens its home schedule Sept. 4 against Nevada in the Wildcat Classic.

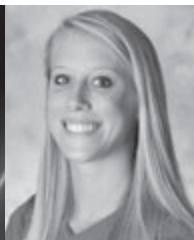

Entering his 18th season as the head coach at Arizona, David Rubio has turned the Wildcat volleyball program into one that not only contends in the traditionally dominant Pacific-10, but on a national level as well.

In the last ten seasons, Rubio has guided the Wildcats to five Sweet 16s, four Elite Eights and to Arizona's first-ever Final Four. His teams have won over 200 matches during this ten-year stretch, including 16 in the NCAA Tournament, which is six more than the previous 14 postseason teams combined.

As the Wildcats' top man, Rubio has guided the once-lowly program to 12 NCAA Tournament berths, including 10 straight from 1996-2005, a school-record 22 NCAA Tournament victories, seven Sweet 16s, four Elite Eights and to the Final Four in 2001.

Despite playing a challenging non-conference slate every year before the grueling Pac-10 season, Rubio's teams are consistently ranked in the polls. The Wildcats had a streak of 30 straight weeks in the Top 10 in the American Volleyball Coaches Association poll from 2000-03. In 2000 and again in 2001, his teams ranked as high as No. 3 in the poll, the highest ranking of any team in school history.

Inheriting a program that did not win a single conference match the season prior to his arrival, Rubio has guided the Wildcats to a 321-189 (.589) overall record and has won 443 matches in his 22-year collegiate coaching career, and in 2000 he guided Arizona to its first ever Pac-10 title.

Rubio's tireless recruiting efforts have seen more athletic and highly regarded student-athletes opting for Arizona. During his tenure, he has recruited 27 athletes listed as *Volleyball Magazine* Fab 50 recruits (the magazine ranks the Fab 50 from first through 50th in order of the impact they are expected to make in college volleyball). His recruiting class in 2002 (Jennifer Abernathy, Meghan Cumpston, Kim Glass and Bre Ladd) was the top-ranked freshman class in the nation. He followed that the next three years with classes that featured a pair of members of the Fab 50 list, and his 2006 class was ranked fourth in the nation. Rubio also nabbed a pair of *Volleyball Magazine* Fab 50 recruits for the 2007 season, and a trio in 2008.

At Arizona, Rubio has recruited and coached four first-team All-Americans, including Arizona's first ever consensus two-time honoree, an AVCA Freshman of the Year, a Pac-10 Player of the Year, 26 All-Pac-10 performers, 13 All-Pac-10 freshman players and 16 academic all-conference athletes. Wildcat athletes have also earned 24 Pac-10 Player of the Week honors under his guide.

Rubio and the Wildcats finished above .500 in 2008 with the Wildcats posting a 16-14 record, just missing the NCAA tournament. Arizona pulled off three upset wins over top-11 teams, including No. 11 USC, No. 8 Oregon and No. 6 Cal.

In 2005, Rubio led his team to one of the best seasons in school history. The squad went 25-6, with all six losses coming at the hands of ranked teams. Arizona finished second in the Pac-10 with a 14-4 record, its best conference mark since 2001. The Wildcats advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament, where they heartbreakingly lost in five games to Santa Clara.

Senior Kim Glass was named to the AVCA All-America first team, while senior Jennifer Abernathy was named to the third team. Glass and Abernathy were also named to the All-Pac-10 team. Meanwhile, senior Bre Ladd, junior Kristina Baum and sophomore Dominique Lamb were honorable mention selections, and Brittany Leonard was named honorable mention All-Freshman.

In addition, the 2005 season was one of personal milestones for Rubio, as he notched his 400th career victory when the Wildcats defeated Ohio in the Sweet 16 on Dec. 9. Earlier in the year, he became Arizona's career wins leader, surpassing Rosie Wegrich.

In 2004, injuries plagued the Wildcats, yet Rubio was able to lead the team to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, where it lost a heartbreaking five-game match to host San Diego. Arizona finished the season 19-11 overall and 10-8 in the dominant Pac-10, which featured three of the teams in the Final Four.

Glass, who missed the entire non-conference slate with a shoulder injury, was named All-Pac-10 for the third consecutive year. Senior Jolene Killough was also named to the All-Pac-10 squad and finished her career ranked second in the Arizona record books with a .349 hitting percentage. Ladd was an honorable mention All-Pac-10 pick.

Losing a pair of All-Americans, Rubio's coaching abilities shined in 2002. Fielding a team with a transfer setter and four freshmen playing major roles, Rubio led the Wildcats to a third-place finish in the Pac-10 and the right to host the first and second rounds of the NCAA Tournament. He guided the Wildcats to opening round wins and an upset victory of Minnesota in the Sweet 16, giving Arizona its seventh straight 20-win season, a third-straight trip to the Elite Eight and UA's third consecutive Top 10 final ranking.

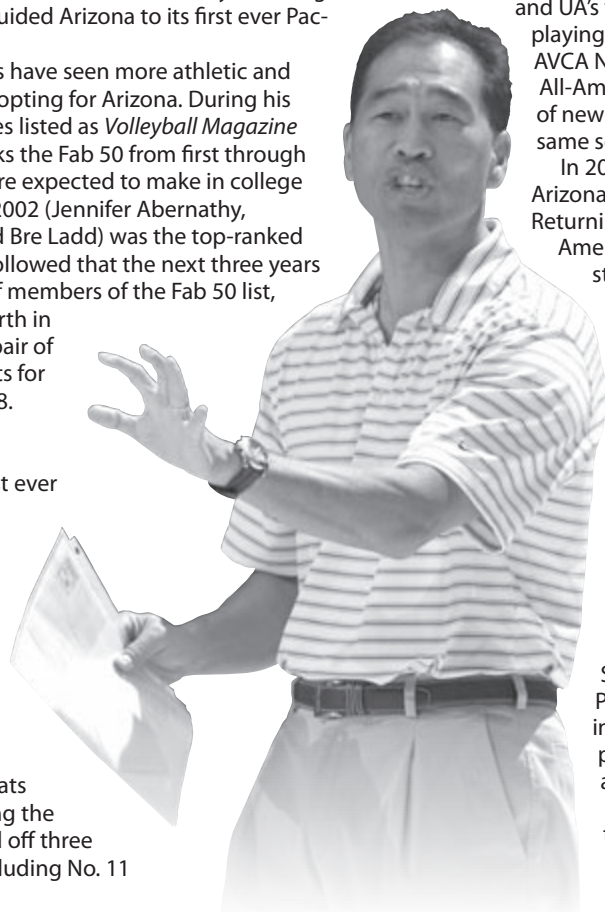
Glass, playing in her first season under Rubio, was named the AVCA National Freshman of the Year and a second team All-American. Glass and Ladd also became the first pair of newcomers to be named All-Pac-10 Freshman in the same season at Arizona.

