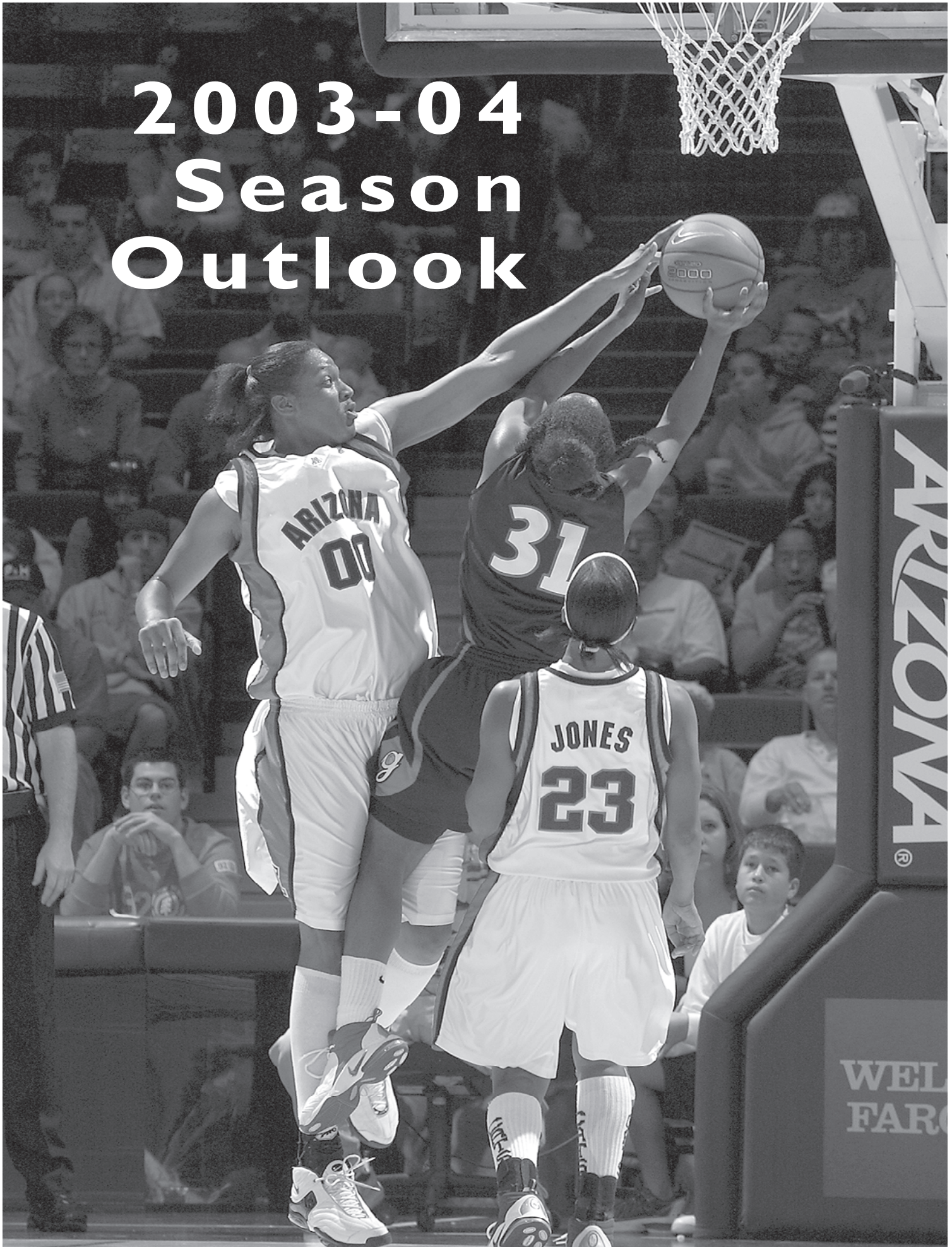
2003-04 Travel Plans

The University of Arizona women's basketball team will travel to seven different states and play in 12 different cities during the 2003-04 season. The Wildcats will make a first-ever trip to Baton Rouge, La., this season and make a return trip Hawai'i as well.

Recent trips to places such as Honolulu, San Francisco, Boston, San Diego and Nashville have complemented yearly Pac-10 trips to create opportunities for the Wildcats to travel to some of the most prominent cities in the U.S. Since the inception of the Wildcat women's basketball program in 1973, the team has played in 28 different states, including 75 cities, in the U.S.

In addition to occasional trips to Honolulu, the team travels abroad every four years, taking its first overseas trip to France and Italy back in 1993. The Cats followed that with a trip to Australia in 1997, then played in a tournament in San Juan Puerto Rico, in 2000. Most recently, the team made a 16-day trip to Italy in May, 2001, touring many cities that they didn't see during their 1993 tour of the country. In all, the Wildcats have visited four foreign countries and 27 cities abroad.

With the return of one of the best inside-out combinations in the college ranks, the University of Arizona women's basketball team is more than ready to tip off the 2003-04 season.

After a lackluster showing in 2001-02, the Wildcats burst back onto the national scene in a big way last year, re-entering the national rankings for the first time since the 2001 season and earning their first NCAA berth in three years. The Cats went 22-9 overall and 13-5 in Pac-10 play, tying for second and equaling their best finish ever in the league standings. Arizona was also the runner-up in the 2003 Pac-10 Tournament, losing a close game to Stanford in the final.

The Wildcats return 10 letterwinners, including three starters, from a year ago. They were a young team last year, and with nine freshmen and sophomores on this year's roster, they are still a young team. The positive is that all six of the sophomores finally have a year of college play to their credit.

"The hard thing a year ago was getting those freshmen acclimated, and they did a good job working into the program," said head coach Joan Bonvicini, who enters her 13th season at Arizona. "This year's freshmen spent about five weeks on campus over the summer, so they had a chance to become acclimated early. They are very bright and pick up things quickly. They have been outstanding workers.

"Any time you have freshmen, you never know how they'll make the transition. I know our sophomores are definitely better this season, and I anticipate this year's freshmen will make a contribution immediately. How much they contribute will depend on their adjustment, but I like their work ethic and their attitude."

So, experience isn't as big a concern for the 2003-04 team as it was for last year's squad. This year's biggest question mark seems simple, yet it could become a big obstacle. Who is going to play the four spot, now that three-year starter Krista Warren has graduated?

"We feel like we made significant strides a year ago, with a young team. With a number of those players coming back this season, I feel like we have confidence and definitely some talent," said Bonvicini. "Our biggest thing will be to replace Krista at the four spot. That's the

biggest question mark – who that replacement will be. We have a lot of people to look at, but the question is who is going to step up?"

Questions about that four spot aside, there is no doubt who the starter will be at the five — the Wildcats return a 6-5 center who received plenty of notice last year as a redshirt freshman. The 2003 Pac-10 Freshman of the Year, **Shawntinice Polk** was both an Associated Press and Kodak honorable mention All-American last season and received countless other accolades. She has already been named to the Wooden Women's Award Preseason All-America Team for this year and has been listed as a preseason candidate for the Wade Trophy.

Polk averaged 17.4 points and 10.8 rebounds per game last year, setting or tying 19 school records during the season, including an astounding 21 double-doubles for the year.

"Our biggest strength is definitely up front with Polkey," said Bonvicini. "She's a tough match-up for anybody. Just about everyone will double her or, at times, triple her, so that will create a lot of opportunities for our guards. I like Polkey's unselfishness... I'd like her to take it herself more often, but she's definitely a great passer. We have a strength that most programs don't have in her."

Lost in all the furor surrounding Polk, junior guard **Dee-Dee Wheeler** quietly had a tremendous season as a sophomore. She racked up averages of 16.2 points and 4.6 rebounds per game and, along with Polk, was named first team All-Pac-10. Wheeler's speed and court awareness make her the perfect inside-out combination with Polk. It was a common occurrence last year for each player to assist the other's baskets, whether it was Polk kicking out to Wheeler on the perimeter or Wheeler firing it inside to Polk.

The most experienced returnee on the team is senior guard **Aimee Grzyb**, who enters her fourth season as a starter for the Cats. Grzyb averaged 10.5 points and 3.5 assists per game and continued to be a threat from three-point range.

"Dee-Dee Wheeler is experienced, a good leader who is smart and has a lot of confidence," said Bonvicini. "Aimee Grzyb is a good complement to Dee-Dee in the backcourt. Aimee is going to have an

excellent senior year. She's ready to play, and you can never take away the experience that seniors have."

In keeping with Bonvicini's preference for a three-guard offense, sophomore **Natalie Jones** is the top candidate for the other guard spot, replacing graduated three-year starter Julie Brase. Jones played in all 31 games last year, earning the starting nod four times. Averaging 4.2 points and 2.6 rebounds per game, Jones was an honorable mention Pac-10 All-Freshman Team selection.

"Natalie had a solid freshman season, but I think she's ready to climb up to the next level," said Bonvicini. "She's a great athlete and a very good defender; she has explosive quickness. She definitely has all the tools to be a strong contributor for us."

How the remainder of the team falls out could simply be up to the players themselves. There are three returnees who could vie for spots in the front court.

Junior center **Danielle Adefeso** is one of the most experienced players on the squad. She played in 26 games off the bench in 2003, averaging 5.5 minutes, 1.3 rebounds and 1.2 points per game. She's going to be relied upon again this year to give Polk much-needed rest during games.

Another returnee up front is sophomore **Anna Chappell**, a reserve in 13 contests last season, who is expected to have a greater impact this year after further developing her game during the off-season. Fellow sophomore **CoCoo Sanford** played in 24 games last year, receiving the starting nod once. She averaged 6.3 minutes, 1.8 rebounds and 1.3 points per game.

"Danielle Adefeso had moments of very good basketball last year and worked hard on her game over the summer," said Bonvicini. "Anna Chappell was in more of a reserve role last year, but she has really improved. CoCoo Sanford also had moments of brilliance last year. She brings us so much athleticism, which is a key to our pressure defense."