In 2001, Rubio's decade-long effort to build the Arizona program into a national power came to fruition. Returning the 2000 Pac-10 Player of the Year, All-

American setter Dana Burkholder, and three other starters, the squad entered the season as the sixth-ranked team in the nation, the highest preseason ranking in school history. The lofty expectations and the implementation of rally scoring did little to alter Arizona's course with history, as the Wildcats remained among the top seven teams nationally all year and concluded the regular season 21-4 overall, 14-4 in the Pac-10 and fourth in the national poll.

While home court advantage eluded Rubio and his team, the Wildcats took to the road in the postseason and never looked back. Heading to Champaign, Ill., for the first and second rounds, the Wildcats easily handled Eastern Illinois and host Illinois to advance to their third-straight Sweet 16 appearance. Traditional national power Pacific proved not to be up to Arizona's challenge in the regional semifinals, as the Wildcats won 3-0, paving the way for a showdown with Pac-10 rival and regional host USC in the Elite Eight.

The two rivals battled it out in a five-game thriller that saw Rubio's Wildcats emerge victorious, despite trailing 12-9 in the decisive fifth game. The monumental victory elevated

Rubio and the Arizona program into uncharted territory – the first Final Four appearance ever. Burkholder's was named NCAA Regional MVP, while classmate Jill Talbot tallied All-Regional Team honors.

Though a three-game loss to unbeaten and eventual runner-up Long Beach State in the national semifinals the following weekend ended Arizona's season, it could not mar the excellent year that Rubio and the Wildcats enjoyed. The breakthrough season ended with the Wildcats posting a final record of 25-5 overall and a No. 4 ranking in the final poll.

Burkholder and Talbot both garnered first-team All-America honors from the AVCA, the first two players in school history to be named All-America in the same season. Burkholder was also named first-team All-America by *Volleyball Magazine*, making her the first ever two-time consensus honoree at Arizona. Talbot garnered third-team honors from the publication. The pair, along with junior Lisa Rutledge, were also tabbed with AVCA All-Pacific Region honors, as well as first-team All-Pac-10 awards.

Rubio was named the ASICS/*Volleyball Magazine* National Coach of the Year. The honor placed him among elite company in the history of Arizona athletics, joining an exclusive list of men's basketball coach Lute Olson, swimming coach Frank Busch, softball coach Mike Candrea and former Arizona coaches Dave Murray (men's cross country), Todd McCorkle (women's golf) and Jerry Kindall (baseball) as the only head coaches in school history to be recognized with the national honor at Arizona.

In 2000, Rubio's team also lived up to and exceeded the preseason expectations. Selected No. 10 in the preseason poll, the 28-5 Wildcats maintained a place in the Top 10 for 14 of the 16 polls, finishing No. 4 in the final poll. Picked to finish fourth in the conference, Rubio's team won its first-ever Pac-10 title. It was an impressive feat considering that, since conference play began in 1986, no team other than UCLA or Stanford had won a conference title. As a result, Rubio earned his first Pac-10 Coach of the Year honors.

Hosting the first and second rounds of the NCAA Tournament, the Wildcats swept both Alabama A&M and Michigan. The victories advanced the Cats to a second-consecutive regional semifinal. In Lincoln, Neb., Arizona easily handled BYU for the second time that season to move on to its first Elite Eight appearance ever. Eventual national champion Nebraska proved to be too much to handle, handing Arizona its only 3-0 loss to end the historic season.

Along with the team accomplishments, Rubio's players fared well in postseason accolades. Setter Burkholder was named first-team AVCA All-America and Pac-10 Player of the Year, and to the NCAA All-Central Region team, the AVCA All-Pacific Region team and the All-Pac-10 team.

Marisa DaLee joined Burkholder on the AVCA All-Pacific Region team, while Allison Napier joined the pair on the All-Pac-10 team, the

most all-conference performers ever in a single season for UA.

In 1999, Rubio led the Cats to a 21-11 mark and took them to their sixth-straight NCAA Tournament. The then-18th-ranked Wildcats downed Virginia in the first round, then went on to log an upset sweep of host Texas. The second-lowest-ranked team to earn a Sweet 16 berth, the Cats faced Pac-10 foe and eventual national runner-up Stanford. Arizona took a game from the Cardinal before bowing out of the tournament. Arizona ended the year ranked No. 14 in the nation. Both DaLee and Burkholder were All-District VII and All-Pac-10 selections.

The 1998 season saw the coach take a club with just one returning starter and six freshmen to 22 victories, the most since 1982. Middle blockers DaLee and Keisha Johnson earned All-Pac-10 accolades, and Burkholder was named to the league's All-Freshman squad. Arizona fell to eventual national champion Long Beach State in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

The previous year, the Cats had also exceeded all expectations, matching their then-best-ever finish in Pac-10 play, tying for fourth with a 12-6 mark. They went 20-6 and were ranked in the Top 10 throughout November. For just the second time, Arizona had a pair of athletes earn All-Pac-10 honors – Erin Aldrich and Carolyn Penfield.

Rubio had already established himself as one of the great young coaching talents before arriving at Arizona. He came to Tucson from Cal State Bakersfield, where he had developed one of the nation's winningest Division II programs. In five seasons, he coached seven All-Americans, led the Roadrunners to three consecutive Top 5 finishes and won the 1989 national championship. Rubio was honored as the ASICS Tiger Coach of the Year in 1989, and in 1991 was honored as the CCAA Coach of the Year.

Rubio served as an assistant coach for Cal State Northridge's men's team in 1983 and then for the women's team in 1985, helping them win a national championship. He began his coaching career in 1978 as the boys' coach at Granada Hills High School. He spent time as an assistant at Pierce College before taking the Chatsworth High School girls' team to the league championship in 1982. Prior to his arrival at Bakersfield, Rubio spent four years as coach of the women's team at Westlake High School.

As a player, Rubio was an all-conference and all-state volleyball selection at Cal State Northridge. A volleyball clinician and grass tournament entrepreneur, he is highly recognized for his extensive community involvement.

Rubio graduated from Cal State Northridge in 1982 with a B.A. in physical education. Born on June 20, 1959, he is married to the former Amanda Sebbas. They have a six-year-old daughter, Olivia, and three-year-old twins Dylan and Lucy.

SIXTH SEASON
LONG BEACH STATE '96

Former Arizona volleyball assistant coach Steve Walker begins his second season back at Arizona, as he will serve as associate head coach for the Wildcats.

Walker served as an assistant coach with the Wildcats for three seasons from 2003-05, helping to lead the program to three NCAA Tournament appearances, including a trip to the

Elite Eight in 2005. He left Arizona after the 2005 season to become the women's volleyball head coach at UC Davis, where he has coached the past two seasons. Walker joins Rubio and assistant coach Allison Napier on the coaching staff.

At UC Davis, Walker became the Aggies' eighth head volleyball coach, guiding the program through its final year of reclassification to NCAA Division I status in 2006, and during its first year of membership in the Big West Conference this past season. During his tenure at UC Davis, Walker was selected to coach the Northern California Volleyball Association Youth Division team at the Global Challenge in Maribor, Slovenia during July of 2006. Last year, he was invited back to coach the NCVA Youth team at the USA Volleyball High Performance Championship in Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

Walker also served as a volunteer assistant coach during Arizona's 2000 Pac-10 title season.

In between his previous two stops in Tucson, Walker spent two years as an assistant coach at the University of Alabama during the 2001-02 seasons.

A collegiate volleyball player at Long Beach State, Walker finished his career as the school's all-time leader in assists per game. The starting setter for two seasons, he was named AVCA All-America and All-Mountain Pacific Sports Federation in 1995, after leading the NCAA in assists and assists per game.

Walker was selected to play for the U.S. at the World University Games in 1995 and was the team captain for Arizona's back-to-back NIRSA club national championship teams in 1999 and 2000. He was named the MVP at the 2000 championship event. Walker is a three-time sliver medalist and four-time bronze medalist at the U.S.



Volleyball Open Adult Championships. Walker began his coaching career in 1997 as the boy's and girl's head varsity coach at Westminster High School in Westminster, Calif. He also served as a volunteer coach at Golden West College.

From 1995-98, Walker was the head boy's and girl's coach for the Surf City Volleyball Club in Huntington Beach, Calif. Under his guidance, the boy's 18 and under team was ranked second in Southern California, placed second at the regional championships and was third at junior nationals. A total of nine of his club players went on to play at NCAA Division I schools.

A native of Newport Beach, Calif., Walker graduated from Long Beach State with a degree in kinesiology in 1996 and received his M.A. in teaching and teacher education from Arizona in 2000.



ASSISTANT COACH ALLISON NAPIER

THIRD SEASON
ARIZONA '02

Former Wildcat standout Allison Napier enters her third season as an assistant coach at Arizona, where she will assist in recruiting and the day-to-day team operations both on and off the court.

Napier ended her career at Arizona with 1,008 kills in 110 matches, averaging 2.86 kills and 1.55 digs per

game over four seasons as an outside hitter. She helped lead Arizona to a Sweet 16 appearance in 1999 as a junior, and the school's first Elite Eight finish her senior season in 2000 as a First Team All-Pac-10 honoree. She led the Wildcats in 2000 with 440 kills and a 4.04 kills per game average, the fifth best single season mark in school history.

After her playing days at Arizona, Napier played professionally in Puerto Rico during the 2001 season for Indias Mayaguez, and was selected as an All-Star.

Napier earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in English literature from UA in 2002, and spent two years working for ELLE Magazine in New York as a publishing assistant. Before taking over as an assistant coach at Arizona, Napier was the public relations coordinator for TSE Cashmere.

2008 YEAR IN REVIEW

The 2008 Season

The University of Arizona volleyball team finished 2008 with a 16-14 overall record and a 6-12 mark in the Pac-10. The Wildcats just missed the NCAA tournament and finished 7th in a loaded conference. Over the season, the team upset three top-11 teams including No. 11 USC, No. 8 Oregon and No. 6 Cal.

A Quick Look at Arizona

During the 2008 season, Arizona hit .228 (1369 – 550 – 3586) as a team, for the 10th best mark in school history. The Wildcats averaged 12.92 kills, 11.84 assists, 13.89 digs and 2.59 blocks per set throughout the season. Sophomore Tiffany Owens led the team with 333 kills and a 3.30 kill per set average while getting some help from Whitney Dosty who posted 281 kills with a 2.84 average.

Resch Hour

Junior Alanna Resch broke the Arizona school record for digs-per-set in a season with a 4.01 average and posted the second highest dig total in a season with 405. Resch was just six digs away from the school record of 411 digs in a season held by senior Brittany Leonard in 2006.

All Pac-10

Sophomore Tiffany Owens was the only Wildcat to be named to the conference's All Pac-10 team. Owens was placed on the Honorable Mention list after leading the team in double-doubles (10), kills (333), attempts (925) and was second in digs (274). This was Owens second season on the conference's postseason list.

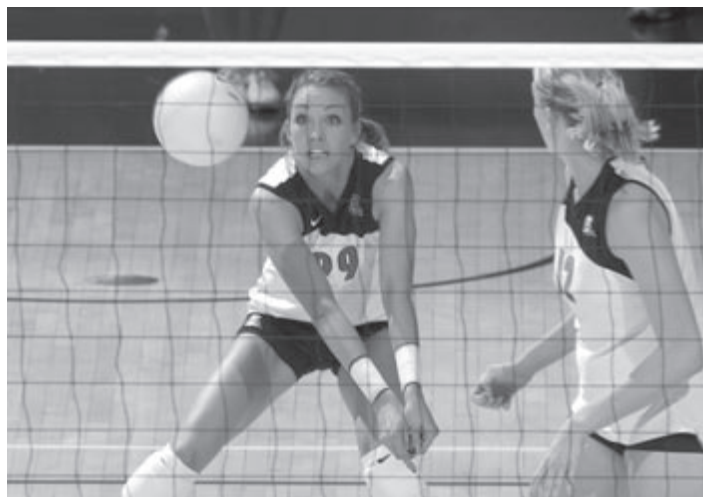


In the Books

Senior Brittany Leonard finished her Wildcat career eighth on the school's all-time digs list with 1,067. Leonard is also sixth on the all-time list in matches played at 119 after playing in all but one match this season. Senior Brooke Buringrud also left her mark on the Arizona program finishing sixth on the career aces per set list.

Cover Paige

collected 2,451 assists, good enough for seventh on the Wildcats all-time list. Weber also finished fifth in the conference in assists with 10.58 per set and fifth in the league in aces per set with 0.27.