A 6-2 true freshman, **Shannon Hobson** joins the others as a potential candidate for the starting job at the four. Hobson was a two-time *Street & Smith's* All-American and was the 2003 *Press-Enterprise* Riverside County Female Athlete of the Year while playing for Perris (Calif.) High School. She was ranked No.

21 among the top 100 centers in the nation as a senior by *All-Star Girls Report*.

"Shannon brings good size to the team, and she is a good player and a very hard worker. We'll see if she's ready to step in at the four right away, but she should see plenty of playing time, regardless," said Bonvicini.

In the backcourt, redshirt sophomore guard **Katrina Lindner** should make more of an impact this year after coming back from her second ACL tear. She played in 10 games off the bench last season before going down with the knee injury in early February.

Senior guard **Jessica Duger** made the team last year as a walk-on but was unable to play until second semester, due a to mid-year transfer during the 2001-02 season. She saw action in eight games, averaging almost three minutes per contest.

"Katrina Lindner unfortunately had to deal with another ACL tear last year, but she's now practicing and will be at 100 percent. We're really looking forward to having her on the floor again," said Bonvicini. "Jessica Duger was a walk-on last year, but she has worked hard, plus she's got that experience as a senior."

Two other true freshmen – Rachael Schein and Linda Pace – could see a lot of time at guard for the Cats this year. A 5-11 product of Las Vegas' Centennial High School, **Rachael Schein** was a two-time All-Nevada, four-time all-region and four-time all-conference selection with the Bulldogs. Her team posted a 124-7 mark during her career there and won back-to-back state titles. Schein recorded averages of 15 points, nine rebounds and five steals per game as a senior.

At 5-9, **Linda Pace** was named All-San Diego County twice and All-Coastal League three times while playing for Francis Parker School in San Diego, Calif. Pace finished her career sixth on the San Diego County all-time scoring list and broke Francis Parker's all-time scoring record with 2,529 career points. She was the third-leading scorer in San Diego County as a senior, posting averages of 29.8 points and 10.5 rebounds per game.

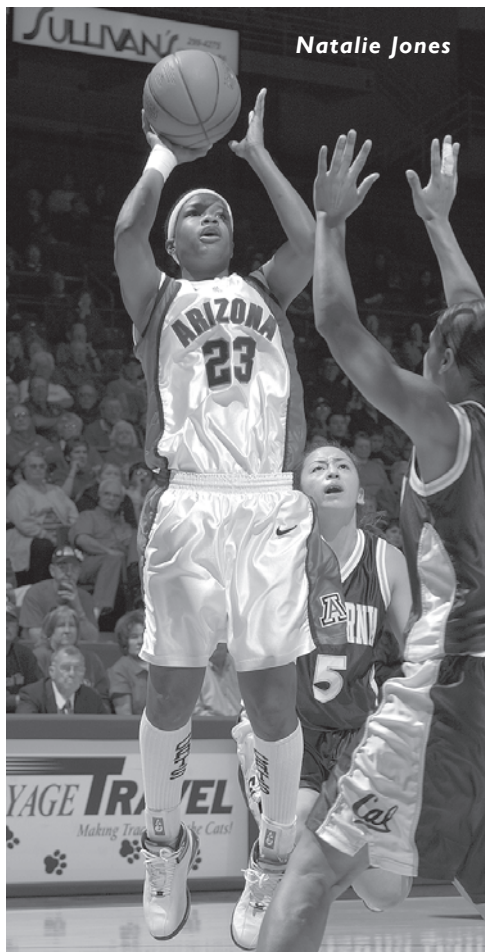
"Rachael Schein is a good, strong player who is also very smart. She will play the three and could see some time at the four, but she'll mainly be a three for us,"

said Bonvicini. "Linda Pace is a hard worker and a prolific scorer. We have a good nucleus of talent in the backcourt this year."

The one guard whose status for 2004 remains questionable is sophomore **Phakisha Peterson**, who has been out of action since suffering a stress fracture over the summer. Peterson saw time in 26 games last year, averaging 5.7 minutes, 1.2 rebounds and 1.0 points per game.

"Phakisha is a three-point shooter and a slasher. She has very quick hands and got some great picks last year. We hope she'll be able to come back from her injury and play for us this year," said Bonvicini.

The Schedule

As usual, Bonvicini has put together another tough schedule for the Wildcats. This year's slate features 12 teams that saw post-season action in 2002-03, including five squads that were nationally ranked at the season's end.

The Wildcats will officially tip off the 2003-04 season at home against in-state foe Northern Arizona on Saturday, Nov. 22, at 2 p.m. Arizona will hit the road right away after that for an extended trip. The Cats will play at UC Santa Barbara, which was ranked No. 18 in last year's final Associated Press poll, on Tuesday, Nov. 25.

From Santa Barbara, the Wildcats head directly to Honolulu, Hawai'i, to participate in the Hawai'i Rainbow Wahine Classic on Friday, Nov. 28, through Sunday Nov. 30. The Cats will face Virginia in the first round on Nov. 28, but they could end up playing any of the other six teams through the rest of the tournament. The remainder of the field includes Hartford, host team Hawaii, Montana, Navy, Syracuse and Texas. While Hawaii and Montana both made post-season WNIT appearances in 2003, Virginia advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, and Texas was a Final Four team.