Let it Snow, Let it Snow

Sophomore Stephanie Snow finished the season leading the team in hitting percentage (.325), solo blocks (22), block assists (88) and total blocks (110). Snow ranks sixth in the conference in hitting percentage and fourth in the league in blocks, averaging 1.09 per set.

13-set Win Streak

Arizona started the season winning its first 13 sets. The last time the Wildcats began the season on a similar streak was 2005 when they won their first 12 sets. The Wildcats record for starting the season with the most consecutive set wins was 2001 when they won their first 17 sets.

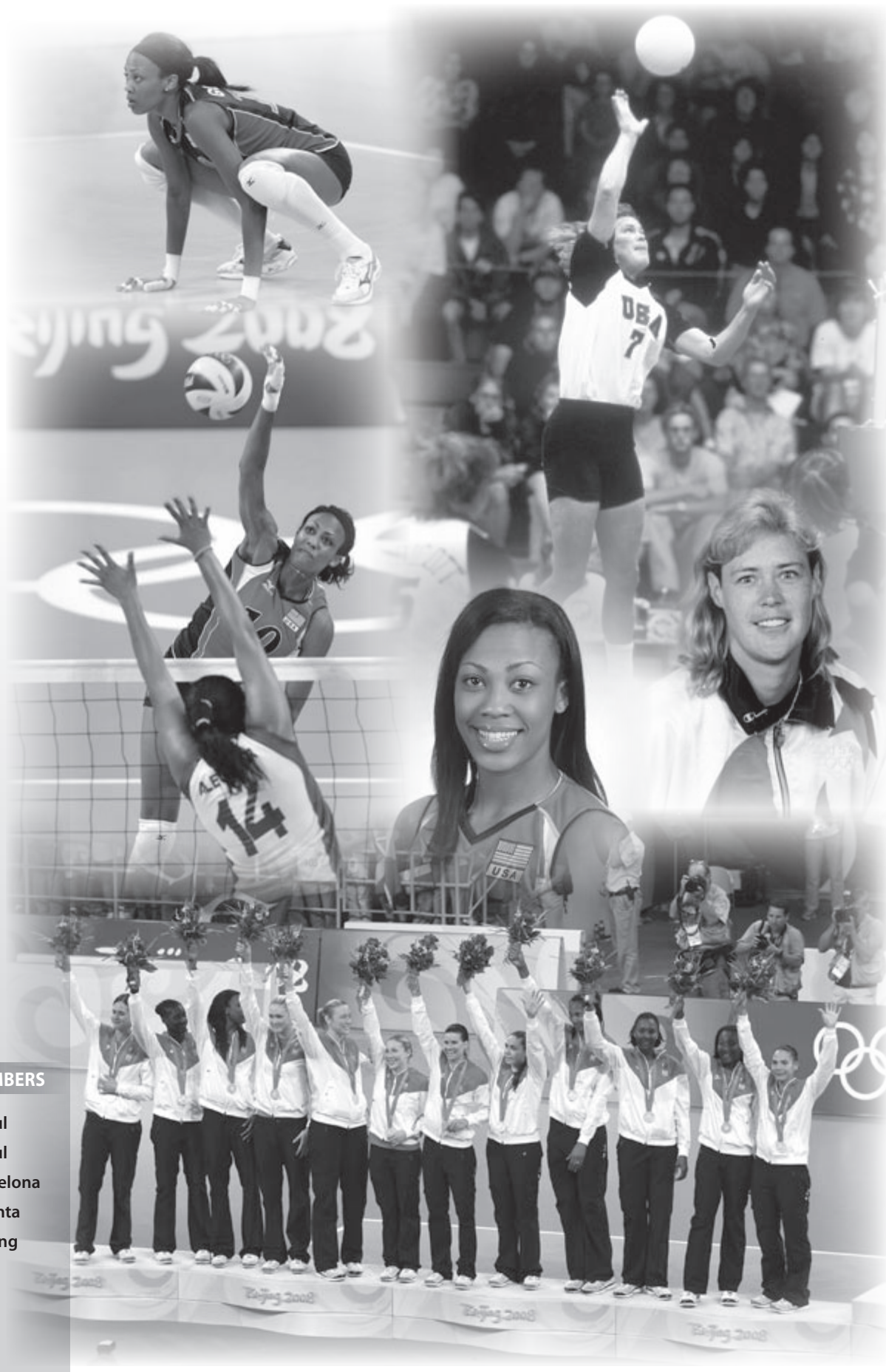

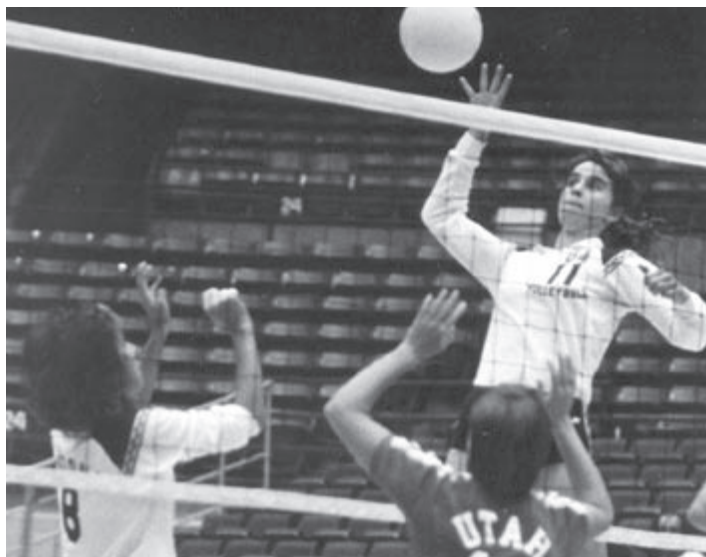

PACIFIC-10 CONFERENCE

The Pacific-10 Conference continues to uphold its tradition as the "Conference of Champions"®, claiming an incredible 166 NCAA team titles over the past 19 years, including 11 in 2008-09, averaging nearly nine championships per academic year. Even more impressive has been the breadth of the Pac-10's success, with championships coming in 26 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-10 has led the nation in NCAA Championships in 43 of the last 49 years and finished second five times.

Spanning nearly a century of outstanding athletics achievements, the Pac-10 has captured 380 NCAA titles (261 men's, 119 women's), far outdistancing the runner-up Big Ten Conference's 222 titles.

The Conference's reputation is further proven in the annual Learfield Sports Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. STANFORD won its 15th-consecutive Directors' Cup in 2008-09, continuing its remarkable run. Eight of the top 25 Division I programs were Pac-10 member institutions: No. 1 STANFORD, No. 4 USC, No. 7 CALIFORNIA, No. 11 WASHINGTON, No. 12 ARIZONA STATE, No. 16 UCLA, No. 22 OREGON and No. 24 ARIZONA. The Pac-10 landed three programs in the top-10, one more than the second-place ACC, Big Ten and SEC (2).