After returning home from Hawai'i, the Wildcats will play host to Massachusetts, Utah State and American for the 13th annual Arizona Basketball Classic on Saturday, Dec. 6, and Sunday, Dec. 7. Massachusetts and Utah State, a program that has been reinstated after a 15-year layoff, will play one another in the first game on Dec. 6 at 1 p.m., followed by Arizona and American. The consolation game will be

played at 1 p.m. on Dec. 7, with the championship game following.

The next weekend will see Arizona facing both Brigham Young, another NCAA tourney team, and Texas State on Friday, Dec. 12, and Sunday, Dec. 14, respectively. The Cats will then make a return trip to "The Pit" to face New Mexico, a Sweet Sixteen team in 2003, on Saturday, Dec. 20.

Following a short break for Christmas, Arizona will begin Pac-10 play against Washington (Dec. 27), Washington State (Dec. 29) and Arizona State (Jan. 2) at home. The Wildcats will make the long trip to Baton Rouge to face LSU, ranked No. 3 in the final 2003 AP poll, on Sunday, Jan. 4. The Cats then make their first Pac-10 trip to the Bay Area to take on California (Jan. 8) and Stanford (Jan. 10).

Arizona wraps up regular season play against the Washington schools on the road on Feb. 26 and 28, then all the conference teams head once again to San Jose, Calif., to participate in the 2004 State Farm Pac-10 Conference Tournament on Mar. 5-8.

"As a league, the Pac-10 was a young conference a year ago. I see the Pac-10 as a whole being more improved, more seasoned this year," said Bonvicini. "You still have to say Stanford is the team to beat – they won the championship last year, they didn't lose any players, and they'll have Nicole Powell the entire season.

"I think we are right there, knocking on the door, but a host of other schools are there as well. Washington lost some key performers, but they still return the Pac-10 Player of the Year in Giuliana Mendiola. USC has Ebony Hoffman, and they are always a dangerous team. UCLA was much improved, and ASU had some injuries and a young team last year. So all those teams will be right there, along with Oregon. The thing is that you just can't count anybody out in the Pac-10, so we'll see what happens.

"The thing we most want to see is a renewed respect for our team on the national front. We were nationally ranked again last season, and I anticipate that we will be preseason ranked this year. It's important to be ranked, but you're judged on how you do in the post-season, so we were really happy to be back in the NCAA tournament a year ago. We obviously want to go back again this year and to make a run, not only for Arizona but also for the Pac-10."

Joan Bonvicini

Head Coach * 13th Year * Southern Connecticut, 1975

The winningest coach in Arizona women's basketball history, Joan Bonvicini has nurtured the

Wildcat program into an upward-rising women's basketball powerhouse. In 12 years at the helm of the Arizona program, Bonvicini has guided the Wildcats to seven postseason appearances, including five NCAA tournament berths and two in the WNIT.

Under Bonvicini's tutelage, the Wildcats have finished in the upper tier of the Pac-10 in each of the last eight years. During this time, Arizona has been nationally ranked multiple times, including a best-ever ranking of seventh in 1998.

Bonvicini's success is mirrored in her players' accolades. She has produced one All-American, two honorable mention All-Americans, a Pac-10 Player of the Year, three Pac-10 Freshmen of the Year, 17 All-Pac-10 honorees, 14 Pac-10 All-Freshman Team choices and eight Academic All-Pac-10 selections.

Bonvicini herself has earned her share of laurels, having three times been a finalist for the Naismith College Coach of the Year Award and the Associated Press College Coach of the Year Award. She was also the 1998 WBCA Region 8 Coach of the Year and the 1998 Pac-10 Coach of the Year.

Bonvicini holds a 214-139 (.606) mark in 12 years at Arizona and is 539-210 (.720) in 24 years as a head coach. She is 23-15 in NCAA tournament play and has lost just one first-round game in 15 tourney appearances.

Throughout Bonvicini's tenure at Arizona, the Wildcats have re-written the women's basketball record book and have chalked up many historical moments.

After an "off" season with a 14-14 mark in 2001-02, Bonvicini brought her Wildcats roaring back onto the national scene in 2002-03. Last year's team went 22-9 and earned the most victories for any squad in three years. The Cats were 13-5 in Pac-10 play and finished in

a tie for second place with Washington, equaling Arizona's best-ever finish in the league standings. The Cats were runners-up in the second annual Pac-10 Conference Tournament and earned an at-large bid to the 2003 NCAA Tournament, making the Big Dance for the first time since the 1999-2000 season.

During the 2000-01 season, Bonvicini guided a young and inexperienced group of Wildcats through a season of adversity to garner a 20-12 mark. The Cats tied the 2000 team for the best start (14-2) in the history of the program and set or tied 39 school records.

In the summer of 2001, Bonvicini took her team on a 16-day tour of Italy, their second such visit to that country. The squad earned a 5-1 mark on that trip, even though only seven Wildcats were available to play.

The 1999-2000 squad finished in the top four of the Pac-10 for the fifth consecutive year and earned the program's fourth straight NCAA bid. The Cats finished the year with a 25-7 mark, the best overall record in the history of the program. Arizona went 13-5 in Pac-10 play, tying for second place and equaling the team's highest conference finish ever.

Despite having what some considered a "rebuilding" year in 1999, Bonvicini guided the Cats to their third NCAA tournament appearance in as many years. That young, inexperienced squad garnered an 18-11 record and finished fourth in the league standings.

During the summer of 1997, Bonvicini

took the Wildcats on a first-ever trip to Australia, in order to prep them for an important upcoming 1998 season. Despite facing experienced international talent, she directed the Cats to a 7-1 mark over the 18-day tour.

That trip provided the Wildcats with a vital bonding experience that stuck with them into the 1997-98 season and aided in the program's best ever Pac-10 mark of 14-4. The UA, which tied UCLA for second in the league standings, finished the regular season with a 21-6 record -- the program's fewest number of losses in 23 years.

Bonvicini's 1998 Wildcats had one All-American, one All-Pac-10 honoree, four honorable mention All-Pac-10 players and one Pac-10 All-Freshman Team member, as well as the Pac-10 Player of the Year. Nominated for both Naismith College Coach of the Year and Associated Press Coach of the Year, Bonvicini capped the regular season by earning her first-ever Pac-10 Coach of the Year honors.

Bonvicini then led Arizona women's basketball further into uncharted territory, as the Wildcats made the "Sweet Sixteen" while in only their second-ever NCAA tournament appearance.

After finishing the 1997 season with a school-record 22 regular-season wins, Bonvicini's Wildcats earned the school's first bid to the NCAA Tournament. A win over Western Kentucky in the first game maintained Bonvicini's undefeated record in first-round NCAA competition, and the Cats went on to strongly challenge sixth-ranked Georgia in the second round.

One of the most respected coaches in the game, Bonvicini was chosen in 1991 to direct The University of Arizona's dormant women's basketball program into the next decade.

Since her arrival in 1991, she has taken the Wildcat program and turned it upside down. The team, never before linked with the Pac-10 Conference powers, is now among the feared competitors in the league -- Bonvicini's teams play hard. In 1996, Bonvicini's team made Wildcat history with their first-ever postseason appear-



ance, where they brought home the NWIT Championship trophy.

Attendance has skyrocketed -- Arizona ranks among the conference leaders. Nationally recognized recruits are visiting Arizona and signing on to play.

In 1991-92, her first season with the Cats, Bonvicini brought fans out in record numbers. Attendance nearly tripled, and the spirited coach led her team to upsets over her former team, No. 25 Long Beach State, and its first-ever win over Washington.

Her second season was no different; the Cats produced the most victories by an Arizona squad since 1986. They split every Pac-10 road trip, upset No. 23 California and won at UCLA for the first time. Crowd support was at an all-time high as the Cats ranked third in the Pac-10 in attendance.

In the summer of 1993, Bonvicini took her team on a 13-day, six-game tour of France and Italy. It was a first for any women's team at Arizona and the results paid off. The team formed a cohesive unit entering the 1993-94 season, opening with a four-game winning streak that was snapped only by a two-point loss to No. 1 Tennessee in McKale Memorial Center. The team finished with the most victories since 1986 and the most Pacific-10 Conference wins ever at the time.

Bonvicini has implemented a recruiting effort that sweeps the nation; she and her assistants spend countless hours and thousands of miles crisscrossing the country looking for the nation's finest talent.

Her first true recruiting class, in 1992, was ranked seventh in the nation by the *Blue Star Report*. In 1994, Bonvicini had what she called her "finest recruiting class" since arriving in Tucson. It proved to be true as Adia Barnes was named Pac-10 Conference Freshman of the Year in 1995, and in 1998 was chosen the Pac-10 Player of the Year, as well as a third team All-American. The members of that recruiting class graduated years ago, but they will forever be remembered as the foundation upon which a nationally prominent Arizona women's basketball program was built.

Bonvicini came to Arizona after concluding a 12-year tenure at Long Beach State with a record of 325-71 (.820). Her teams captured 10 Big West Conference titles in 12 consecutive winning seasons, never winning less than 24 games in a season.

During her tenure, the 49ers made 10 straight NCAA Tournament appearances and reached the elite level twice, appearing in the Final Four during both the 1987 and 1988 seasons. Her teams were ranked in the Associated Press Top-20 poll each year,