The Pac-10 captured a nation's-best 11 NCAA titles in 2008-09. The total does not include a national title in men's rowing, which WASHINGTON claimed by taking top honors at the IRA Championships Regatta. Men's rowing is not a NCAA event.

Seven of the 10 Conference institutions claimed NCAA team titles in 2008-09. NCAA team champions came from ARIZONA STATE (women's golf), CALIFORNIA (women's swimming), OREGON (men's cross country, men's indoor track & field), UCLA (women's water polo), STANFORD (men's gymnastics, women's rowing), USC (men's tennis, men's water polo) and WASHINGTON (women's cross country, softball). The Pac-10 also had runners-up in nine NCAA Championship events: women's cross country (OREGON), women's volleyball (STANFORD), women's water polo (USC), men's volleyball (USC), women's tennis (CALIFORNIA), women's golf (UCLA), women's rowing (CALIFORNIA), men's and women's outdoor track & field (OREGON). The Pac-10 also earned a runner-up finish at the IRA men's rowing championship (CALIFORNIA). Overall, the conference had 26 teams finish in the top four at NCAA Championship events.

Participation in the postseason was a common occurrence for the Pac-10 in 2008-09. Of the 22 sports sponsored by the Conference, 18 witnessed at least half its teams participating in NCAA or other postseason action. The men sent 63 of a possible 93 teams into the postseason (67.7 percent), while the women sent 65 of a possible 101 teams (64.4 percent).

The Pac-10 experienced continued success in football as the league went a perfect 5-0 in bowl games, the most bowl victories for the Conference since 1997 and its first undefeated mark since 1989. The Pac-10 faced tough competition in the Bowl season, as four of the five opponents were ranked in the top 20. USC claimed its 15th Pac-10 title in the sport, posting an 8-1 league record. The Trojans capped their season with a 38-24 victory over Penn State in the Rose Bowl. Meanwhile, ARIZONA (def. BYU), OREGON (def. Oklahoma State), CALIFORNIA (def. Miami [Fla.]) and OREGON STATE (def. Pittsburgh) also earned bowl victories. USC, OREGON and OREGON STATE were ranked in the top-25 of the Associated Press' poll at season's end, finishing third, 10th and 18th, respectively.

A Pac-10 record-tying six teams competed in the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament and three others competed in other postseason events with OREGON STATE capturing the College Basketball Invitational (CBI) crown. ARIZONA also advanced to the NCAA Tournament's Sweet Sixteen. On the women's side, three teams competed in the NCAA Tournament, posting a 9-3 record in the "Big Dance," as each advanced to the Sweet Sixteen making it the first time since 1992 three Conference teams advanced that far. Two of the teams went on to the Elite Eight and STANFORD made its second-straight NCAA Final Four appearance. USC played spoiler at the Pacific Life Pac-10 Men's Basketball Tournament, winning the Conference crown, while the Cardinal claimed its third-straight State Farm Pac-10 Women's Basketball title.

Without question, the Conference has dominated the softball field, winning 21 national championships in the sport since 1982. WASHINGTON held up the 2009 NCAA trophy, the program's first national title in the sport. The Huskies defeated top-seeded Florida sweeping the first two games of the best-of-three series. Boasting a 16-5 record, UCLA captured the Pac-10 regular-season title, while six teams earned NCAA bids. ARIZONA and ARIZONA STATE joined WASHINGTON at the Division I Women's College World Series. In baseball, ARIZONA STATE won the league title with a 21-6 record and led the charge in the NCAA Tournament, advancing to the College World Series championship series in Omaha, Neb., but fell short of capturing the national title. OREGON STATE and WASHINGTON STATE rounded out the Pac-10's NCAA Tournament selections for baseball.

The Conference swept three men's and women's sports, capturing national championships in cross country, water polo and rowing. OREGON claimed the men's cross country title for the second-straight year and WASHINGTON won its first women's title in the sport. The L.A. counterparts took home the hardware for both men's and women's water polo. The USC men capped off a perfect season with their fourth NCAA title, while

the UCLA women won their fifth-straight crown. STANFORD also claimed its first national title in women's rowing, winning gold at the NCAA championships, while WASHINGTON reclaimed its IRA men's rowing title from 2007.

On the men's side, Pac-10 members have won 261 NCAA team championships, far ahead of the 200 claimed by the runner-up Big Ten. Men's NCAA crowns have come at a phenomenal rate for the Pac-10 - 15 basketball titles by five schools (more than any other conference), 50 tennis titles, 44 outdoor track & field crowns, and 26 baseball titles. Pac-10 members have won 24 of the last 40 NCAA titles in volleyball, 35 of the last 50 in water polo, and 21 in swimming & diving national championships.

Individually, the Conference has produced an impressive number of NCAA men's individual champions, as well, boasting 1,169 individual crowns.

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 28 years ago, Pac-10 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 20 occasions, including 2008-09. Overall, the Pac-10 has

captured 119 NCAA women's titles, easily outdistancing the SEC, which is second with 74. Pac-10 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 21 softball titles, 18 tennis crowns, 13 of the last 19 volleyball titles, 13 of the last 20 trophies in golf and 11 in swimming & diving.

Pac-10 women athletes shine nationally on an individual basis, as well, having captured an unmatched 525 NCAA individual crowns, an average of more than 18 championships per season.



PAC-10 CONFERENCE HISTORY

The roots of the Pacific-10 Conference date back over 90 years to December 2, 1915, when the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) was founded at a meeting at the Oregon Hotel in Portland, Ore. The original membership consisted of four schools - the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, and Oregon State College (now Oregon State University). All still are charter members of the Conference.

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916 and, one year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University) was accepted into the league, with Stanford University following in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California (USC) and the University of Idaho. In 1924, the University of

Montana joined the league roster, and in 1928, the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA.

The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-member league until 1950, with the exception of 1943-45 when World War II curtailed intercollegiate athletic competition to a minimum. During that time, the league's first commissioner was named. Edwin N. Atherton was Commissioner in 1940 and was succeeded by Victor O. Schmidt in 1944. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and joined the Mountain States Conference. The PCC continued as a nine-team Conference through 1958.

In 1959, the PCC was dissolved and the Athletic Associates of Western Universities was formed and Thomas J. Hamilton was appointed Commissioner of the new league. The original AAUW membership included California, Stanford, Southern California, UCLA and Washington. Washington State joined the membership in 1962, while Oregon and Oregon State joined in 1964. Under Hamilton's watch, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted in 1968. In 1971, Wiles Hallock took over as Commissioner of the Pac-8.