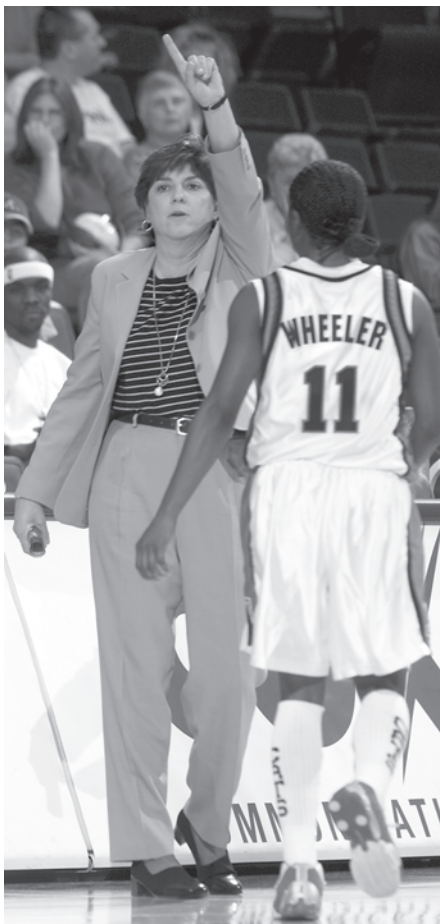
staying in the top 10 every year but one. The 1985 squad finished the season at No. 3 with a 28-3 record.

Bonvicini's players earned recognition as well. Among her teams at Long Beach were 1983 Wade Trophy winner and three-time first team All-American LaTaunya Pollard, two-time first team All-American and 1988 U.S. Olympic Team member Cindy Brown, 1985 first team All-American Kirsten Cummings and two-time first team All-American Penny Toler.

Many of Bonvicini's former players have gone on to play at the professional level. Five former Wildcats have been drafted by WNBA teams since 1997, and former Wildcat Adia Barnes was a starter for the WNBA Seattle Storm during the 2003 season. Former LBSU player, Penny Toler, is the general manager for the WNBA Los Angeles Sparks.

Bonvicini began her coaching career upon graduation from Southern Connecticut. An East Coast native, she moved west to serve as an assistant coach at Cal Poly-Pomona in Southern California. From there, she was hired as an assistant at Long Beach State and promoted, in 1979 at age 25, to head coach, after two years at the university.

In her second year as a head coach, Bonvicini went 27-7 and was named the

1981 NCAA Division I Coach of the Year. Following the 1985-86 season, she was named the Region VIII and PCAA Coach of the Year. She earned WCAA Coach of the Year honors in 1984 and has also been honored as the 1989 "Citizen of the Year" in Long Beach.

In 1993, she was selected as head coach of the United States World University Games team. She guided the squad to a bronze medal in the first games to be held in the U.S. She served as a member of the selection committee for the USA Olympic Basketball Team and spent the summer of 1991 as an assistant coach for the U.S. Pan American Team.

In 1990 she guided the U.S. Select Team to a 5-1 record in international play. In 1981, Bonvicini was head coach of the West squad in the U.S. Olympic Festival and in 1982 was an assistant on the U.S. National Team.

Bonvicini has made the rounds on the international circuit as well. During the summer of 1996, Bonvicini was selected to be the head coach of the Pac-10 All-Star Team which toured Japan. The group spent 10 days touring Japan and competing against the Japan All-Star Team.

She has been an at-large representative to the USA Games Committee for Women for the 1989-92 quadrennium and has been a part of selection committees for the U.S. Olympic Festival, World Championships, Pan American Games, World University Games and the Olympics. She served as president of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association in 1988.

Bonvicini does not confine her skills to the court. She travels the speakers' circuit tirelessly and has participated in numerous basketball seminars and camps, including stints as a guest instructor in Italy. She was a member of the women's basketball NCAA Rules Committee from 1994-98, is currently on the board of directors for the Boys and Girls Club of Tucson, and is a former member of the Tucson Area Girl Scouts board.

A 1975 graduate of Southern Connecticut State, Bonvicini, a guard, led her teams to third and fourth place finishes in the 1974 and '75 AIAW Championships. She earned 1975 Region I-A MVP and honorable mention All-America honors and was a finalist for the 1976 U.S. Olympic Basketball Team.

Bonvicini was inducted as a player into the Southern Connecticut State University Hall of Fame in 1989 and the Connecticut Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in 1994. In October of 1996, she was inducted as a coach into the Long Beach State University Hall of Fame.

Assistant Coach * Third Year * Idaho, 1983

With the departure of long-time staff member Denise Ianello, the job of recruit-

ing coordinator has been added to the list of duties for third-year assistant coach Kellee Barney with the Wildcat women's basketball program. Barney's responsibilities also include scouting, floor work with the players and assisting with the Joan Bonvicini Hoop Camp.

Before coming to Tucson, Barney spent two years as a program manager for the People to People Sports Ambassador Program in Spokane, Wash. People to People was founded by former President Dwight Eisenhower to further his vision of a more peaceful world through friendship and understanding.

Barney encouraged young athletes to expand their leadership abilities

through sports and international travel. During her tenure, Barney shared her personal experiences as both an athlete and a coach with over 10,000 families across the United States.

Barney brought to Arizona 17 years of coaching experience at the Division I level. She was head coach at Gonzaga University from 1994-2000. During her time there, her program produced two first team All-West Coast Conference selections, six honorable mention All-WCC choices and seven players who earned WCC All-Academic laurels. Her 1998-99 squad was among the nation's top 10 for overall team grade-point average.