Ten years later, on July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted to the league and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality. In 1986-87, the league took on a new look, expanding to include 10 women's sports. Thomas C. Hansen was named the Commissioner of the Pac-10 in 1983, a role he would hold for 26 years until 2009. Hansen was succeeded by current Commissioner Larry Scott, who took on the new role in July 2009.

Currently, the Pac-10 sponsors 11 men's sports and 11 women's sports. Additionally, the Conference is a member of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and three women's sports.

The Pacific-10 Conference offices are located 25 miles east of San Francisco in Walnut Creek, Calif.

CONFERENCE COMMISSIONERS TIMELINE

Edwin N. Atherton was named the Conference's first Commissioner in **1940**, preceding over the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC). He was succeeded by Victor O. Schmidt in **1944**, who handed over the reigns of the Athletic Association of Western Universities to Thomas J. Hamilton in **1959** when the AAUW was formed and for the first three years of the Pacific-8. Wiles Hallock was selected Commissioner of the Pacific-8 in **1971** and saw the league expand into the Pacific-10 in **1978** and held that role until the early 1980s. Thomas C. Hansen was selected the Commissioner of the Pac-10 in **1983** and remained in that position for 26 years before retiring. Current Commissioner Larry Scott succeeded Hansen in July **2009**.

MCKALE CENTER/EDDIE LYNCH PAVILLION



The opening of McKale Memorial Center in February 1973 marked a new era in Wildcat athletics. Named after the late J.F. "Pop" McKale, athletics director and coach from 1914 to 1957, the arena is just part of a series of showcase athletics facilities located on the extreme eastern edge of campus. It is situated off the UA mall, adjacent to Arizona Stadium, baseball's Sancet Stadium at Kindall Field and the Hillenbrand Aquatic Center.

McKale houses the offices for the entire athletics department and in basking in the glow of renovations and expansions that added a state-of-the-art 24,000-square-foot weight room, 10,000-square-foot athletic training facility and new lockerrooms within the Eddie Lynch Athletics Pavilion, including the Jim Click Hall of Champions — all located at the north end of the building.

Since its initial construction at a cost of \$8.1 million in 1973, McKale Center has undergone numerous face lifts to keep up with the times.

Sophisticated computerized message boards spanning the upper deck on both sides of the court, along with padded press row and officials' tables with computer-driven scoreboards, were added in the early 1990s. The 1992 season saw the installation of four huge video replay screens in each corner of the arena. The 2001-02 season brought new changes as well. A new four-sided scoreboard with video replay screens was installed and hung from the center of the arena, ensuring that once again it

meets the standard as one of the finest facilities in the country.

The opening of the Eddie Lynch Athletics Pavilion in 2002 paved the way for further enhancement of the building as additional lockerroom



space and an expanded academic services department only adds to the complete student-athlete experience. A new lighting system was installed in August 2006. The past spring, the McKale Center floor received a complete facelift with an Arizona Block A being placed at center court.

The facility is 428 feet long, 339 feet wide and 77 feet from the floor to parapet, and houses the entire off-field operations of the University's athletics department, as well as a suite of 20-plus office labs for the Optical Sciences department. With three levels that consist of equipment rooms, a training and rehabilitation center, locker rooms, storage areas, ticket operations, academic services, computer lab facilities and administrative offices, McKale Center is the primary gathering place for all of UA athletics.



RICHARD JEFFERSON GYMNASIUM



On Aug. 17, 2007, former University of Arizona men's basketball player Richard Jefferson pledged to donate \$3.5 million to the school's athletic department.

Jefferson's donation was the lead gift towards phase two of a construction project that included a new \$14 million volleyball/basketball practice facility.

The "RJG" houses two full-court basketball courts running end to end, east to west, as well as have room for four basketball cross courts and five volleyball cross courts. Drop down nets separate the main courts in order to add flexibility to the multi-use facility.

The building is set 17 feet below ground in order to lessen the mass of the building that would be visible if the entire structure were to have been built at ground level. Even at its sunken level, the facility stands 30 feet above ground.

"I am pleased and blessed to be able to make this gift to an institution that has done so much to help me," said Jefferson. "For an Arizona kid like me to be able to give something back to the University of Arizona is very special."

The gift is one of the largest individual donations to the University of Arizona athletic department and is also believed

to be the largest ever given by a current professional athlete to his alma mater.

"This is a tremendous day for Wildcat Athletics," said Jim Livengood, University of Arizona director of athletics. "I cannot give enough thanks to Richard for his generosity in making a difference for our student-athletes both now and in the future."

A native of Phoenix, Jefferson was a three-year letterwinner for the Wildcats from 1998-2001. During his 84-game career (77 starts), Jefferson averaged 11.2 points, 5.0 rebounds and 2.8 assists per game. He capped his career by leading Arizona to the 2001 national championship game. Along the way, Jefferson was an all-Midwest Regional and all-Final Four selection. He was the 13th overall pick in the first round of the 2001 NBA Draft. Jefferson was the sixth Lottery Pick in Arizona history.



THE UNIVERSITY OF ARIZONA

Born on 40 acres of land donated by a saloon-keeper and two gamblers, and funded by a \$25,000 consolation prize in Tucson's competition for the Territorial capital, the University of Arizona rose from the dusty floor of the true old West Nobody wanted it, and fewer believed it would last. Fortunately, they were wrong, and the bet laid down by E.B. Gifford, Ben C. Parker and W.S. "Billy" Read on Nov. 27, 1886, has paid off into one of the finest research institutions in the world.

When the first 32 students hitched their horses to posts near the only building on campus in 1891, they began a tradition that has now entered its third century. The hitching posts may be gone, but "Old Main" remains as witness to the University's growth into a 400-acre Research I institution with nearly 200 buildings, more than 35,000 students, and a faculty and staff of 12,000.

Arizona's first university is the largest employer in Pima County and the fourth-largest in Arizona with a payroll of half a billion dollars. The UA offers 347 degree fields in 15 colleges and 12 specialized schools.

It's hard to believe that in the early days there were more students in the preparatory department finishing the equivalent of high school than there were University students. The number of University graduates never reached more than 10 per year until a decade of rapid expansion beginning in 1910, which saw the Territory become a state and the small outpost

in the Sonoran Desert grow into a true educational institution.