Prior to her stint at Gonzaga, Barney was on staff at Washington State for nine seasons, under former Cougar head coach Harold Rhodes. She started as an assistant coach from 1985-93, then was promoted to associate head coach for the 1993-94 season. WSU gathered a 107-143 record during her time there, including the program's last visit to the NCAA tournament in 1991. Barney was an assistant coach for the Pac-10 All-Star Team during its 1992 tour of Belgium and France and also during its 1989 tour of Hungary.

Barney began her career as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Portland State from 1983-85 before moving on



to Washington State.

A graduate of the University of Idaho, Barney earned a bachelor of science degree in sociology from the school in 1983. She played for the Vandals from 1982-83 and was part of Idaho's 1982 Northwest Empire League and regional champion team that posted a 27-5 mark.

Barney received an associate of arts degree from Wenatchee Valley College in 1981 and spent two seasons playing basketball for the school, which is located in Wenatchee, Wash. Both the 1980 and 1981 teams won state championships during her career there.

Barney and her husband, Michael, have a six-year-old son, Jarryd.



Curtis Loyd

Assistant Coach * Fifth Year * Southern Utah, 1994

Entering his fifth year at Arizona, assistant coach Curtis Loyd continues to be an

integral part of the Wildcat staff, with both his enthusiasm and a commitment to excellence.

His primary responsibility is the development of the Wildcat post players. Since his arrival, Loyd has coached five All-Pac-10 posts at the UA, including two-year first team selection Elizabeth Pickney and, most recently, the 2003 Pac-10 Freshman of the Year, Shawntinice Polk. Under Loyd's tutelage, Arizona has established an aggressive inside game and has positioned itself as a basketball powerhouse.

Loyd is also the program's film exchange coordinator, as well as an academic liaison and the director of the Joan Bonvicini Hoop Camp.

Bringing with him some impressive credentials, Loyd came to Arizona in 1999 after a two very successful years as an assistant coach with the Colorado State women's basketball program.

During his first season there in 1997-98, he helped the Rams to a second-round

birth in the NCAA tournament and a 24-6 final record.

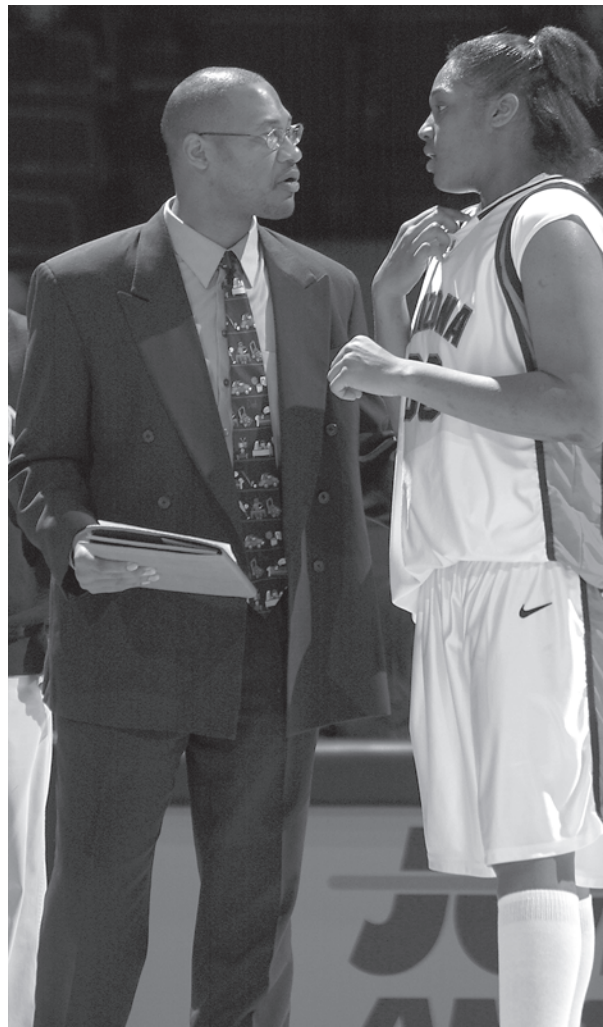
In 1998-99, his second at CSU, the Rams jump-started the year with a Preseason WNIT championship and kept the ball rolling throughout the season, earning national rankings as high as No. 5. They ended that year ranked seventh in the nation after making an NCAA Sweet Sixteen appearance and garnering school-record 33-3 mark. In Loyd's two-year tenure at Colorado State, the Rams garnered a 57-9 overall mark and sent a player to the WNBA.

Prior to his arrival at Colorado State, Loyd was an assistant coach with Fort Collins (Colo.) High School, which won its conference title in 1997. That followed on the heels of a three-year stint as a professional basketball player in Switzerland, where he received numerous awards and team accolades.

Loyd played two years of basketball for Northeastern Junior College in Sterling, Colo., where he earned NJCAA All-American and NJCAA All-Region Nine honors both seasons. Loyd was named the Region Nine MVP in 1991 after averaging 22 points, 5.6 rebounds and 2.8 assists per game as a sophomore.