Today, the University of Arizona is one of the top 20 research universities in the nation and has played a part in groundbreaking projects ranging from the exploration of Mars to the development of new cancer treatments and pioneering breakthroughs in heart transplantation. UA's observational, theoretical and space astronomy programs were ranked No. 1 in the country by the National Science Foundation (NSF) and recent *U.S. News and World Report* rankings placed 17 of the school's graduate programs among the top 20 in the nation. In addition, the Nobel Prize, three Pulitzer Prizes and the National Medal of Science have been bestowed upon Arizona educators.

Not to be forgotten, the University's undergraduate programs continue to flourish. The NSF considers Arizona to be one of the 10 universities that best integrates teaching and research for undergraduates. The NASA-funded space grant program pays undergraduates to work in laboratories alongside faculty, and the Undergraduate Biology Research Program includes 43 departments, involves 200 faculty sponsors and funds more than 100 undergraduate researchers each summer. The Eller College of Management and the McGuire Center for Entrepreneurship are rated in the global top 10 by Finance Times.



THE UNIVERSITY OF ARIZONA

UA's top-notch programs develop top-name graduates who have continued on to success in their respective fields. The UA boasts a laundry list of graduates who have significantly impacted society. From the late U.S. Congressman Morris K. Udall to Joan Ganz Cooney, founder of the Children's Television Workshop, to Emmy Award winning actor/comedian Garry Shandling, UA graduates have made their mark on the world. Other notable ex-Wildcats include Native American artist Fritz Scholder, the late astronaut Richard Scobee, television fitness personality Denise Austin, Arizona Supreme Court Justice Stanley G. Feldman, August Busch III, the CEO of Anheuser-Busch Inc., Phoenix Suns general manager Steve Kerr, former Boston Globe publisher Richard Gilman, and noted national sports broadcasters Dan Hicks, Tom Tolbert and Sean Elliott.

The UA also plays host to the world, with students representing all 50 states and 130 countries. Nearly a quarter of the student body consists of under-represented racial and ethnic groups, and the campus is located in one of the most diverse locations in the country, with the influence of Native American and Mexican cultures evident throughout the Tucson community.

The University of Arizona is in its third century of service with a continued commitment to providing support to its undergraduate population. Recently completed and current construction projects are testaments to the fact that the UA is dedicated to continued progress. The Integrated Learning Center, located underneath the grass Mall in the middle of campus, provides a home base for

freshmen, with classrooms and offices for easier access to faculty and staff. The Student Union embraces the ambience of the Southwest with shaded terraces and open-air walkways, and provides numerous services such as the bookstore, technology center and varied restaurants that serve the UA community. A new SALT (Strategic

Alternative Learning Techniques) Center enhances aid to students with learning disabilities. The Eddie Lynch Athletics Pavilion includes a strength training center, medical services center, and the Jim Click Hall of Champions — a museum to showcase Arizona Athletics Heritage and Tradition.

This commitment to excellence ensures that the University of Arizona will continue to grow from its auspicious beginnings as a single-building outpost in the desert into a world-renowned center for knowledge and research well into the next century.



C.A.T.S. (COMMITMENT TO AN ATHLETE'S TOTAL SUCCESS)

C.A.T.S. Program

The University of Arizona Department of Intercollegiate Athletics is committed to the academic, physical and personal development of each and every Wildcat student-athlete. To assist in that endeavor, the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics (ICA) has developed a philosophical approach called C.A.T.S. (Commitment to an Athlete's Total Success). C.A.T.S. consists of four programs: Academic Support (while housed in ICA is an academic unit within student affairs), Personal Development, Strength and Conditioning, and Medical Services. These programs provide a comprehensive philosophical framework for ICA and staff to use in the task of assisting in the personal, physical and emotional growth and in the educational development of the student-athlete.



C.A.T.S. Academics

C.A.T.S. Academics Goals

C.A.T.S. Academics is committed to providing an academic support program that will develop the learning potential of all student-athletes as they pursue their education, develop their athletic skills and prepare for rewarding careers after graduation.

C.A.T.S. Academics is designed to enhance the educational experience of the student-athlete in the university setting. The primary goals are to:

1. Strive for excellence in the academic performance of every student-athlete who attends the UA to earn a degree.
2. Create an educational atmosphere where learning is fun and lifelong.
3. Commit to providing services necessary to support and lead its student-athletes.
4. To assist in the student-athlete's transition to the University and to develop independent learners.
5. Provide assistance for the student-athlete in the development of values, emphasizing the qualities of leadership.
6. Enhance the interpersonal relationships and communication skills of the student-athlete.
7. Encourage and facilitate the fulfillment of career and life goals of each student-athlete.
8. Safeguard the academic integrity of the UA by ensuring compliance with all rules of the University and NCAA.

Freshmen and First Year Students

The focus of the program is predicated on the belief that the key to retention of student-athletes in higher education is for an academic professional to engage the student on a personal

level and assist the student in developing a personalized academic support plan. C.A.T.S. is committed to developing a strong first year experience.

The transition process from high school to college begins early and continues with intensive academic support throughout the first year. Students are assigned to C.A.T.S. Academics professionals upon arrival on campus who will assist them with course selection, tutorial support, study skill development, and assistance with navigating through the university.

A comprehensive Student - Athlete Orientation is conducted prior to the start of school upon arrival in August and members of the academics staff greets each student-athlete and family and addresses the specialized issues relating to the new student-athletes transition to the university.

Peak Performance UNVR 197 for Academic & Life Success

The purpose or goal of this three-credit course is to acquire knowledge, and to develop skills, abilities and attributes that will enhance student-athlete academic and personal success. All freshmen are required to enroll in the class, which is designed to assist the freshmen with the transition from high school to college and develop a foundation for success. The early focus of the class is centered around academic skill development, critical thinking and problem solving skills, goal setting and enhancing or developing consistent time management skills. Other topics may include a broad range of academic, personal and career concerns.

Academic Advising

The academic advisor designated by each College has primary advising responsibilities for student-athletes who

are currently enrolled in that College's curriculum. The C.A.T.S. Academics Office also offers supplemental advising / counseling to all student-athletes regarding course selection for degree requirements and NCAA requirements for continued eligibility. The academic advisory staff members are responsible for monitoring the student-athlete's progress towards a degree and preserving academic integrity in the advising process. Counseling student-athletes in course selection is one of the most important functions.

The student-athlete meets initially with an academic advisor or member of a college advising center staff to review an academic plan based on the student-athlete's academic background, career objectives and areas of interest and declared major. Once this meeting has concluded, the student-athlete may register for classes. The CATS Academics counselors work cooperatively with academic advisors throughout the university to ensure progress towards a degree as well as compliance with all NCAA eligibility requirements.