Loyd transferred to Southern Utah University from Northeastern JC in 1991 and helped the Thunderbirds to a 34-21 record during his two years there. After missing most of the 1992 season with a broken foot, he emerged as a starter in 1993, averaging 11.1 points and 3.3 rebounds per game. Loyd was also a member of the Southern Utah track team for one season.

Loyd earned degrees in both physical education and sociology at Southern Utah in 1994. He received an associate's in physical education at Northeastern Junior College in 1991. Loyd and his wife, Holly, have three children -- daughters K-anna (12) and Mia (9) and son Hunter (5).





Shimmy Gray

Assistant Coach * First Year * Michigan, 1994

The newest member of the Wildcat coaching staff, Yeshimbra "Shimmy" Gray joined the program last May, bringing with her several years of West Coast coaching experience, particularly in the Pac-10. The newest community service projects, coordination of team travel, overseeing the team's video exchange program and supervision of student-athlete academics. Gray was director of the June Daugherty Hoops Camp for two years as well. She also spent the summer of 2002 as a volunteer assistant coach with the WNBA Seattle Storm.

Gray joined the program last May, bringing with her several years of West Coast coaching experience, particularly in the Pac-10.

Gray spent the last three years with the University of Washington women's basketball staff, most recently in a dual role as assistant coach and director of operations. During her time in Seattle, the Huskies logged a combined 63-30 record and earned two NCAA Tournament berths, including an appearance in the Elite Eight in 2001.

Serving as assistant coach for all three of her years there, Gray's responsibilities included post player development and rebounding; assisting with recruiting and opponent scouting; and coordination of the practice scout team.

With the addition of the director of operations title for the 2002-03 season, she was given other duties that included management of team

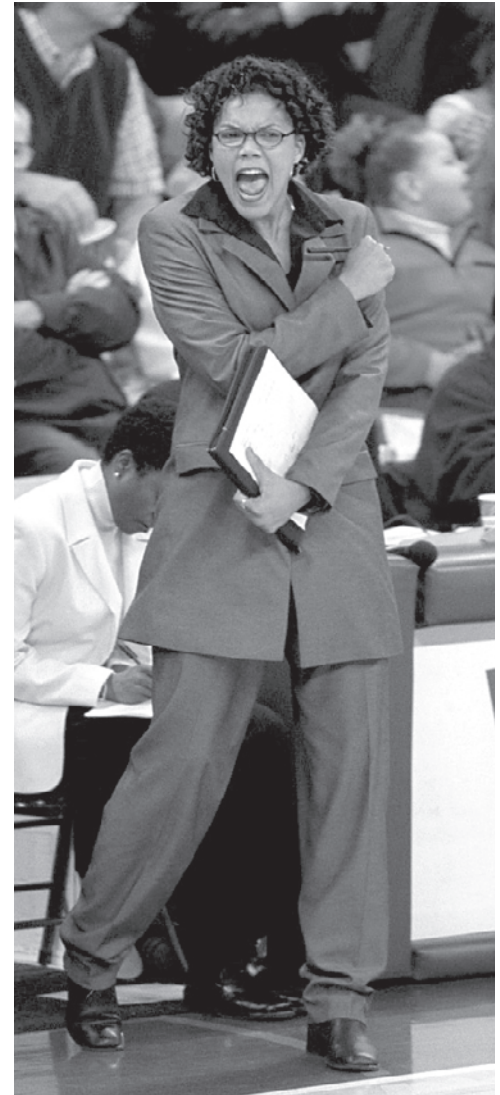


Prior to her arrival at Washington, Gray was an assistant women's basketball coach at Bellevue (Wash.) Community College for the 1999-2000 season. During the 1998-99 season, she played professional basketball with Olivais Futebol Clube in the First Division

Women's League in Coimbra, Portugal. From 1995-98, Gray served as a police officer for the Ypsilanti (Mich.) Police Department and the University of Michigan Police Department.

Gray played collegiate basketball at the University of Michigan from 1991-94, where she was a three-year starter for the Wolverines and was team captain as a senior. Despite playing only three seasons, Gray finished her career among the all-time leaders on several UM career statistical lists, including steals, rebounds and rebounding average. She averaged 7.7 points and 6.1 rebounds per game over her career, including averages of 11.8 ppg and 7.6 rpg as a senior.

A 1994 Michigan graduate, Gray earned a



bachelor of arts in sociology with a minor in law, criminology and deviance. She had a stellar prep career in both basketball and track and field at Carman-Ainsworth High School in Flint, Mich.

Gray is involved with recruiting, scouting and on-floor coaching of both guards and post players for the Wildcats. She also assists in the operations of the Joan Bonvicini Basketball Camp.

Coordinator of Basketball Operations * First Year * Trinity, 2000

After joining the UA women's basketball program over the summer, first-year coordinator of basketball operations Katie

Brown has the unenviable task of keeping up with all the Wildcats' administrative loose ends.

Brown's responsibilities include coordination of all team travels and program events, maintenance of the program master calendar, production of a quarterly booster newsletter and preparation of program expense reports and annual operation budget. She will also supervise the team managers and be the program's liaison with support staff, boosters, season ticket holders and alumni.