Directed Studies Program

The Directed Studies Program has a two-pronged approach to meet the academic needs of incoming freshmen and continuing student-athletes who have transitional issues. All first year student-athletes have required study hall hours. Students meet with Academic Learning Specialists, academic mentors, content-based tutors, or a combination of all three, to ensure a successful and seamless move into the university community.

Learning Specialists meet daily with those student-athletes who may require additional academic attention. The Learning Specialists provide a more focused approach to the rigors of academia while guiding the program's mentors and content-based tutors in providing additional academic assistance.

The academic mentors assist with time management, study skills and the transition to college. In addition to academic mentors, tutors are available, if needed, in specialized subjects.

These outstanding graduate and undergraduate students are recruited from all academic departments and are selected on the basis of faculty recommendation and demonstrated knowledge of subject area. They are recruited, hired, and supervised by the C.A.T.S Tutorial Coordinator. The services provided by the tutorial staff are an integral part of the total C.A.T.S. Academic Program and are an invaluable learning resource for busy student-athletes.

Facilities

C.A.T.S. Academics facilities are comprised of the four main areas designed for academic study:

1. The C.A.T.S. Advising Center
 - Houses five academic advisors
 - Work areas available for student-athletes to have individualized tutoring sessions
2. The C.A.T.S. Learning Center
 - Houses three full-time Learning Specialists, Tutorial Coordinator, and Math & Science Center
 - Wireless Internet Access available for student use
3. The C.A.T.S. Computer Lab

ATHLETICS ADMINISTRATION



Jim Livengood
Athletics Director

The leadership and experience provided by Jim Livengood give the University of Arizona a strong national ambassador and outstanding continuity at the helm of its program.

Livengood became UA's eighth athletics director in January 1994. Behind his strong leadership, remarkable developments have occurred throughout the program in the past 15 years, both from competitive and administrative standpoint. He oversees the 19 men's and women's teams that make up one of the nation's most well-rounded athletics programs, one that has garnered 10 team NCAA

Championships under his direction.

During Livengood's tenure, UA has maintained its top-25 competitive record with overall national rankings by the NACDA Directors' Cup (formerly Sears Cup) of sixth in 1993-94; fourth in 1994-95; seventh in 1995-96; sixth in 1997-98; ninth in 1998-99; eighth in 1999-2000; fifth in 2000-01; ninth in 2001-02; 16th in 2002-03; 12th in 2003-04; 18th in 2004-05; 11th in 2005-06; 24th in 2006-07 and 27th in 2007-08. This record reflects success throughout Arizona's broad-based program, highlighted by participation in the 1994 and 2001 NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Final Four, and becoming 1997 NCAA Men's Basketball National Champions. Arizona also

won the 1994, 1996, 1997, 2001 and 2006 NCAA Division I National Softball Championships along with the 1996 and 2000 NCAA women's golf titles as well as the 2008 men's and women's NCAA Swimming Championships. The twin swimming titles, another WCWS appearance and strong showings in baseball and track in 2008 also helped underscore UA's competitive status.

Livengood's focus on the welfare of student-athletes and the primary objective of a college education, most exemplifies his tenure. The UA pays more attention to this aspect of intercollegiate athletics than any other, with most major decisions related to the ongoing improvement of the atmosphere for success. In addition to focusing the University of Arizona Athletics Department's emphasis on the student-athlete, he has maintained a positive fund balance each year, and fostered a cooperative relationship with the university administration that sees the athletics department donating \$500,000 annually to the general university fund.

His national reputation is well deserved, and he keeps Arizona well positioned to compete at the top level as a standard bearer for intercollegiate athletics in the tradition-rich and highly-competitive Pac-10. His program turns a profit, and he has recorded a positive fund balance in each of his 15 years in Tucson. As one who serves under the president of a public institution of high education, that success alone puts Livengood in some select company.

Livengood and his wife, Linda, have two grown children. Michelle, a lawyer in Tucson, and Jeremy, who lives in Washington, D.C., are both UA graduates. Michelle earned her law degree in May 2000 while Jeremy completed his studies in December 1999.



Kathleen LaRose
Senior Associate
Athletics Director

Kathleen "Rocky" LaRose has been at the forefront of University of Arizona athletic leadership for the past three decades. She enters her 31st year at the University of Arizona, her 16th year as Senior Associate Director of Athletics and her 21st year as Senior Woman Administrator.

Currently, she oversees the internal operations of all 19 sports at the UA, being the first woman in her capacity to have day-to-day internal operational responsibilities over Division I-A football and men's basketball programs.

As the Senior Associate Athletics Director, LaRose also oversees compliance, heritage, events

management and all of the C.A.T.S. student-athlete services – academics, medical services, life skills development and equipment operations. She also chairs the department's Equity and Title IX committees, and she directs the NCAA certification process.

LaRose joined the Arizona staff in 1979 as the UA softball coach and worked from 1980 until 1989 in various capacities including coordinator of athletic special events and special projects, and as assistant athletics director for fund development. LaRose is a past Vice President of the Pac-10 Conference and is a current member of the Pac-10 Council, which governs and regulates all Pac-10 policies. On the national level, she was a charter member of the NCAA Management Council (the legislative body of the NCAA) as the Pac-10 representative for four years and was appointed Management Council liaison to the NCAA Student-Athlete Advisory Board. She also has chaired various Pac-10 committees.

In 1990, LaRose developed the Commitment for Athletes' Total Success (C.A.T.S.), an educational approach used by student-athlete services to better the student-athlete academically, athletically, and personally. LaRose was the recipient of the university's 2004 Billy Joe Varney Award, the institution's top career service honor for members of the faculty or staff.

Raised in Phoenix, LaRose received both her Bachelor of Science and master's degrees from the University of Arizona. While in attendance, she competed on the UA softball team as a starting infielder and clean-up hitter, leading the Cats to their first-ever conference championship in 1979. She competed in the 1979 World Cup Softball championship as a member of the USA National Championship team. She also was a member of the Arete Society (UA's Athletics Honorary) and was the 1978 UA Homecoming Queen. She is married to Michael Proctor, the University's assistant vice president for corporate relations. Her nickname comes from her athletic playing days and her maiden name of Rockenfield.

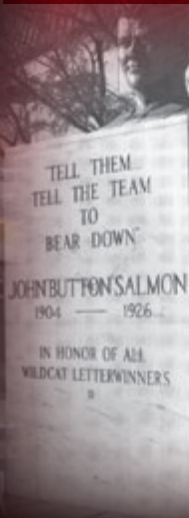
